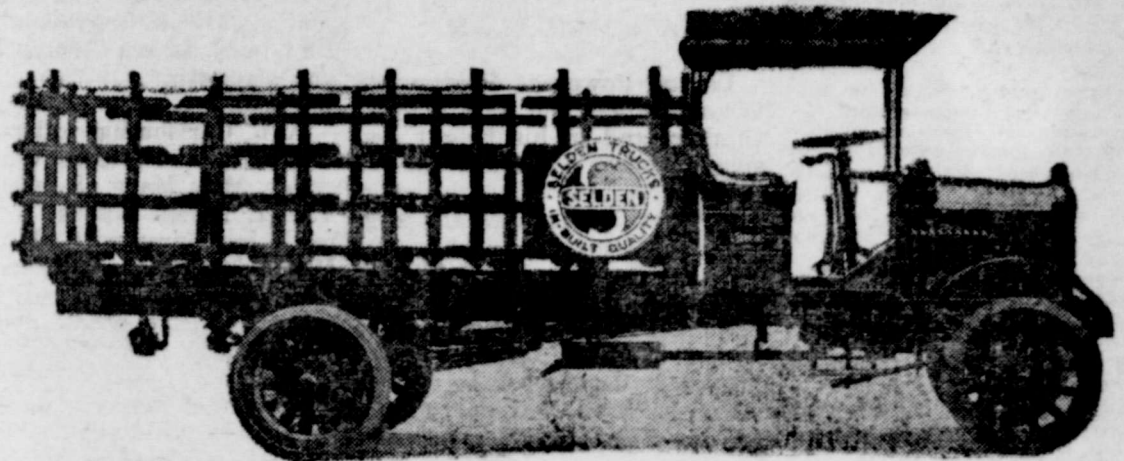
## WALNUT TIMBER FOR U. S. GOV'T NEW INDUSTRY

readers that there is such timber in McCulloch county, but on account of the fact that the walnuts are small in size and have but a tiny kernel, this product has heretofore escaped notice. The trees grow all along Katemcy creek, and are, in fact, the only trees of any size in that section.

The contract for the timber was made by a Menard man, who is selling the same to the U. S. government for use in the manufacture of gun stocks and airplanes. For the latter purpose it is said to be especially valuable, since the wood does not shatter when struck by a bullet. The fact that many of the trees are old and are broken does not seriously impair their value, as the timber can be used in short lengths, and all sound chunks are carefully gathered.

The purchase price of the timber is said to be \$18.00 per ft., which means that the owners of the land will derive a handsome income from the sale. The most difficult part of the task is the transporting of the timber. At present it is being hauled to the Frisco tracks beyond the stock pens, east of town, where it is loaded for transportation to the government factories.

## AUTOMOBILES MUST NOW CARRY NEW RED SEALS

Rigid enforcement of the new state highway law will begin within a few days, it is announced. The state highway department at Austin advises that the last shipment of seals, showing registration of cars, had been received at Austin, and by the first of this week these seals will be mailed to every automobile owner in the state who has registered his car with the state department. This means that every automobile owner without a red seal displayed on his car will be subject to arrest.

Final shipment of the number plates has not yet been received at Austin, but all numbers for cars registered from McCulloch county are now at hand. Brady citizens and those auto owners whose cars were registered at Brady, will find their numbers at the Brady Auto Co., the number plates having been received last Saturday.

## WAR CASUALTIES.

The National One Cent Letter Postage association.

Waco has joined the pro ranks having last Saturday voted dry. San Angelo is scheduled for an election on the question next Saturday, and several other of the so-called liquor strongholds are soon to be put to the fiery test—yea, even Fredericksburg is said to be preparing to get a mount on the water wagon. It is predicted by some that Texas will be dry within a year—and stranger things than that have already come to pass.

## POSTAGE RATES.

Next Friday is the day set for the increase in postage rates. On and after that day letter postage will be three cents instead of two cents as heretofore, and post cards will require two cents instead of one cent. All drop letters and letters for rural routes will require two cents in stamps.

Within the memory of most of us there has never been such an extraordinary thing as putting more than two cents on an ordinary letter, but these are extraordinary times, and all of us must aid the government in every way to increase its revenues; so we may as well, all of us, lick the extra stamp cheerfully, admire the peppermint flavor, and write as many letters as we can.

