TAKEN TO TEXAS CITY.

Deserter From U. S. Army Returned to Headquarters.

Corporal P. Daly of the 27th Infantry arrived in the city Sunday afternoon to take charge of William Thomas, the young man who was arrested at Rochelle a week ago last Sunday, and who later plead guilty to a charge of theft in county court in connection with the loss of a suit case containing a quantity of clothing belonging to R. H. Walker, a member of the Dyer Amusement Co.'s carnival attractions.

Young Thomas' sentence on the theft charge expired yesterday, and he was turned over to Corporal Daly, who left with his prisoner on the 11:40 Santa Fe for Texas City, where his regiment is stationed, and where Thomas will undergo trial by courtmartial for desertion.

According to Corporal Daly, Thomas deserted after only a month's service, having enlisted at Columbus Barracks in Ohio about three months ago.

Upon his return to division headquarters at Texas City, the prisoner will be tried by courtmartial. The maximum penalty for desertion in the army in time of peace is eighteen months confinement in military prison at hard labor.

Deputy Sheriff John Martin accompanied Daly and his prisoner to Texas City to claim the reward of \$50 which is offered for the capture of deserters.

DIED IN SAN ANGELO.

Mrs. Johnnie O'Bryan Succumbs To Brights Disease.

Mrs. Dixie O'Bryan, wife of Johnnie O'Bryan, and a daughter of Mrs. Alice McGrew, one of the pioneer settlers of this county, died Saturday night at 10:00 o'clock in a sanitarium at San Angelo, where she has been under treatment for Brights disease for the past several days.

Mrs. O'Bryan had been a sufferer from the disease for the past several years, and in company with her husband, has traveled all over the southern and western portion of the United States during the past few years, as well as undergoing treatment by the most noted specialists of the country in an effort to affect a cure. Up to a few weeks ago she was thought to be improving somewhat, and when here about three weeks ago on a visit to relatives, the improvement in her general health was a source of gratification to the many friends. Shortly after leaving here, however, for San Angelo, her condition became alarming and she was removed to the sanitarium for treatment, and she grew gradually weaker until the end came, as stated above, Saturday night.

Mrs. O'Bryan was known to practically everyone in Brady, having been reared to young womanhood here. She was a daughter of the late R. W. McGrew, one of the pioneer settlers of the county, who died several years ago. She was born in Matagorda county, Texas, November 29, 1865, and was, therefore 48 years, 8 months and 16 days of age at the time of her death. She was married August 13, 1889, to Mr. O'Bryan, and since their marriage have made their home in various portions of the United States, living for a time in San Antonio and also in California.

The body arrived here yesterday morning at 9:00 o'clock from San Angelo and was conveyed to the residence of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Duke, uncle and aunt of the deceased, where the funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock in the presence of an immense concourse of sorrowing friends and heart-broken relatives, Rev. Father F. X. Gagnon of the Catholic church being in charge.

Surviving Mrs. O'Bryan are her husband, mother, Mrs. Alice McGrew, and three sisters—Mesdames S. W. Espy, Brady, Sam Jones, Mayer, and J. G. Simpson of Kimble county.

The child fell on his head on a sharp rock, cutting a blood vessel on the forehead. The wound bled profusely, and considerable difficulty was experienced in stopping the flow.

At last reports the victim was doing as well as could be expected.

MASS MEETING SATURDAY.

Conference Between Farmers and Business Men to be Held.

On account of a feeling of uneasiness being evidenced by the farmers of the county with reference to the availability of a sufficient number of laborers to gather the cotton crop, a number of local citizens have called a meeting of the farmers and business men for 2:00 o'clock next Saturday afternoon at the court house.

The business men of the city feel justified in calling for the meeting, from the fact that a report has become current that farmers in some sections of the county are now offering as much as \$1.00 per hundred to cotton pickers, and that with market conditions prevailing at this time such a price is impossible. There also seems to be a feeling among the farmers that pickers will be very scarce, when, in all probability, the opposite will be true. For the past two or three weeks Mexicans have been pouring into the county from all directions, and it is a conservative estimate that at least 250 have come in during this time.

The local Commercial club, through Secretary T. P. Grant, has taken up the matter of securing cotton pickers for the farmers, and have received assurances from a number of employment agencies in different sections of the state that they could supply all that was needed. Mayor A. C. Baze is also in receipt of a letter from Mayor A. P. Woolridge of Austin, to whom he wrote several days ago regarding laborers, in which he states that his letter asking for help has been published in the Austin papers, and that he is sure that a large number of pickers could be secured from that place. Mr. Baze also received letters from two large employment agencies, in which it was stated that they could contract for as many as 1500 hands to be delivered here.

The Commercial club recently sent advertisements for pickers to newspapers in Del Rio, Houston, Brownsville, San Antonio, Taylor and Navasota, in all of which localities is a large population composed of negroes and Mexicans, and as the cotton crops are said to be very light this year in these places it is reasonably certain that more help than will be needed can be secured.

