#### Brady Assured of Ice Plant Next Year.

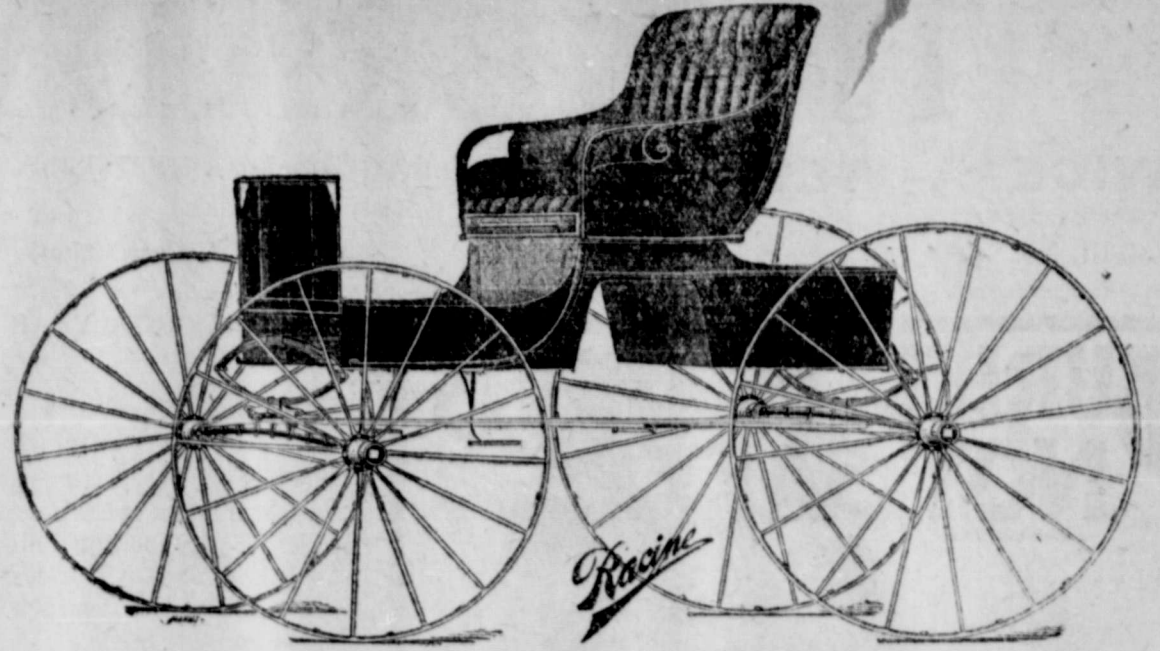

## HANGS IN THE BALANCE

FATE OF ROAD BOND ISSUE UNDECIDED.

Court Refused to Stop Road Bond Issue—Notice of Appeal is Given.

Secretary Hardison received word from the Attorney General's office last Friday to the effect that suit had been filed in the district court of Liberty county to test the validity of the statute under which a city or town may be included in a road district and yet not be allowed the use of any of the funds so secured for improving streets within the corporate limit. Accordingly Assistant Attorney General Seb Caldwell held up all bond issues in which this question was presented.

The following is the letter from the Attorney General's department:

September 20, 1911.

Mr. D. R. Hardison,  
 Brady, Texas.

Dear Sir:

I am in receipt of your letter of the 18th inst., relating to the question as to whether or not there is pending a suit which raises the question of incorporated cities voting on road bonds, and in reply thereto, I beg to advise that a suit has been filed in the district court of Liberty county in which the validity of this statute is questioned and Judge Caldwell of this department, advises me that he is holding up all bond issues wherein this question is presented, awaiting an opinion from the court on the validity of this statute. The question raised in the Liberty county case is the same question that confronts the City of Brady in its bond issue, so I am advised by Judge Caldwell.

The following article clipped from the Houston Chronicle of Sunday, September 24th, states that the suit was lost in the higher courts, and consequently the bonds, which have already been printed, will be held up until the case is finally decided one way or another.

"Word was received in Houston last night that the proponents of the good road movement in Liberty county had met with a victory in Judge Hightower's court over the opposition, who are attempting to prevent the issuance of \$250,000 of bonds for improving the roadways of Liberty county.

The trial was held in Judge Hightower's court at Cleveland. The suit was based on the application of citizens of Liberty county for an injunction against the commissioners court of the Liberty road district to restrain them from issuing \$250,000 worth of bonds for the improvement of 60 miles with shell.

The constitutionality of the road law under which it proposed to issue the bonds was attacked. The principal point raised was that a city or town could not be included in a road district.

After hearing the arguments on both sides, Judge Hightower refused to grant the injunction, which is a victory, up to this time at least, for the proponents of good roads.

Notice of appeal was given and the matter will go to the higher courts for final decision.
