WEST TEXAS TELEPHONE CO. ACQUIRES PROPERTY.

Deal Closed With Messrs. Spiller and Vierling Tuesday—\$24,000 Was the Price Paid for Local Plant.

Messrs. J. L. and E. E. Spiller and G. W. Vierling, Jr., Tuesday closed a deal with Messrs. F. W. Greber and G. N. Harrison, representing the West Texas Telephone Co. of Brownwood for the sale of the Brady Telephone Co. to the latter company. The new company assumed charge of the business Wednesday morning, W. W. Davis of the auditing department at Brownwood being placed in temporary charge of the business, while D. J. Johnson is here this week to assist in getting matters shaped up and the business started off.

The terms of the deal were \$24,000, Messrs. Spiller retaining the accounts and assuming outstanding indebtedness. Neither J. L. nor E. E. Spiller have made plans for the future, but will continue to make Brady their home and, for the present, look after collections.

G. W. Vierling, Jr., who has also disposed of his interest, will go to Kimble county and take up the work of right hand man to his father on the ranch.

In addition to the local exchange, the new proprietors acquire toll lines to Menard, San Saba and Eden, a total of about 150 miles of toll lines, as well as the rural lines about Brady. This makes the tenth exchange operated by the West Texas Co., they having exchanges at Lometa, Goldthwaite, Mullin, Zephyr, Brownwood, Coleman, Ballinger, Winters, Paint Rock and Brady, and the latest acquisition gives them some very valuable and desirable territory. The company also has toll line connection with the Southwestern Telephone Co. at Brownwood, Bradshaw, Lampasas and San Saba, and with their own toll lines covering this section of the country, they are in position to give their subscribers universal service.

In speaking with Mr. Johnson, he stated that the company would continue to improve the property and proposed to give the subscribers first-class service, and as the city grew they would enlarge and develop the business in keeping. The company will issue telephone directories in the near future and adopt other measures of making service more convenient and more to be appreciated.

McCulloch County Institute.

Programs are being issued this week for the McCulloch County Teachers' institute, which will be in session next month. The institute opens Monday, October 7th and will be in session five days, closing Friday afternoon. An interesting program has been prepared and a large attendance is anticipated.

W. C. Beach Dead.

The following item clipped from "Engineering News" will be of interest to Standard readers:

"W. C. Beach, chief engineer of construction of the Rock Island lines, died in the Rock Island Passavant hospital at Chicago on August 24th while undergoing an operation for appendicitis."

Mr. Beach was formerly engineer in charge of construction of the Frisco extension here, and made many friends during his stay in Brady, all of whom will learn of his death with profound regret.

Paul Sheridan returned Monday from Burnet, where he had been taken sick, and the doctors have pronounced his illness as pneumonia, with just a bare escape from typhoid. At present he is resting easy, with a splendid chance for a speedy recovery.

VOLUNTARY BANKRUPTCY

NOBLE BROS. MAKE ASSIGNMENT THIS WEEK.

Assets More Than Cover Liabilities And Creditors Are Expected to Realize Dollar for Dollar.

A petition in voluntary bankruptcy will be filed today by Noble Bros. with the Referee in Bankruptcy at Austin, the liabilities being estimated at \$16,500, while the assets are placed at \$20,000.

The assets of the firm include the personal property of both Earnest and Elton Noble, some of which is exempt under the law, but do not include outlawed accounts, many of which will be collected, nor do they include interest upon any of the accounts or notes due the firm. The liabilities include all indebtedness of not only the firm but of the personal property of Earnest and Elton Noble.

With proper management it is confidently expected that the firm will be able to pay 100 cents upon the dollar.

The action of Noble Bros. in voluntarily making the assignment is a matter of regret to all Brady citizens. Both are splendid business men and are enterprising and hustling—in fact just such live wires as are needed in any community. As will be observed from their statement the business was in good shape, but like most every merchant in this section, collections have been slow during the past three years, and with the fourth short year at hand, making collections to any great extent an impossibility, they decided the best course of action would be to turn the business and their personal holdings over to their creditors.

While neither have made any definite plans for the future, Mr. Earnest Noble will probably enjoy a much needed rest for the next several months, his health having been bad

for some time. Elton Noble has several propositions under contemplation but has not decided upon any of them.

Commissioners Court.