Another object of the meeting called for Saturday is to make some arrangement for the marketing of the crop, which will begin to move within the next week or so. Since the closing of the exchanges in the North and East there has been no market quotations, and the price which the product will bring is a matter of speculation at this time. At the meeting some plan will be evolved by which the situation will be relieved to a large degree, although definite steps in this direction have been suggested as yet. Arrangements may be made for storing of the cotton in warehouses and issuing negotiable receipts against it if such a plan can be financed, and it is thought likely that this can be done through loans now being made by the Federal government to national banks of the Southern States.

At present the cotton situation is being taken care of in the southern portion of the state by three Japanese factors, who are buying all of the staple which is being offered. They are the only international factors who are prepared to keep the market open at this time, but in case Japan is drawn into the war in Europe, as now seems likely, this may cause the withdrawal of the only active buyers now in the market.

Considerable excitement was created in Melvin last Saturday by a Mexican by the name of Tucamacion Travino, who, it is charged was guilty of insulting conduct toward a number of ladies there.

Travino is said to have thrown kisses to ladies whom he met on the streets of the town Saturday and made himself obnoxious in other ways. For a time his conduct went unchallenged by anyone, and he soon decided that he was the bully of the town. He finally became so brazen that C. O. Robbins called him to account with a sharp reprimand, whereupon he drew a large knife and attempted to assault Robbins.

Citizens phoned Sheriff Wall, who deputized J. B. Haynes to arrest the Mexican and bring him here to jail. He was brought in yesterday morning accompanied by ten or twelve other Mexican friends from Melvin, and arraigned before County Judge Harvey Walker on a charge of aggravated assault. He agreed to plead guilty if the charge was reduced to an affray and this was done.

His punishment was assessed at a fine of \$5.00 and costs, totaling \$30.80, which he promptly paid and was released.

Banks to Receive Funds.

Word has been received from
Secretary of the Treasury, Mc-
Adoo by the National banks of
Fort Worth, that they would in
a few days receive their apportion-
ment of the crop-moving funds.

Texas Universities and Colleges.

Austin, Tex. Aug. 15—Fifteen
universities, colleges and tech-
nological schools are located in
Texas and the total annual re-
ceipts, exclusive of additions to
the endowments, of these insti-
tutions is \$1,758,000. These Uni-
versities employ 631 professors
and instructors and the number
of students enrolled during the
school year 1913 was 6,959, di-
vided 4,363 males and 2,596 fe-
males. Of these students 1,753
took preparatory courses, 5,124
collegiate and 82 were resident
graduates.

In the entire United States
there are 595 universities, col-
leges and technological schools.
Pennsylvania leads all other
states with a total of 42.

Bad Month For Road Bonds.

Fort Worth, Tex. Aug. 10—
According to a report issued by
the Texas Business Men's Asso-
ciation, July was an exceedingly
bad month for good road bonds
in Texas, only three having been
voted during that period.

This is the smallest number
of highway bond elections held
in this state in any one month,
and is also the lowest amount
authorized since June, 1913,
when only \$75,000 were issued.

Two issues carried, one in
Electra Precinct of Wichita
county, July 7th, for \$125,000,
and a \$10,000 bridge bond issue
was ratified in Lampasas county
July 18th by a handsome major-
ity. The unsuccessful issue was
conducted in the Denton Pre-
cinct of Denton county, July
18th, and entailed highway con-
struction bonds aggregating
\$300,000, which is more than
twice the amount of road bonds
authorized in July.

The lack of interest in good
road work last month and the
small number of elections or-
dered during that time is said
to be largely due to the enthu-
siasm manifested in the state
and county primary elections.

A New Invention.

J. D. Polk, a brother of E. E.
Polk of this city, is here this
week demonstrating a new oil
burner for cook and heating
stoves.

The burner is known as the
Detroit Hydro-Carbon burner,
and is one of the best, if not
the very best, yet put out. One
of the best points about the in-
vention is its simplicity and
safety. Ordinary coal oil is used
and the burner is constructed
almost wholly of ordinary iron
pipe, the size of the pipe de-
pending on the amount of heat
required. For the stove of ordi-
nary size one-eighth inch pipe
is used, and furnishes all the
heat desired.

The burner can be attached
to any stove, either wood or
coal, and can be operated at full
blast for six hours on one gal-
lon of oil. The heat from the
burner may be deflected in any
direction by means of metal de-
flectors.

plest and best ever seen here,
as well as being inexpensive.

The first city in Texas to
adopt the city manager plan of
municipal government was Ter-
rell.

cotton compress, five cotton gins,
flour mill, ice factory, woman's
wearing apparel factory, two
soda water bottling plants, one

FIRE PREVENTION.

By S. W. English, Austin, Texas, State Fire Marshal.



Fire insurance is not a demonstration of the truth that every man is his brother's keeper.

Fire insurance rates are not haphazard guesses. They do not grow by chance. They are not increased through design. They are not lowered without justification.

