If you want to buy sugar now-a-days, you'll have to content yourself with just 50c worth, or, as sugar sells for 10c a pound, just five pounds at a time. The lid is on unrestricted sales, and five pounds at a time are deemed sufficient for actual and immediate needs. If you live farther from Brady than one mile, you can buy one additional pound for each mile you live from here, or from the point at which you do your trading.

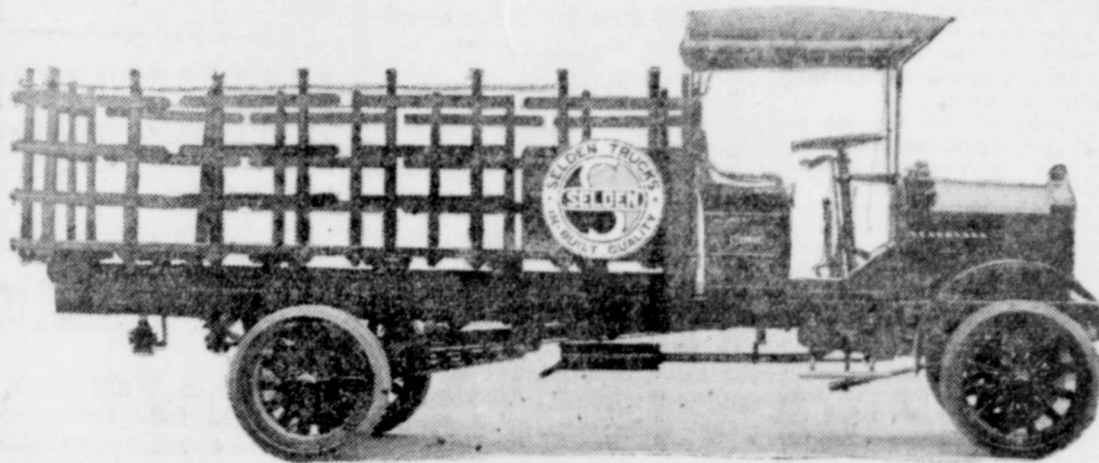

WILL ENFORCE NEW PARKING ORDINANCES MON.

Complaints were filed last week against a number of Brady autoists for violations of the new parking ordinances, and it looked for a time like each of the half-dozen or more defendants would have to pay a fine, which with costs would run up to about \$13.70. None of the defendants could plead ignorance of the new city law, as warning had been given, both by publication and in person to practically all autoists by the city marshal. However, several contended that they supposed the provisions of the ordinance applied only to the business section, and not to Blackburn street, and as all the complaints had been filed against parties whose cars were parked in front of the Lyric opera house on Blackburn, it was decided to dismiss the first cases, and give final warning. In this issue City Marshal Baker announces that on and after Monday, November 19th, the new law will be strictly

enforced, and all autos found incorrectly parked will result in complaint being filed against the owner.

For the benefit of those who may not be fully informed as to the new provisions, The Standard will give a brief synopsis of the same.

Automobiles must be parked at an angle of 45 degrees, with the right front wheel nearest and not more than 18 inches from the curb. No automobile must be parked or team hitched or vehicle left standing within 20 feet of any street corner. This applies to all down-town streets, and the length of Blackburn as far as Sixth street, or to the top of the hill. Other provisions of the ordinance require driving to the right and turning corners around the right hand side of all guide posts, and also prohibit the turning around in the middle of the block, or anywhere except on street intersections.

The new law was designed for the convenience and protection of autoists against congestion or blocking, and should be appreciated as such, and cheerfully complied with.

In extremely dry years it will pay the farmer to concentrate the rainfall, when the lay of the land will permit, on some portions of the farm, by causing the water to be drained that way and by terracing all lands that will stand for the terracing. This ten acres will make Mr. Haynes more than all his other 60 acres put together, and more than most hundred acres have made on any farm, that has not been terraced, this year. Think it over.

