DEATH BY OWN HAND

PETE JOHNSON COMMITS SUICIDE.

Shoots Top of Head Off With Single Barrel Shot Gun—Dead for Several Days.

A ghastly discovery was made by neighbors upon entering the house of Pete Johnson in the East Sweden neighborhood last Saturday afternoon about 3 o'clock, Johnson being found dead in a pool of his own blood, the whole side of his head having been shot off.

The officers were at once notified, and Judge Lyle, upon arriving at the scene, held an inquest over the body, and found that the deceased had come to his death by his own hand.

The man had apparently gone about his self destruction in a deliberate and carefully planned manner. The weapon of destruction was a single-barrel shotgun, which he had placed between his knees, and with one hand he held the muzzle of the gun to within four inches of his face, while with the other he pressed the trigger. When found his body lay on the floor with his head resting on a sack, and his hand still grasped the muzzle of the gun in the grip of death. He had apparently been dead some two or three days, the blood on the walls and on the edges of the puddle having already dried.

Johnson was considered a rather eccentric character, and had very little to do with anyone. He was a bachelor of about 45 years, and had lived in the Sweden community for about three years. He was last seen alive on Wednesday a week ago. No cause for the rash act is known, although he was said to be suffering with tuberculosis, and also was involved financially, and it is likely that one or both of these causes drove him to his untimely death.

The funeral took place Sunday. A sister in Waco is the only known survivor of the deceased, and at last reports she had not been communicated with.

Would Raise Broom Corn.

J. D. Benson informs us that he is willing to devote five or more acres to the growing of broom corn this year, providing enough farmers will co-operate to insure a market for the product, or the establishing of a broom factory. Mr. Benson is very enthusiastic over the matter, and would be glad to see a number of McCulloch county farmers join in the venture. The Standard would suggest that all farmers who intend to grow broom corn make the fact known. By this means it will be readily seen what can be hoped to be accomplished, and whether the establishing of a broom factory would be justified.

D. H. Henderson was up from Voca last week and showed us a flint rock spear head which he uncovered while digging on his farm. The spear head is 4½ inches in length, and is quite symmetrical in shape, a surprising fact when taken into consideration the crudeness of the tools with which the savage hand must have shaped the spear head. Mr. Henderson states that he found the relic about three feet under the surface, and the only way he can account for its being there, is that it was buried with some Indian chief. This belief is also strengthened by the fact that he also dug up bones in the same locality, but whether or not they were human bones he was unable to distinguish.

NEGRO SHOT.

Rucus in Darktown Near Depot Saturday Night.

A rucus among the colored population in the neighborhood of the Frisco depot Saturday night ended in the shooting of one of the negroes, Jim Davis being the shooter, and J. B. Wells, the shootee.

The trouble started over a debt of \$2.00 which Wells is said to have borrowed from a negro woman, and in the settlement of which a quarrel took place, and the woman ordered Wells from the house. According to Wells' story, he endeavored to show his displeasure at being thus thrust out into the cold world, by "tossing a rock at the door" of the cabin, the force of the toss being sufficient to break a panel in the door. Jim Davis, another negro, resented the action to the extent that he took a gun and poured a load of buckshot in the direction of the vanishing Wells, the charge taking effect in the latter's legs, arms and body, which will cause that gentleman some distress for a few days.

When asked what he was doing when Davis opened fire, Wells said he was just walking away, but added "Ah sho' wudn't been a-walkin' if Ah'd known he had a gun."

Davis was found by the officers later and placed under arrest, and is at present out on \$500.00 bond. His examining trial will be held Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

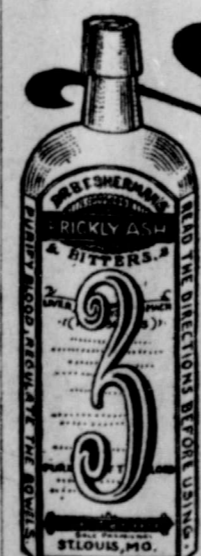

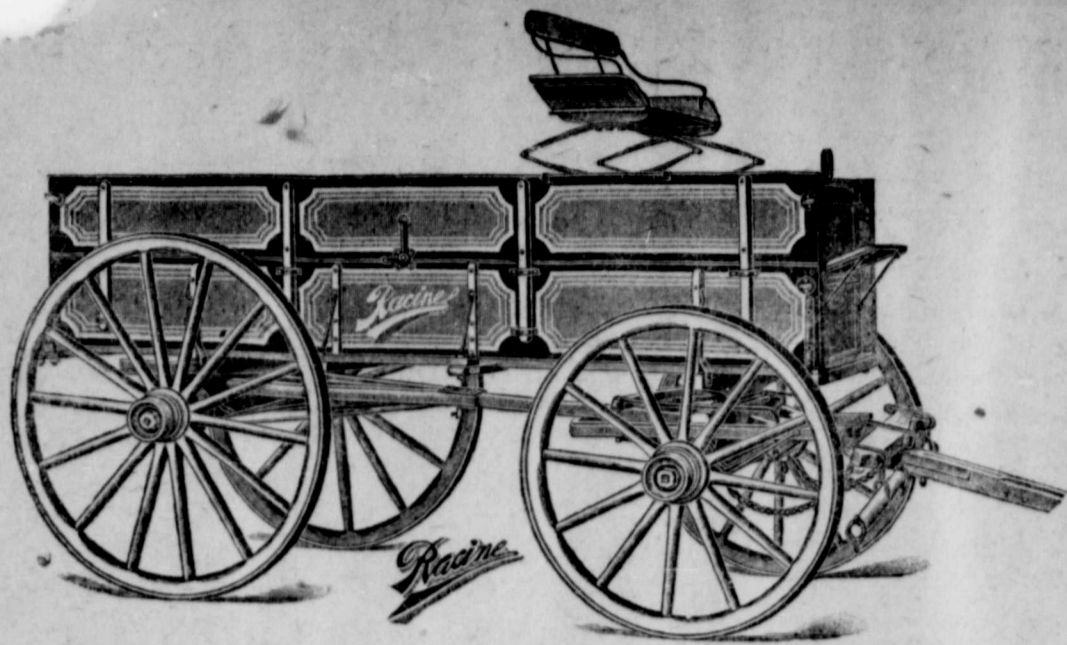

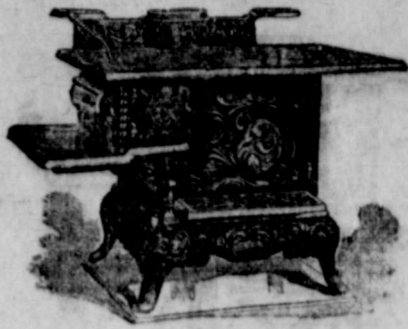
