SHOWS IF LIVER OR State fire insurance BOARD ALLOWS 3 e.

Brady's Key Rate Now 42c-Er ror in Proper Credit is Corrected by the Board.

Mayor A. C. Baze, as well a he local fire insurance agenies, are in receipt of advice rom the state fire Insurance oard that Brady's key rate has f 45 c , as first announced This additional credit results rom the previous charge 55. deficiency on police ser ice under the old system but one police officer, being cor rected to $25 \%$ deficiency as the result of Brady now having three police officers. This point was overlooked by the board when the key rate of 45 c was irst given Brady, and the corection was promptly made when attention was called to the error.
It now develops that another
obtainable providing $75 \%$ of the water service is metered, and this is probably the next point the city officials will take up for action in an endeavor to secure still further reduc-
tion in the key rate. tion in the key rate.
As the figures now stand
Brady has as low, if not the Brady has as low, if not the lowest, key rate of any city or
town in this section of Texas.