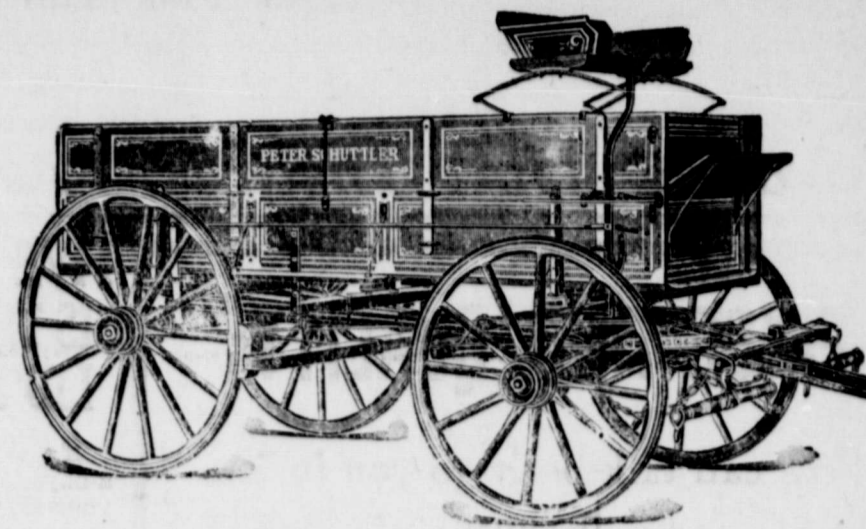

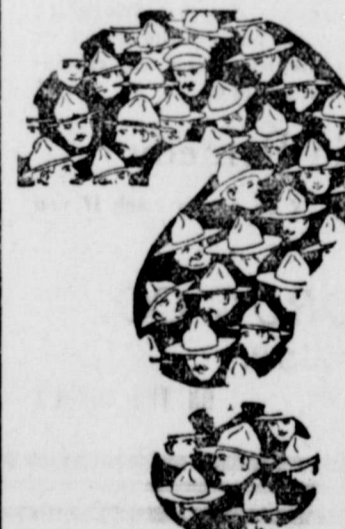

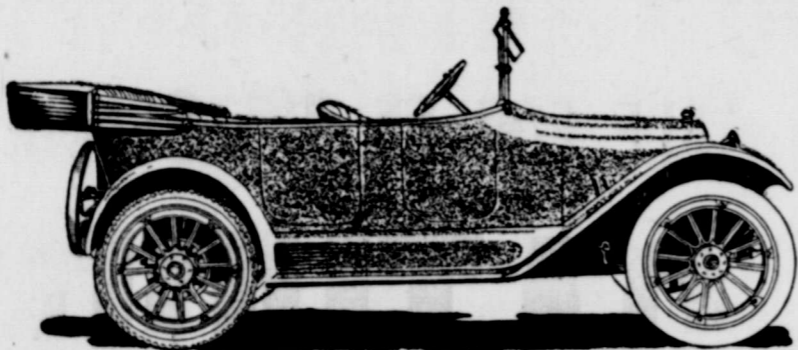

From a Soldier of the King.

The following is a somewhat interesting, if not extraordinary letter written by one of England's soldier boys to Mrs. C. S. Broad of this city, in which he acknowledges receipt of a letter from her, and also a box of candy. The lad, W. L. Donnelly, is a cousin of Mrs. J. V. Guyton of this city, and has seen quite a bit of active service, having been in the hospital upon some two or three occasions, and, at the time of writing the letter to Mrs. Broad he was convalescing from his most recent wounds. The following are extracts:

"A thousand thanks for your very kind letter received today. I was surprised at getting a letter from a total stranger, and appreciate your kindness all the more. The box of candy has not reached me yet, but I have had word it is in England and I may expect it any day now. It will be received with watery mouths, too."

"You see, I am still in the hospital—the fifth since coming

from France—and there are plenty of mouths aching for a munch at something. We will do the disappearing trick all right.