Every fire is a tax upon every dollar's worth of property. It is a mistake to think fire insurance companies pay the losses, just like it is a mistake to think the state treasurer pays state warrants. Fire insurance companies are but disbursing agencies, just like the state treasurer is the disbursing officer of Texas.

Every time you hear a fire whistle blow, or the fire bell ring, or see the fire wagon go rushing by, it means that you will have to meet another levy to pay your part of the tax the fire lays on you. The fact this tax is an indirect one may not cause you to feel keenly its payment. But you pay it just the same. And it is this anaesthetic application of indirectness that permits about 90 per cent of the fires of today to take place.

TYPHOID FEVER.

By Ralph Steiner, Austin, State Health Officer.

CAUSE

But one germ can cause typhoid fever, and that is the typhoid bacillus. Before it can produce the disease it must be swallowed into the stomach and pass the intestines. Every person who contracts typhoid fever has previously swallowed unwholesome food or water. The typhoid germ is carried by the fly, and unsanitary conditions are its direct cause.

PREVENTION

Do not let sewage mix with surface soil or seep into wells, springs, creeks or rivers. Screen all houses, out-houses and stables. Keep stables and barns free from manure.

Vaccination will absolutely prevent typhoid fever and the practice is safe, simple and sane.

The European situation has caused much unrest to the cotton growers of the state, and the Dallas Chamber of Commerce has called a meeting to consider plans for a marketing system whereby the producer can either dispose of his staple at a normal price, or hold it for a twelve months period without a loss.

Texas has Two Reform Schools.

Gatesvill, Texas, Aug. 11—Forty of the forty-nine states in the Union maintain reform schools for juvenile criminals and Texas has two of these institutions. In the United States there are 111 of these schools. The number of inmates in Texas reformatories is 842, while the total for the United States is 50,812. New York has 13 reform schools which contain 9,467 inmates and leads all other states in these respects. The foregoing facts and other interesting data are contained in a report which has just been issued by the National Department of Education at Washington.

Few Paupers in Texas.

Austin, Tex. Aug. 10—There are 861 paupers in Texas alms houses, according to a report recently issued by the United States Census Bureau. Of this number 475 are native whites, 161 are foreign born whites, 215 are colored and 10 are white persons whose nativity is unknown.

The ratio of paupers per 100,000 population in Texas is 22 and population in Texas is 22, and 91 per 100,000 population in the United States. Although Texas ranks fifth with other states in total population, there are twenty states that have more paupers in their alms houses than Texas.

Thirty-one per cent of the foreign born white paupers in Texas alms houses were born in Germany and 25 per cent in Ireland.

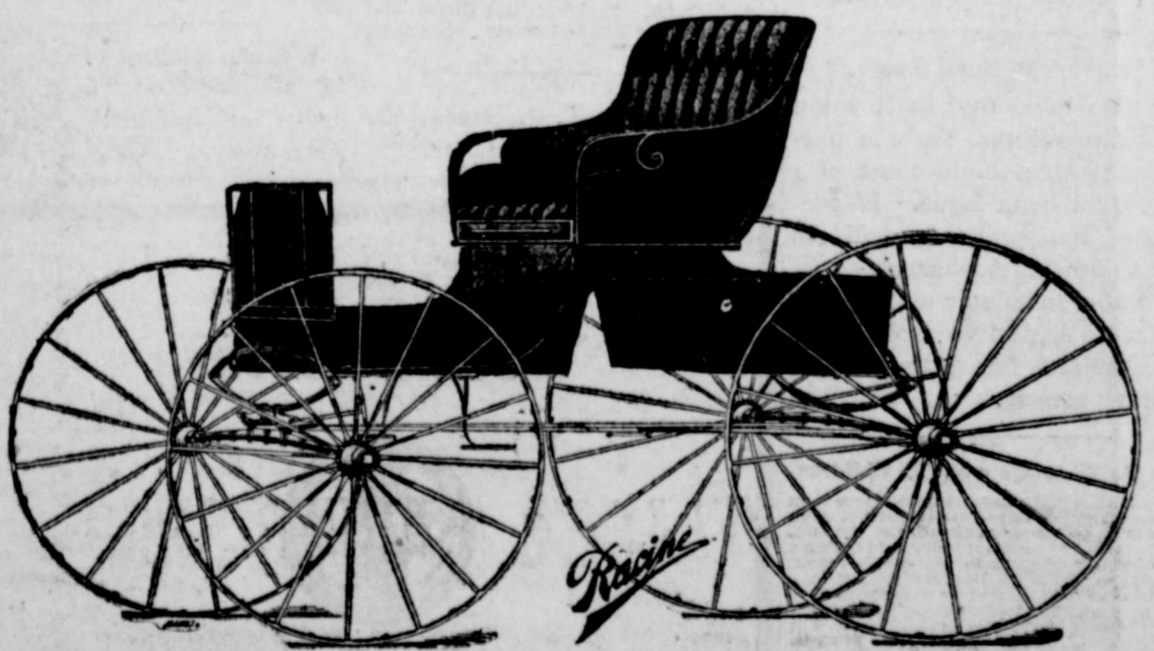
