
. R. STONE TO BE **CREDIT MAN FOR** WALKER-SMITH

WONDER WORDS.

Wonder, Oregon, Nov. 1, 1917.

No rain yet! Since May 13. When it comes to a long dry spell, we Oregonians have got you Texas skinned. But never mind, when it does get started it will make up for lost time, and if it rains for six months we ought to have a good season in the ground.

On account of the scarcity of feed nearly everybody is selling off their horses, cattle and hogs, for fear of another hard winter. Everything is extremely high

here including labor. The laborers complain that the price of labor has not advanced in pro-portion to that of the necessities of life. But the employer thinks wages are about as high

as he can afford to pay.

To give you an idea of wages in this country: I hired a man and boy with two horses and a wagon to haul wood for me, two days, and it cost me sixteen dollars. Eight dollars a day; for dollars for the team and boy and three for the man. I also hired a man with a four horse team to bring me a load of lumber from a sawmill a distance of one mile over a good road and he charged me fifteen dollars; when he was coming anyhow; if he had not brought the lumber.

Thousands of people at the factories are striking at a critical time like this, when they are getting five dollars for ten hours work. They demand the same wage and an eight hour







COULD STAMP OUT LEPROSY

Investigator of Opinion That Disease Might Be Eliminated From Ja-pan at Small Cost.

Japan has done much to fight the ravages of leprosy, but place to do much more in the way of furnishing hospitals for lepers. Leprosy for a long time has been considered hereditary by the Japanese, leading often to the rupture of marriage engagements, to divorces, and also to the complete disappearance from society of the afflicted man or woman. Doctor Koda, who is conducting an investigation declares that of 942 patients examined by him, only 255, or 27 per cent, have fellow sufferers in their own family. He believes that the disease is not hereditary in the sense that insanity is hereditary. It cannot, he says, skip a generation and appear in the grandchildren. He considers the shunning and isolation of leprous families unnecessary. Only the individual patients must be segregated, he believes. In Japan there are 23,800 lepers registered, but the families involved aggregate 990,000 persons. About 1 .-000 persons are now segregated. Doctor Koda declares it would cost only the price of a new battleship to inaugurate a thorough isolation policy, and thinks that in this way the disease could be stamped out, at least as a family curse, within twenty years.