Commissioners court has been busily grinding this week, their chief and most enduring task having been the examination of the tax rolls. This arduous task was finished yesterday evening.

Aside from this the commissioners have allowed a number of accounts, and passed several orders. They also declared the Stacy school election for \$4800 school bonds having lost by a vote of 23 to 22.

COMMERCIAL CORNER

By the Secretary.

We wish to call the attention of our farmers to the importance of trying a small acreage of land under the direction of our county demonstrator, Mr. J. W. Griffin. Try it for the coming season and you will be glad of the opportunity of this Federal aid. Mr. Griffin has had one year's experience in this county and far better understands conditions than a year ago. Of course, it is very dry at this time and times are not the least flattering, but these are the very times when we should do extra work and do our utmost to bring about the best results possible.

Some time during the month of October or the first of November the premiums offered through the merchants and others published in this paper some time ago will be given to those who may successfully compete for them. The list, as published then, will be altered some and others added for farm, orchard and field products. When the list has been revised and published, a sufficient list of instructions will also be published.

The principal of the high school has taken charge of the weather bureau, rain gauge, thermometers, flag pole, etc., and will make regular reports to the government. Prof. Wallace, with the pupils of that grade, will be able, in a short time, to give the U. S. weather signals and display from the flag pole the daily forecasts. It will possibly be a week before complete arrangements can be made. When these are all perfected, watch the flag pole on the very top of the high school building. In this connection, we wish to thank the trustees for the kindly help given in this matter.

COMMERCIAL CORNER

By the Secretary.

We wish to call the attention of our farmers to the importance of trying a small acreage of land under the direction of our county demonstrator, Mr. J. W. Griffin. Try it for the coming season and you will be glad of the opportunity of this Federal aid. Mr. Griffin has had one year's experience in this county and far better understands conditions than a year ago. Of course, it is very dry at this time and times are not the least flattering, but these are the very times when we should do extra work and do our utmost to bring about the best results possible.

Some time during the month of October or the first of November the premiums offered through the merchants and others published in this paper some time ago will be given to those who may successfully compete for them. The list, as published then, will be altered some and others added for farm, orchard and field products. When the list has been revised and published, a sufficient list of instructions will also be published.

The principal of the high school has taken charge of the weather bureau, rain gauge, thermometers, flag pole, etc., and will make regular reports to the government. Prof. Wallace, with the pupils of that grade, will be able, in a short time, to give the U. S. weather signals and display from the flag pole the daily forecasts. It will possibly be a week before complete arrangements can be made. When these are all perfected, watch the flag pole on the very top of the high school building. In this connection, we wish to thank the trustees for the kindly help given in this matter.

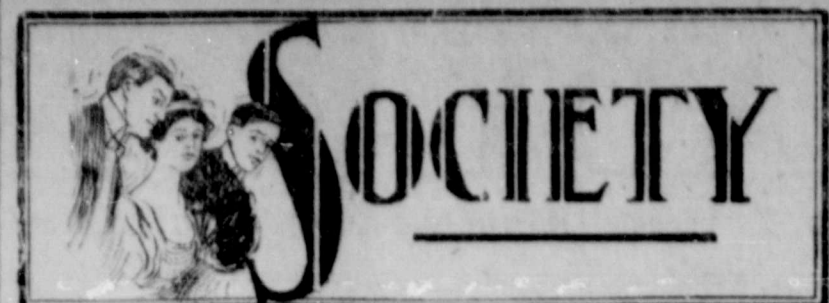

W. R. Rice is one of the liveliest agriculturists in McCulloch county, and believes in mixing brains with his brawn. The result is that "Uncle Billie" can usually "show" folks who are from Missouri. At present he is advocating the sowing of winter wheat and oats, which will not only give good grazing during the winter, but in the spring can be turned under for fertilizer. Not only is the soil conserved by this fertilization, but the land will hold moisture better and longer—and he clinches this argument by calling attention to the fact that the sod land holds the moisture much longer and produces better than does land that has been in cultivation for a number of years.

Mr. Rice is setting the example for other progressive farmers by putting his land in oats and wheat as rapidly as possible and figures that he is making at least \$8.00 an acre in this manner—the pastureage being worth \$3.00 per acre, and the fertilization and consequent increase in crops at least \$5.00 per acre.