## WHAT NEWS?

What shall you send him when he's in training over there? A letter? By all means, that foremost and oftenest. And after that, what? Some foolish little knick-knack which is neither quite ornamental nor entirely serviceable? Or, when in doubt, will you take a lesson from what Richard Henry Dana wrote in "Two Years Before the Mast?"

"After all, there is nothing in a strange land like a newspaper from home. Even a letter, in many respects, is nothing in comparison with it. It carries you back to the spot better than anything else."

There is more in this today than Dana ever put there.—Collier's Weekly.

## DIFFERENT VIEWS.

Says a news item: "Alfredo de Oro, the three-cushion and pocket billiard expert, received notice that the government of the Island Republic of Cuba had voted him a pension of \$150 a month for the remainder of his life, because of the credit reflected by De Oro on his native country, both through skill as a player and by the high standard of personal conduct he had maintained in his profession.

In Cuba they vote 'em life pensions, while in Texas they vote 'em out of business. What a difference! But we fear we will have to admit that Texans do not always as carefully guard their conduct as De Oro as apparently done. There's another difference.

We wish that such aspirants wouldn't treat us that way and force us to carry about in our breast the secret that they are about to become a candidate. Our burdens become too heavy.—Comanche Chief.

## A NOVEL PLAN.

Parson Power at Brownwood is an original and an advanced thinker, and in his bright and spicy "Parson's Column" in the Brownwood Bulletin each Saturday he offers remarks and suggestions, some of which (note we said "some of which"—he said he wanted to preach our funeral sermon) are decidedly novel, if not entirely feasible, to say the least. Last week he offered the suggestion that every man exempted from military service, be made to live on soldier's pay and soldier's rations—giving all of the balance of his earning to the government in support of the prosecution of the war and the care of those who were enlisted in the service. A man in business should be allowed a reasonable per cent on his investment, according to The Parson's argumentation. He points out that at the end of the war it would leave the business man still with his business; while the man who enlisted in defense of his country and those who remained at home, even though he did not sacrifice his life upon the battlefield, would have to begin in business all over again, and therefore his sacrifice would have been by far the greater.

There is logic in the suggestion, revolutionary as it may appear. We "stay-at-homes" little realize and scarcely appreciate the sacrifices our soldiers are making—and are still to make—for us.

His many friends are pleased to see S. T. Ward able to be about once more. Mr. Ward has been layed up for the past several weeks, but is gradually getting back to his former health and strength.

A. R. Carlson has ordered The Standard sent to Mrs. Carlson's sister, Miss Mary Swenson at Taylor, Texas. Miss Swenson made her home with Mr. and Mrs. Carlson here for some time and retains great interest in McCulloch county people and happenings.

There's a new city secretary in Brady, and he is as husky a young man as might delight anyone's heart. He arrived last Thursday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Firman Jackson, which accounts for Mr. Jackson being one of the happiest and proudest men in town.

O. D. Mann & Sons are adding to the effectiveness of their big plate glass show windows by removing the dark wood background. The change not only gives additional light to the interior of the store, as well as a full view to passersby, but obviates the reflections which marred the clearness of the window displays.

W. W. Wilder, who has been at Camp Travis since the first of July engaged in his profession of carpenter, reports that as having been one of the busiest places he ever saw. There still remains quite a bit of work to be done, and Mr. Wilder expects to return there and continue his work. He reports that the government has acquired a big tract near Fort Sam Houston and that the houses heretofore located there, are being sold and moved off and that substantial officers quarters will soon be erected on the tract. At present there are 35,000 men at Camp Kelley, and 40,000 at Camp Travis.

The street committee of the Brady city council has caused black marks to be painted twenty feet from the corners on each side of the main streets in the business section of town. This line is to warn one and all against the hitching of teams or the parking of cars between this mark and the street corner, as prohibited in the ordinance recently passed by the city dads. This ordinance also provided for the parking of cars at an angle of 45 degrees, with the right front wheel not more than eighteen inches from the curb, and the citizens have already become so accustomed to parking their cars in the prescribed manner that with only an occasional exception the cars about town will be found lined up in uniform fashion.

## ROAD EXPERTS SAY OUR ROADS BEST IN STATE

Chas. Harrison, federal engineer, and Mr. Merriweather, the state engineer, spent part of the first of the week in McCulloch county going over the Puget Sound to the Gulf highway.

