RANCHMAN IS MURDERED

John H. Bryson Shot and Instantly Killed While Asleep at the Home of His Son, Charles Bryson, Near Millersview

News of the murder of John H. Bryson, which occurred at 12:10 o'clock Saturday morning at his Concho county ranch, near Millersview, reached here at an early hour Saturday morning in a telephone message to A. N. Bryson, a brother of the dead man.

Mr. Bryson left immediately for the scene of the tragedy.

The whole affair surrounding the tragic death of Mr. Bryson seems shrouded in mystery, and up to a late hour yesterday afternoon no clue whatever as to the identity of the midnight assassin or assassins had been unearthed by the Concho county officials, although Sheriff W. Puett, his corps of deputies and District Attorney Walter U. Early have been busily engaged on the case since the tragedy occurred.

The dead man was a resident of Comanche, where he owns a 30,000-acre ranch and a vast amount of other property, in addition to his 40,000-acre Concho county ranch. In company with Pierce Burns of Comanche, he went to the ranch near Millersview Friday to round up and ship a bunch of 1200 steers he had sold. His son, Charles, and family occupy the ranch house, and another son, Will Bryson, also makes his home on the ranch. On Friday night the elder Bryson, Mr. Burns, Will Martin and Will Stewart, the two latter of whom are employed on the ranch, occupied the same room, while Charles Bryson and family slept in another portion of the house.

After the four men had retired for the night the son came into the room and sat down on the edge of the bed and talked to his father until after 11:00 o'clock about affairs in connection with the management of the ranch. A short time after he retired he was awakened by his wife, who called to him to get the baby a drink of water. While he was up his dogs began barking, and created such a noise that he stepped to the door and spoke to them and then returned to bed.

About thirty minutes later the three men in the room with Mr. Bryson were awakened by three shots fired in rapid succession and on lighting a lamp found Mr. Bryson breathing his last, with three bullet holes in the left side of his head and three exploded shells from an automatic pistol lying on the floor near the door leading into the room. All three men claim to have heard the door slam after the firing of the fatal shots and Mr. Burns stated that he saw the head and shoulders of the man who committed the murder as he passed by a window near the bed on which he and Mr. Bryson were sleeping.

Examination of the ground Saturday morning, however, showed that all traces of foot prints had been obliterated by a shower of rain which fell shortly after the commission of the crime, and the only clue left on which the officers may ferret out the guilty ones is the shells

from the automatic with which the fatal shots were fired.

All three of the shots took effect, and all lodged within a radius of three or four inches, passing entirely through the head and imbedding themselves in the bedclothing.

Mr. Bryson was 63 years of age and is survived by his wife and ten children, in addition to several brothers and sisters. He had been a resident of Comanche county for forty years, starting as a poor boy and accumulating an independent fortune by thrift and energy. His first employment was building stone fences, grubbing land and similar laborious work, and at the time of death his wealth is estimated at more than \$1,000,000, consisting of ranch lands, cattle, oil mill and bank stocks and various real estate holdings in different sections of the state.

He was well known to many Brady and McCulloch county citizens, having been prominently identified with the cattle interests of this section of the state for the past thirty years or more and has visited here many times.

The remains were shipped to Comanche Saturday and interred yesterday in the cemetery at that place under auspices of the Masonic fraternity, of which he had been a member for many years.

CHARGED WITH ABDUCTION

Arthur McCann Arrested Yesterday—Released on Bond.

Quite a little excitement was occasioned late yesterday afternoon at the court house when the irate parents of a recent bride took bodily possession of the young lady and swore out a warrant for the arrest of the youthful husband on a charge of abduction.

The trouble originated with the marriage last week of Arthur McCann and a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Mooring. The parents claim that their daughter is only 13 years of age. They sought to separate the couple Saturday, but their efforts in this direction proved futile, but yesterday afternoon, while the young husband was down town they went to his home and secured possession of their daughter and then swore out a warrant for the arrest of McCann on the abduction charge.

McCann was immediately released from custody on a \$500 bond, with C. R. Alexander, Jim Conner and T. J. McAfee as sureties. An examining trial has been set for 10:00 o'clock this morning in Justice of the Peace T. J. King's court.

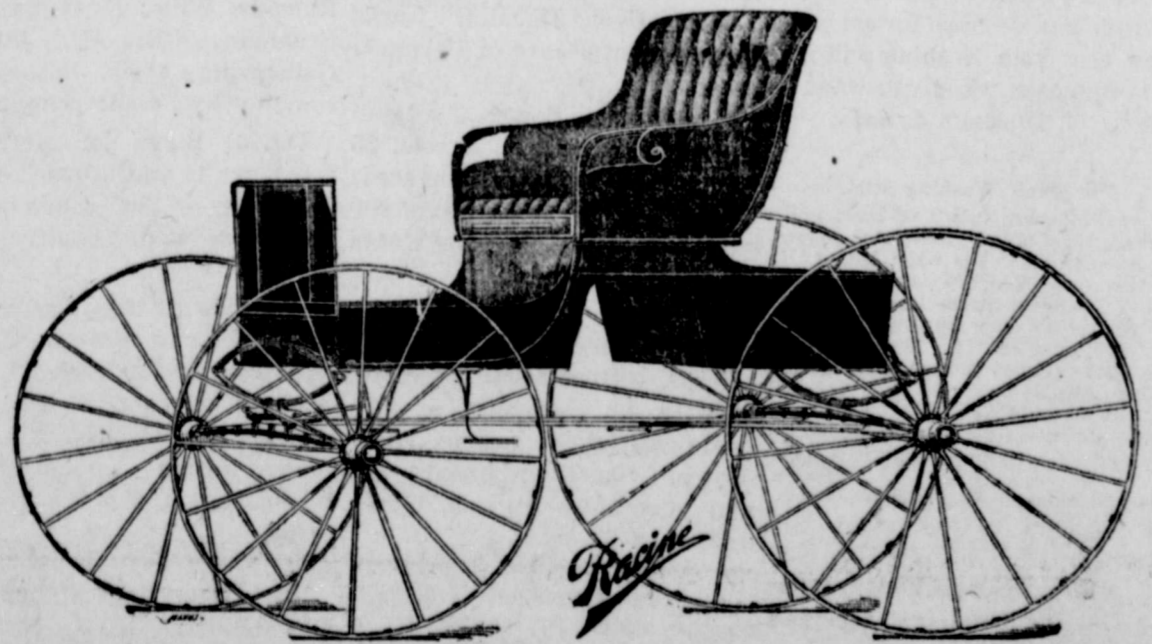

CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING

Bringing Buyer and Seller Together

The farmers and producers of this state have realized the advantages to be gained by co-operating with the Warehouse and Marketing department of Texas, says a recent bulletin.

For the information of Standard readers we will say that the Warehouse and Marketing department is under the direct supervision of Gov. Jas E. Ferguson, John S. Patterson, commissioner of insurance and banking; Fred W. Davis, commissioner of agriculture, the latter of whom is chairman of the board. The managers are F. C. Weinert and Peter Radford.

The suggestion is made that the secretaries of the different organizations notify their members to list their products with them direct, and not to the Austin department office, as soon as the department sends out bulletins he should go over the products for sale and wanted by his members and place them in direct communication with the parties wanting to buy or sell.

As soon as items of produce, for instance, say a car of oats, is sent to consignee secretaries are requested to notify the department at Austin, as items will not be carried indefinitely, and if the department should drop items which it is desirable to be carried longer, the same will be re-inserted for another period by the department.
