Conditioning Holds Spotlight At Early Baird Bear Workouts

Faced with a season for which few reserves are available, the Baird Bears have been leaning heavily toward conditioning during opening practice sessions. The Bears were to scrimmage the Jim Ned Indians at 7:30 p. m. Thursday in the Bear's Den for their first taste of game-like action. They open the season next week in Santa Anna.

Twenty-five boys have been participating in two-a-day drills since Aug. 17. Practice has been given a boost by the cooler weather which arrived just before the sessions began.

Partially offsetting the team's lack of depth will be an overall increase in weight. Many of the boys reported for fall practice

with a few more pounds than coaches expected.

The team average should be heavier than last season.

Early sessions indicate the Bears should be stronger in the backfield than last year. All four 1963 regulars are back, with the added help of a year's experience and additional pounds.

It is up front that the lack of depth will hurt the Bears. Coaches are still experimenting with personnel in the line before deciding on a starting combination.

Coach Vernon Townsend had high praise for the individual and team spirit shown by the Bears to date.

Garrett Site To Get Marker

State recognition of the Bishop Garrett Monument marker as an official Texas Historical Marker has been announced by B. C. Chrisman, chairman of the Callahan County Historical Survey Committee. The marker is in the Dudley Community, 10 miles south of Clyde.

Having met the standards of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee for approval as an historical marker worthy of recognition, this marker will appear in guides and maps to stimulate tourist trade in the area.

Sponsored by the Dallard Royal Arch Masonic Lodge at the time of its erection in Nov. 1932, the marker commemorates the spot where the first sermon was preached in Callahan County by Bishop Garrett of the Episcopal Church.

Official information concerning this marker will first appear with all state-erected and other state-approved Texas Historical Markers in the soon to be published "Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers," which will contain some 2200 of these markers in Texas. This guide will be the first publication of this type made available to the traveling public through tourist channels.

New Oil Wells Are Completed In Callahan Co. Regular Field

Laco Oil Co., Abilene, has completed No. 6 Mrs. Max L. Logan Estate in the regular field of Callahan County.

The well, located 15 miles southeast of Abilene, is spotted 1,860 feet from the south and 700 feet from west lines of Section 28, BBB&C Survey.

Daily potential was 19.04 barrels of 40.5 gravity oil, plus five per cent water, pumping through 10 perforations at 1,450-55 feet. A 4½-inch casing was set at 1,491 feet, with the well bottomed at 1,482 feet.

R. R. Bloomer & Skinner Corp., Abilene, No. 3 Mrs. Max Logan has been finished in the Callahan County regular field.

The well is spotted 2,164 feet from north and 656 feet from west lines of Section 28, BBB&C Survey. Daily potential was 19.12 barrels of 36.5 gravity oil, flowing through a 12-64-inch choke and perforations at 1,567-73 feet.

L-G-I Oil Co., Abilene will drill No. 1 E. G. Walker in the regular field of Callahan County.

Located one mile southwest of Clyde, the test spots 990 feet from south and 2,310 feet from west lines of Section 51, BBB&C Survey.

Drill site is 330 feet from north and east lines of a 42 acre lease. Operator will test the Cook Sand, drilling to 1,900 feet with rotary.

R. R. Bloomer & Skinner Corp., Abilene, have filed application to drill a project in the Callahan County regular field.

Six Seeking Offices In Sept. 5 Election

Three-man races developed for both spots on the ballot for the Sept. 5 special Clyde city election to seek a mayor and one council member.

Terms for both offices will expire next April, time for the next regular city election. Filing deadline was 5 p. m. Wednesday.

Getting into the race for mayor were G. E. Eager, Knox Waggoner and Harold Holdeh, while candidates for the city council vacancy are Ed Dunn, R. L. Lunceford and L. M. Green.

Lunceford resigned as mayor in July, to become effective Aug. 13. Waggoner resigned as councilman, also effective that date, to become a candidate for mayor.

The Sept. 5 election will name successors to Lunceford as mayor, and to Waggoner.

Five of the six candidates have held city office in the past, although none presently hold municipal posts.

Eager, a retired construction contractor, served on the council from 1956 until 1962.

Waggoner was serving his first term on the council when he resigned to enter the race for mayor. He is employed by Lone Star Gas Co. in Abilene.

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Holden is a former mayor, holding the office from 1960-62. This term came between two served by Lunceford.

Dunn, a surveyor, is the only candidate in either race who has not previously held a City office.

Lunceford, a retired dirt contractor, served terms as mayor in the late 1950s and again until resigning last month.

Green, a rancher, served on the city council from 1957 until 1962.

Voting in the special election will be at the Clyde city hall.