The party had started at Amarillo, and were logging the road for its entire length through the state. A committee composed of F. R. Wulff, C. A. Weise and H. C. Samuel met them at the county line upon their arrival Monday evening from Paint Rock, and the highway was logged, examined and checked as far as Melvin that evening. On Tuesday morning Messrs. G. C. Kirk and Wulff accompanied the road experts upon the completion of the inspection of the road as far as Brady. Tuesday afternoon was spent in making drawings, reports and estimates, and the filling out of blanks with the assistance of Postmaster Reagan. Wednesday morning a delegation composed of Messrs. Chas. Samuelson, R. L. Burns, C. A. Weise, A. J. Ricks and G. B. Awalt and Wulff escorted the visitors to the Mason county line where they were met by a delegation from Mason.

The engineers were highly pleased with the good road interest in McCulloch county, and they stated that Brady not only had the reputation far and wide of having the best roads, and the best good roads live wires of any county in the state, but that we are actually doing better work than any county in the state.

A letter received by Mr. Harrison from Capt. Fauntleroy, chief federal engineer for Texas said to tell the Brady folks that the federal government would match McCulloch county dollar for dollar as far as we might want to go in the good roads work. Capt. Fauntleroy visited in McCulloch county early in the year, at which time he arrived at his favorable opinion of McCulloch county and her citizens, and it was through this opinion that the generous offer of federal aid came to be made.

Both Messrs. Harrison and Merriweather were likewise enthusiastic. Mr. Harrison's home was at Baton Rouge, La., and until he came to Texas he said he had never heard of Brady or McCulloch county, and during the past five months in his travels about the state he had heard nothing else but McCulloch county and her good roads system.

They were particularly interested in a substance found all along their route, which they termed "chert," and which they declared the finest road-building material in the U. S. However they declared there was splendid road material on all of McCulloch's highways.

They stated that the Puget Sound to the Gulf highway will be the first official highway in this section to be improved, and that from the present rate of progress, McCulloch county would be the first to have the highway completed clear thru the county from one end to the other.

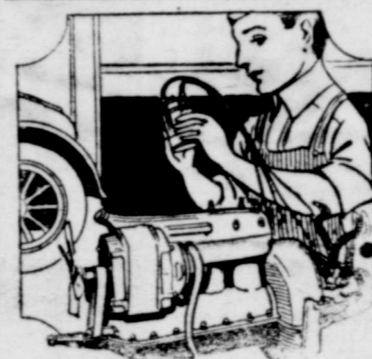

## FRENCH INDUSTRY IS RECOVERING

Natural Thrift and Economy Promise Rapid Progress

### EXPORT BUSINESS GROWING

Our Great Ally Possesses Recuperative Powers Which Justify Belief That She Will Meet and Solve Triumphantly the Problems Which Confront Her After the War.

With Paris boulevards echoing with "vives" for American troops our interest in the welfare of our ally vastly increases, and the facts are not lacking to encourage the belief that she is already on the road to recovery from the blow of invasion by a ruthless enemy.

One of the most important developments is the announcement that one of the largest banking institutions in America concerned with foreign trade, the Guaranty Trust company of New York, has opened a Paris branch to handle the rapidly increasing volume of French business.

This action may surprise many persons who had thought of France as bowed under a calamitous invasion. The bank, however, gives figures indicating that France is not only meeting her military and civilian problems with a stout heart and never failing courage, but is re-establishing her export business with this country.

In 1914, the year of the outbreak of the war, imports from France to this country totaled \$141,446,252. This total was reduced to \$77,158,740 in 1915, but last year the value of French imports to the United States rose to \$102,077,000.

"A nation that can achieve such a commercial recovery while her territory is being ravished by the invader," says the Trust company's statement, "possesses recuperative powers which justify the belief that she will emerge from the present conflict prepared to meet and solve triumphantly the problems which confront her."

The commercial and industrial record of France, following past wars, indicates that she should recover quickly from the actual physical destruction inflicted in the present conflict. The reconstruction of railroads, the erection of factories to replace those destroyed, and the replacement of the mechanism of industrial activity that will be required and that is in part already planned, offer a peculiarly inviting field to American capital and enterprise. Tentative steps have already been taken by representatives of American engineers and business men in this work.

