EXPERT HAWLEY HERE

GOES OVER MATTER WITH CITY COUNCIL.

Water Expert Submits Definite Proposition for Constructing Dams, Remodeling, Etc.

Engineer John B. Hawley, water expert, was here Monday at the request of the city council, for the purpose of going over the plans for the building of the dams, taking over the present water plant, or such parts as may be used, and other matters incident to the beginning of the work of securing Brady's water supply.

Mr. Hawley, in company with the members of the city council, and the water committee made another trip to the sites previously selected for the building of the dams, and confirmed his first report as to the location. The upper dam site is about two miles from town, as the crow flies, or about three miles up the creek, and, according to Mr. Hawley, is as fine a natural site for a dam as he ever saw. The second dam site is about three-quarters of a mile further down and is very similar from every standpoint to the first. The lower dam site, where the pumping station will be located, is just above the ice plant, where the water is now being pumped.

At the request of the council, Mr. Hawley submitted a proposition to the council for his services. The proposition is divided into articles covering every phase of the work that may be required of him, from examining and inventorying the present plant, to the designing, supervising and actual construction of the dams.

The council, in called session yesterday afternoon, accepted Mr. Hawley's first proposition. Accordingly Mr. Hawley made a cursory examination of the Brady Water & Light Company's plant, and will send one of his engineers here the latter part of this week to make a thorough examination of the plant in order to enable him to inventory the property and report his findings to the city council.

Mr. Hawley came here from Dublin, where he has undertaken the rebuilding of the water system there for the city, and where the conditions were practically the same as they are in Brady.

The following is a copy of the proposition submitted by Mr. Hawley to the city council:

Fort Worth, Texas, Aug. 7.
Hon. Mayor and City Council,
Brady, Texas.

Gentlemen:—
1. In the matter of water works design, construction, etc., I have the honor to state that I will, through a competent Assistant Engineer, make a thorough examination of the existing water works plant, and inventory the present value of its various parts for the sum of \$150, I to pay salary and traveling expenses of such assistant, but the City of Brady to pay the wages of any laborers that may be needed for such purposes, as digging holes for examining size and character of pipe, etc.

2. Should my services be necessary as an arbitrator selected by the city, my charge would be \$50 per day and traveling expenses for each day spent in Brady on such arbitra-

3. Should you simply desire me to assist you in negotiating with the water company, my charge would be \$50 per day and traveling expenses for each day spent in Brady.

4. Should you purchase all or any part of the present water works system to use as part of the new city water works, I will make no percentage charge on the amount you pay or agree to pay the company.

5. On all monies expended in remodeling such part of the present system as you may purchase, my charge would be five (5) per cent, and also for the design and supervision of the new features of the city water works system, such as dams, pipe lines, filter, pumping machinery and other appurtenances, I to make all necessary examinations, surveys, plans, specifications, etc., and the supervision of all the work during construction, through a competent Assistant Engineer; one half (1/2) of the five (5) per cent fee to be paid me (based on cost estimates presented with plans, etc.) upon presentation of plans, specifications, forms of contract, etc., and two (2) per cent on amounts paid out each month to contractors or manufacturers, the remaining one half of 1 per cent to be paid me on completion of the work.

6. Should you desire me to actually construct the entire work, in addition to designing and supervising it, I to furnish all tools, implements, etc., (the city to pay freight on same from and to Fort Worth and usual blacksmith and machine shop bills for sharpening tools and similar repairs necessitated by use on the work) and to purchase all materials in open market, under competitive bids for all large items, by and with your approval, and all labor and material bills to be paid by you (Brady labor to be used throughout, if available, except for such skilled labor as may not be found there), add five (5) per cent to the five above mentioned, payable 2 1/2 per cent on estimated cost statement rendered with plans and specifications; five per cent monthly

as the work progresses and the remaining 2 1/2 per cent on completion.

7. Under either statement 5 or 6, the \$117.15 paid me for trip of January 11th, 1911, will be considered as a credit on account, and no charge made for trip of this date. Respt.,

Brady is doing the San Saba fair today, and when Brady undertakes to do anything, there is always "something doing."

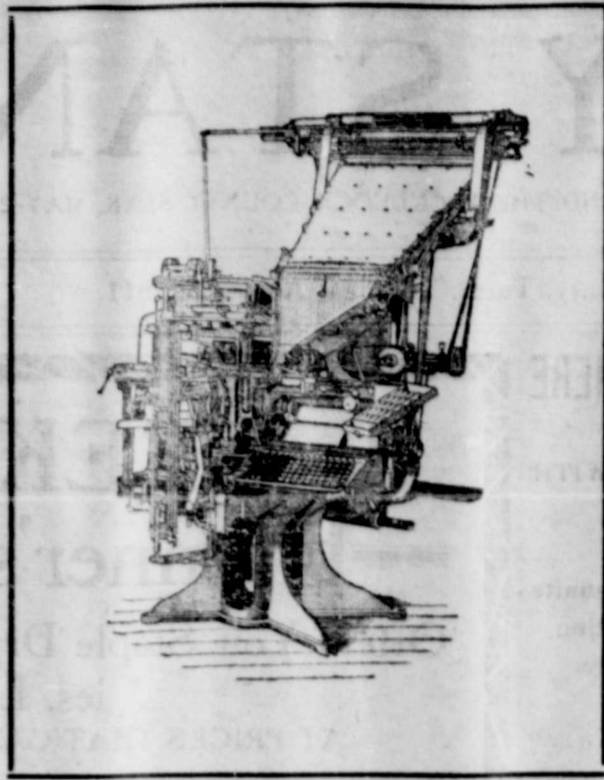
Now that we've got the Santa Fe, we don't see how we got along so long without it; but think how long the Santa Fe has had to get along without Brady.

