METEOR MAKES SURPRISE VISIT HERE MON. NIGHT

Brady and McCulloch county citizens witnessed an unusual and wonderful spectacle Monday night about 10:30 o'clock, when a brilliant meteor flashed across the firmament, and for a few seconds lit up the earth almost bright as day. The phenomenon was witnessed by many Brady folks, numbers of whom were returning home from the show, while others had not yet retired.

So brilliant was the glare of the meteor that electric lights were totally eclipsed, and while the night was partially moon-lit, yet the brilliance of the visitor was undiminished.

The meteor followed a course from the northeast to the southwest, and within a minute or so after being seen here there was a dull roar or rumbling, indicating that it had struck the earth or had exploded. No trace of it has been reported to date, however.

Many are the tales told in connection with the meteor's visit. In the negro quarters, consternation reigned supreme, and it was the universal opinion that the end of the world had come.

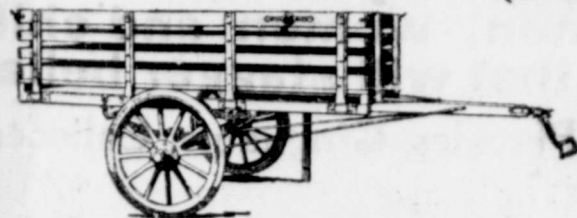

ladies called to mind almost forgotten prayers. Some thought the moon had fallen, and others ascribed it all to an earthquake.

This latter opinion was probably caused by the fact that the dull roar or rumbling noise that followed the meteor rattled windows and dishes.

Immediately following the appearance here long distance calls were had from Waco and San Antonio, at both of which places the meteor had been seen, although neither had heard the big noise that had accompanied its flight across the heavens. Both places inquired as to where the meteor had fallen. Junction, Menard and San Angelo all saw the meteor, but it did not appear to have passed over any of the three. This would have the impression that it had fallen somewhere east of Junction, but apparently it has disappeared as mysteriously as it came. One of the most reasonable theories is advanced by J. V. Ewing who reports that his daughter and another girl were returning from town when they observed the meteor. They assert that it ap-

peared to burst into pieces just before the rumbling noise was heard.

Some boys who were down town say that at first the meteor looked like an electric light, but that as it came closer, the glare blinded them so they could not tell what became of it.

The fact that it was seen but not heard at Waco and San Antonio would indicate that it was much nearer the earth here—and possibly some future day will disclose its resting place.

LATER—J. F. Tindel was in town yesterday evening exhibiting hunks of a mineral substance looking something like copper, which he had found about ten miles out on the London road, and which he believed was part of the meteor.

Compulsory School Attendance Law.

I deem it advisable to call attention of the public in general and the district school trustees in particular to the compulsory attendance law. The law affects all children who were eight years old and not over fourteen years old on the first day of September, 1917, except some exemptions.

The period of compulsory attendance for the school year 1917-18 is not less than eighty days. The period of compulsory school attendance at each school shall begin at the opening of the school term, unless otherwise authorized by the district school trustees prior to the beginning of such school term; provided that no child shall be required

to attend school for a longer period than the maximum term of the public school in the district where such child resides.

If the beginning of the compulsory school attendance period be changed from the opening of the school term, notice thereof shall be posted on the school house door of the district, delivered to the county superintendent and published in the local papers if there be any, prior to the opening day of the school term. In some districts in this county where schools have already opened this is impossible. In this event I advise that the above mentioned notices be posted at once. It will be much better if all common school districts name the same day for the beginning of this period. I am offering a

suggestion, that the second Monday in November, be named as the time to begin the compulsory period.

Of course the trustees will understand that they may name any day that they care to just so it is in time to put in the full eighty days before the end of the school term. But I can see a decided advantage in having this date uniform in the common school districts of the county.

The trustees who will do this, please post these notices at once and file same with me.

2,498,381 BALES.

Ginned Up to September 25th is Report.

Washington, Oct. 2—Cotton ginned prior to September 25th, amounted to 2,498,381 bales, counting round as half bales, the census bureau today announced in its second ginning report of the season. Round bales included 60,904 and sea island 18,731.

Ginnings in Texas up to September 25th were 1,179,406 bales.

The total ginning figures compared with 4,081,989 bales, counting round as half bales, ginned to that date last year, and 2,903,829 bales in 1915. Corrected figures for the quantity ginned prior to September 1 were announced today as 615,597 bales.

\$8,724,601 VALUATION.

In Tax Rolls of County Assessor H. R. Hodges.

McCulloch county tax rolls as compiled by Tax Assessor H. R. Hodges show a gain of \$200,000 for this year over last year's rolls. The total assessments this year amounted to \$8,724,601, as compared with \$8,515,601 last year. The rolls were approved by the commissioners court at its last session, and have just returned from Austin with the approval and commendation of the state comptroller.

According to Mr. Hodges the gain in valuation may be ascribed chiefly to the increase in the number of automobiles now owned in the county, and also to the increased valuation placed upon all live stock.

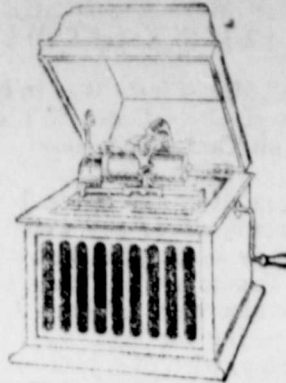

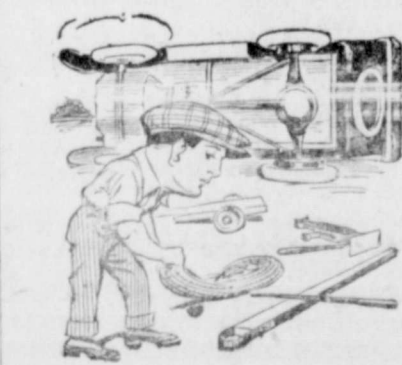