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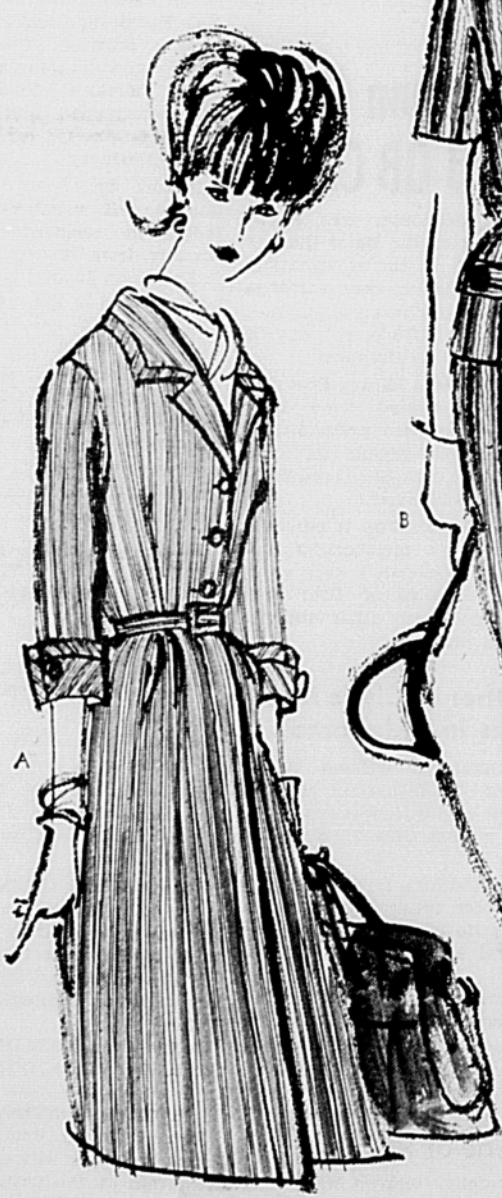

A perpetual and assignable easement for the establishment, maintenance, operation and use for a restricted area in, on, across and over Tract No. S-11-107E, consisting of the right to prohibit human habitation; the right to remove buildings presently or hereafter being used for human habitation; the right to prohibit entry on said tract except by the owners, their employees, agents and lessees; the right to limit the use of said land to agricultural and grazing purposes; the right to prohibit the use of firearms and explosives; the right to limit the use of explosives in operations for the exploration, production and removal of oil, gas and other minerals to the use of explosive bullets or shaped charges in gun perforation or similar techniques, provided that (a) such perforation operations are conducted at depths at least 750 feet below the surface of the ground; (b) all safety measures normally observed by prudent and experienced operators are carried out; and (c) timely advance notice is given and acknowledged by the using agency; the right to prohibit all pits, exposed pipelines, heater-separators, storage tanks, transfer points and like or similar facilities within the easement area, except that slush pits and water storage tanks are permitted; the right to prohibit drilling or production of wells within 350 feet of the center of the silo site; such prohibitions to remain in effect as long as the easement estate remains in effect; furthermore, any proposed mining activity within the limits of said tract whether tunnel or open pit type must have approval of the Air Force Officer in charge; the right to post signs on said tract indicating the nature and extent of the Government's control in such manner as not to interfere with agricultural, grazing and mining operations; and the right of ingress

You are further notified that if you have any objection or defense to the taking of your property you are required to serve upon plaintiff's attorney at the address herein designated within twenty days after September 4, 1964, an answer identifying the property in which you claim to have an interest, stating the nature and extent of the interest claimed and stating all your objections and defenses to the taking of your property. A failure so to serve an answer shall constitute a consent to the taking and to the authority of the Court to proceed to hear the action and to fix the just compensation and shall constitute a waiver of all defenses and objections not so presented.

You are further notified that if you have no objection or defense to the taking you may serve upon plaintiff's attorney a notice of appearance designating the property in which you claim to be interested and stating the nature and extent of the interest claimed, and thereafter you shall receive notice of all proceedings affecting the said property.

You are further notified that at the trial of the issue of just compensation, whether or not you have answered or served a notice of appearance, you may present evidence as to the amount of the compensation to be paid for the property in which you have any interest and you may share in the distribution of the award of compensation.

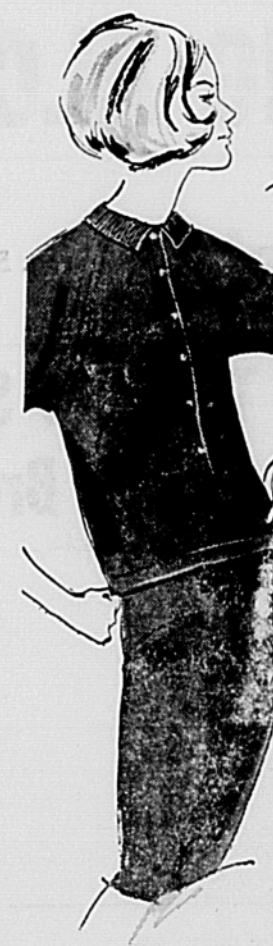