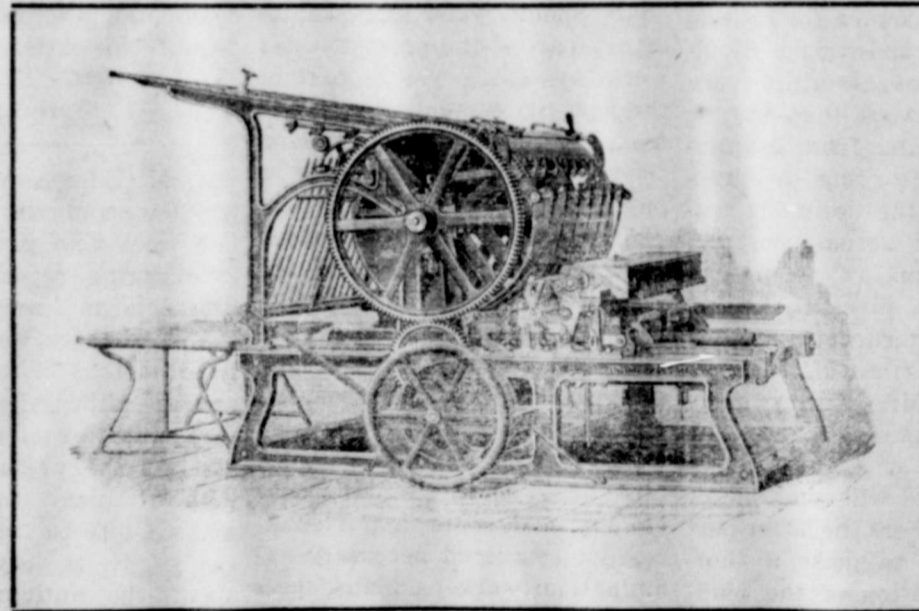

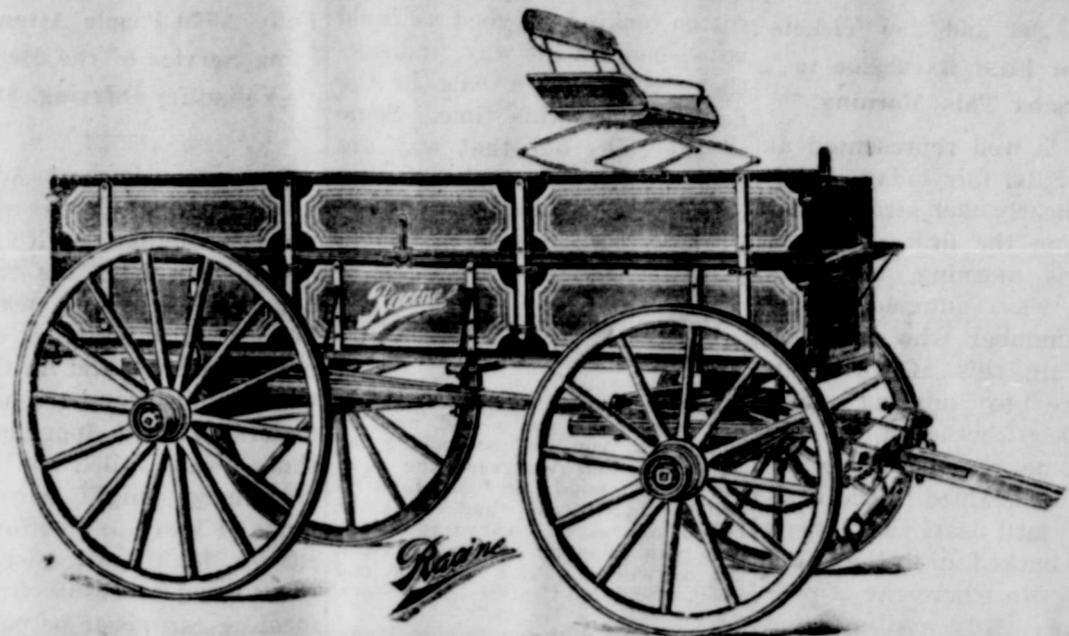

The city secretary was instructed to write the Von Boeckman-Jones Co., who have charge of the printing of the water bonds and ascertain when they expect to have the bonds ready for delivery.