Aside from its attractive business aspect, the enlistment of American money and effort in the great task of reconstruction that will remain at the end of the war will tend to cement still more closely the ties that bind the two great republics together, and will enable Americans to discharge in part the debt they owe to France for her friendly interest in the welfare and progress of the United States from the beginning of its life as a nation.

In judging the industrial status of any nation, its production and consumption of coal, iron, and steel and the growth of its transportation systems are highly significant factors.

In 1887 French industries consumed 21 million tons of coal, of which 13.5 million were taken from home mines. In 1912 the consumption was 61 million tons, of which 41 million tons were taken from home mines.

The French output of cast iron in 1912 was 80,000 tons, and of steel, 1,092,000 tons. In 1914, France produced 8,311,000 tons of cast iron and 4,635,000 tons of steel.

The increasing activity of her railway system is similarly demonstrable. In 1869, there were in France 26,743 miles of railway track; in 1912, there were 31,546 miles.

Between 1869 and 1912, inland navigation increased 150 per cent; while the traffic of her mercantile marine has amazingly expanded. The tonnage entering French ports in 1869 is set down as 11,000,000 tons. In 1912 this had been increased to 33,000,000 tons.

Leaders in American finance ascribe this solidarity of the French republic to three influences; first, a thoroughly sound banking system, centralized in one of the greatest banking institutions of the world, the Bank of France; second, the ingrained thrift and frugality of the French people as a whole, together with a national economic vigor not elsewhere surpassed; third, wise supervision, and patriotic co-operation by the government with banking and business interests.

The government does its part to warrant and retain the confidence of the holders of its securities. One of its wise policies is to impose new taxes to defray the interest charges on new security issues. It began this practice after the Franco-Prussian war, and is today following the same rule in regard to securities issued to finance the present conflict. This continuity of purpose, doubtless, will prove reassuring to all holders of French government securities.

The Franco-Prussian war of 1870-1871 taught the French people the meaning of thrift and economy. So well did they learn this lesson, that the whole sum of the indemnity demanded by Germany, \$1,000,000,000, was raised within the republic's confines by its own inhabitants and paid off more than one year before the time stipulated by the Germans.

The habit thus acquired has never been forgotten by the French, and today the aggregate number of investors purchasing the French war loans has reached the amazing total of 4,500,000 individual subscribers. Perhaps no other country, in proportion to its population, can make so good a showing.

France is particularly fortunate in that her small investors prefer "safe" investments rather than offerings which promise high returns. Government rents, in France are perpetual, and this characteristic seems to obtain for these government bonds increasing favor in the eyes of the French people.

The points of sympathy between France and America are too many to enumerate, but the spirit of liberty and its resultant democracy are, today as always, the major ideals of both nations. Seeking no victories but those of peace, no territory except their own, no sovereignty except sovereignty over themselves—the independence and equal rights of the weakest member of the family of nations are to the people of the United States and of France entitled to as much respect as those of the mightiest empire. In defense of these principles, France is engaged in a death struggle with militant autocracy and ruthless aggression, and it is not surprising to learn that she has loaned to her allies and to other friendly states 7,000,000,000 francs with which to further the cause of democracy. It is in keeping with America's traditions that since the date on which we formally allied ourselves with France and her allies in the great struggle, our government has lent to France \$370,000,000.

It is eminently fitting that America should now be fighting on French soil to make the world safe for democracy. The liberty that America has enjoyed for 140 years France helped her to achieve. The swords of Lafayette and Rochambeau, aided by the guns of De Grasse upon the high seas, assisted in cutting the foreign ties that bound the American colonies prior to the War for Independence, and from the private purse of King Louis himself came the first loan to America—unsecured and unconditional—to finance that historic undertaking. It was with entire justice that Washington wrote to Rochambeau, "To the generous aid of your nation and to the bravery of its sons is to be ascribed in a very great degree that independence for which we have fought."

## HOW DOES IT CONCERN ME?

A fair question, always. Let us think for a while how the War and the Liberty Loan concerns the farmer. Worse than that, if the Germans get over here, they will treat you in just the same way as they have the farmers of Northern France and Belgium. In these sections farm houses have been shot to pieces, crops wasted and burned; even fruit trees chopped down, the cattle stolen, the men sent into slavery to work for German masters, their women ill-treated in ways that cannot be talked of in print, their little children have had their hands chopped off in order that they may never fight for their country, or do any more useful work again.

