### SCHOOL BONDS TURNED DOWN.

Judge Russell and W. E. Mayes returned last week, from Austin, where they went with the Baird School Bonds for the Attorney General's approval. The Attorney General, as we feared he would do, after learning his decision in the Victoria School Bond case refused to approve the bonds on the ground that the Baird Independent District was unconstitutional. In the opinion of the Attorney General, no independent school district can include an incorporated city in its limits as the Baird district did. In other words we organized, we labor attempted to organize, and Independent School District five miles square, including the city of Baird, which is incorporated as a city and has issued \$10,000 worth of water bonds.

This leaves us in a muddle on the school question, and like a famous populist congressman once said, "We don't know where we are at." We have a school district four miles square, that is we suppose we have, provided all we have done in attempting to organize an other district is illegal. The School Board should have the matter investigated and find out "where we are at" if possible before we go any farther.

The new school house, site and all

has been settled by the attorney general's knock out blow on the bonds. The only thing now is for us to repair the old school house the best we can and go ahead. County Judge Russell says the Trustees can use part or all of the special school tax for repairing the school building and probably this is the best and fairest way to do it.

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HOOD'S SOLDIERS.

The Brigade Holds Its Annual Session in City of Palestine.

Palestine, Tex., June 25.—Hood's brigade reunion opened in this city Wednesday. The veterans assembled at the city hall auditorium, and Capt. J. T. Hunter, the chairman, called the assembly to order.

The roll call was read by H. M. Hinkle, to which over sixty veterans answered present. The reading of the minutes of the last meeting was then in order.

Mrs. Bush of Hintonville professed the gavel, which was presented to the J. B. Gordon camp, No. 239, United Daughters of the Confederacy of that city, and which was made from a very historic piece of wood.

Dr. Hill who has charge of the Confederate home at Austin, addressed the reunion in the interest of the home. He said there are 248 inmates in the home and the hospital has forty-eight patients in it.

The veterans formed in line and marched to Burkitt's hall, on Mars street, where a big dinner was served to them by the Daughters of the Confederacy.

The afternoon session was rather short and comprised mainly the reading of communications. Comrade Jung, upon invitation, read a communication from Camp Longstreet at Forts, inviting the members to meet there.

Mr. Young then put Galveston in nomination, stating that Col. Rogers would turn Galveston over to the veterans.

A communication from George T. Todd was read before the meeting, stating his regret at his inability to attend, and advising that the next meeting be held at Tyler.

A letter from Val C. Judd of Austin, asking for information concerning a sword with the name of C. P. Blackman engraved on it, and claimed to have been captured during the war, was then read before the reunion.
