Examination Delayed.

Through the failure of the examination papers to arrive yesterday morning, the examinations were delayed until today. Supt. Long made every effort to reach State Supt. Bralley, both by phone and by wire yesterday, in order to learn the cause of the delay, but it was not until about 3 o'clock that he was able to speak to him over the phone, and it was still later before his wire was answered.

It seems the questions were forwarded by Pacific express, which necessitated their going by way of Fort Worth and putting them in Brady a day late. Comanche was likewise delayed but Brownwood secured her papers all right.

Following Supt. Bralley's instructions, the examinations were taken up in the subjects

assigned for today, viz: Geometry, Psychology, Methods of Management and Writing. A new set of questions will be made out in lieu of Monday's list, and the examination on these questions held Friday.

Mr. F. W. Foresman, of Amarillo, auditor of this division of the Alfalfa Lumber Co., has been taking the semi-annual inventory of the Brady yard, and reports conditions in this country looking better than any other part of the state he has visited.

A MYSTERIOUS VISIT

FRISCO OFFICIALS KEEP REPORTERS GUESSING.

Arrive in Brady on Special Monday Night—Leave Before Daylight this Morning.

When the railroad magnates get to working on something important, their first endeavor is to maintain secrecy as to their intentions and movements and, to a great extent, the Frisco officials have succeeded quite admirably in their purpose so far.

The Fort Worth papers Sunday heralded the anticipated advent into that city on the following day of three carloads of officials on a special train, the personnel and business of the party being unknown but it was understood that some important mission was bringing them to Texas.

This was followed Monday by an account of the arrival of the special direct from St. Louis having on board Chairman E. F. Yoakum, Pres. B. L. Winchell and V.-P. and Gen. Mgr. W. T. Tyler. What their mission was still unknown; it was something important; they would leave at noon for Houston to inspect the Brownsville extension.

Following this the Brownwood Bulletin announces the arrival of the party, accompanied by a number of Texas officials, in Brownwood, and announces that the purpose of the trip was to go over the line of the proposed Brownwood north and South line, and arrange to close up the transfer of the property, the Frisco being generally understood to be the party that recently took the grade over.

Leaving Brownwood the Special arrived in Brady at 6:20 Monday evening, having on board among others, the following: B. F. Yoakum, chairman Frisco board, B. L. Winchell, pres., W. C. Nixon, v.-p., W. T. Tyler, v.-p. and gen. mgr., W. B. Drake, v.-p. and gen. mgr. Texas lines, E. F. Tillman, livestock agent, F. G. Jonah, chief engineer, C. H. Bencini and Brooke Smith.

Mr. Jonah and Mr. Brooke Smith returned to Brownwood on the special the same evening, the others spending the night in Brady. Before daylight the party, accompanied by W. D. Crothers, left in three autos in the direction of Mason. They gave out no statements, and evaded publicity as much as possible. Nevertheless it is persistently rumored that it is their intention not only to go over the Mason extension, but to go on to Fredericksburg and through to San Antonio, and it is logical to believe such to be their intentions. With the extension to Mason, it is not likely that the Frisco would pass up the plum Fredericksburg holds out to the first road building to it, viz: \$100,000 bonus, right-of-way through the county, and the dump already completed, and it is not logical to

believe the Frisco will stop at Mason when one of its greatest desires is a direct route to the Gulf—and this what the extension to San Antonio would give them.

Whatever their intentions, however, they can only be surmised. Railroad builders are not in the habit of taking the dear public into their confidence.

His many friends will learn with pleasure of the return to our city of Dr. Chas. K. Garring, osteopathic physician, who arrived Saturday and announces that he will remain for the next several months, dividing his time between Brady and Menard. Since leaving Brady, the doctor has built up a fine practice in San Antonio, but at the request and upon the insistence of many of his former patients he has decided to return for a while, leaving his San Antonio office in charge of his associate. The doctor had a rather exciting experience coming to Brady being in the wreck this side of Granger in which four persons were more or less seriously injured. Fortunately the doctor escaped with but slight bruises.