You may say "such things will not happen here." They said this in France and in Belgium. Such things will happen here just as sure as you are alive, unless we smash the Germans so that they are utterly unable to reach the shores of this country. The German fleet and the German army will take just one week to get here if we are beaten. They have made up their minds that America shall pay for this war. They have made up their minds that our wealthy men shall give their money and that you farmers shall provide the food for their armies and their people at home.

After thinking over these facts, is there a farmer who will stand forward and say "This war does not concern me."

You have money that you do not need until next spring. Loan it to the government at good interest. When you want the money back again, you can borrow on your bond, or sell it for what you gave for it. Uncle Sam will take care of your money until you need it and pay you interest on it, and you will be protecting yourself and your business by loaning him the money.

Go and buy a Liberty Bond tomorrow. Don't put it off—things that are put off often do not get done at all. Tomorrow.

How does the war concern you? The mothers who have a boy who has gone to fight for his country, will not ask such a question. But if the war has not touched you yet, you may ask this question.

This other mother—the mother who has sent her boy to fight for YOUR protection, feels just the same way that you would about your boy.

She wants that boy back. Won't you help her bring him back? There are thousands of American mothers feeling badly today. Millions of French and English mothers, longing for their boys.

Husbands too, have gone by the million to fight for their Country and yours, for YOUR protection. Don't you sympathize with these women? Your husband is not perfect, sometimes you get "real mad" with him, but you don't want him killed by German brutes. Think, then, how these other wives feel—they want their husbands back. 

Four McCulloch County Negroes to Camp Travis Saturday.

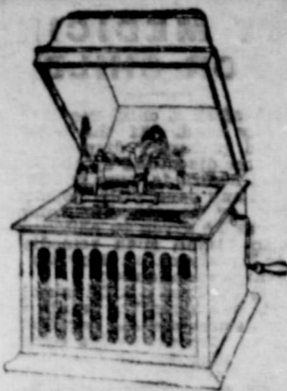

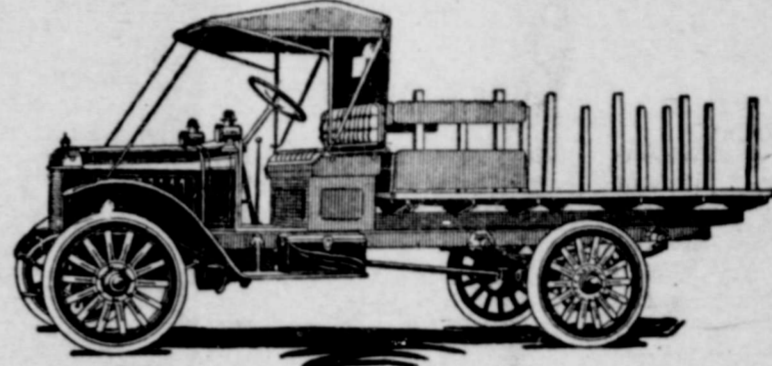

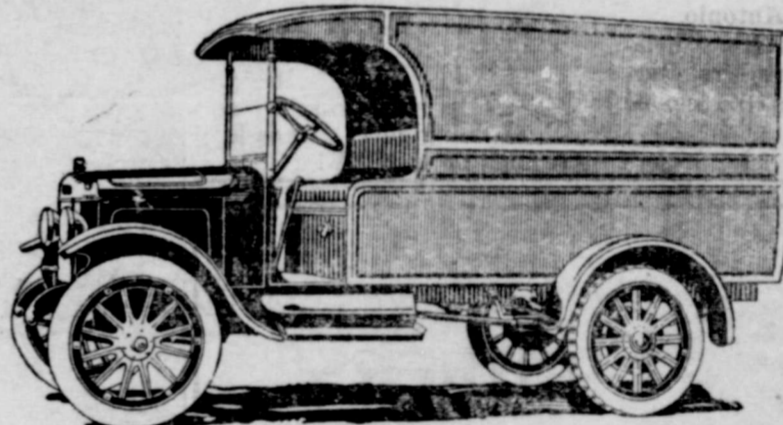