"I wonder if you have ever been in Scotland or Ireland? I know both places very well. In fact, I've been a Bohemian for years and have tramped, cycled or trained all over the British Isles—mostly by myself, worse luck. I am afraid all that is over as I am almost engaged to a lovely English lass—the only one in the world—you know the symptoms, eh!—if I come back from the Front alive, or not too knocked about—I mean, well, never mind—I hope to marry."

"Here I am talking away as if you were Cousin Mary—that reminds me, I don't believe I've told Cousin of my coming 'gagement."

"This is a letter, isn't it? You see, I can't tell you how things are over here, or the letter would not get through. By the way, would you ask Cousin if my letter of 17 pages reached her. I

am afraid the censor would not allow it to pass, as it contained too much news of my life in the trenches and my experiences of Red Cross work.

"Again thanking you, and wishing all at home a better winter than some I know will have."

A later letter reads in part:

"Eureka! The candy has arrived! I got it today and three of us started right away. It was so sweet, we all simultaneously conceived the idea of utilizing it for sweetening our teas. For, one result of the war is our taking tea with little or no sugar. But we found it melted like greased lightning in our mouths, with the result it's just on its last legs—by tonight it will have vanished completely. So we will have to continue drinking unsweetened tea. Talking of 'sugar' and sweet stuffs. An old dodge we have had in the trenches to sweeten tea, is to thoroughly mix the liquid in a jar that has once had jam in it—it both washes the jar and sweetens the beverage."

"So you see how we appreciate anything in the 'sweet line'—with nearly all the sugar gone or not arrived, whichever way you look at it—we are losing all these good things—in fact, have lost them. Oh, for a lump of currant cake! Well, we mustn't 'grouse'—we've still got the dear (aye, expensive) girls, and they are jolly good substitutes for sugar. Raving again!!!

"Well, there's nothing in this that is of military importance—unless it's the girls—so I hope you get it."

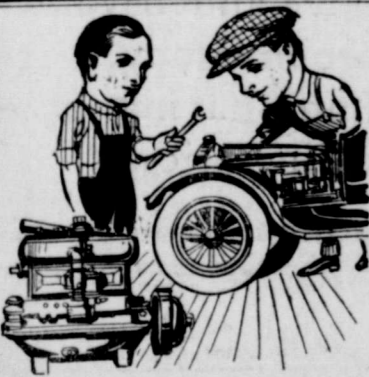
"Everything is going satisfactorily over here and we are all looking forward to the Sammies joining in the fray."

FEDERAL AID FOR DROUTH-STRIKEN CATTLEMEN

W. D. Crothers, county chairman of the Food administration department last week had a wire from District Chairman E. E. Kirkpatrick of Brownwood advising that Federal aid was assured to save the cattle in the drouth-stricken sections of West Texas. The information transmitted by Mr. Kirkpatrick came through E. A. Peden of Houston, state food administrator.

The text of Mr. Kirkpatrick's wire was as follows:
"The Federal Food administration is taking steps to relieve the conditions of the cattlemen in the drouth-stricken districts of West Texas. This office is working energetically in co-operation with Washington to bring about the much-needed relief. Please confer with the cattlemen, bankers and others and telegraph me here at your earliest convenience the number of tons of cottonseed cake or meal your county will need for shipment in November and December, stating separately the requirements for each month. Please write and wire me freely. To get quick results you might give wide publicity immediately to the substance of this telegram."

DYNAMITE FRISCO SAFE.

Robbers Make Good Haul at Brownwood Monday Morn.

Robbers made a good haul early Monday morning at Brownwood when they dynamited the Frisco safe. Local officers have been notified to look out for suspicious characters, but so far no clue has developed.

Concerning the robbery the Brownwood Bulletin says:

The safe in the office of the Frisco passenger station here was blown open with nitroglycerine at an early hour this morning and the burglars escaped with a large sum of money said to be several hundred dollars, and representing the sales of the office on Saturday night and Sunday.

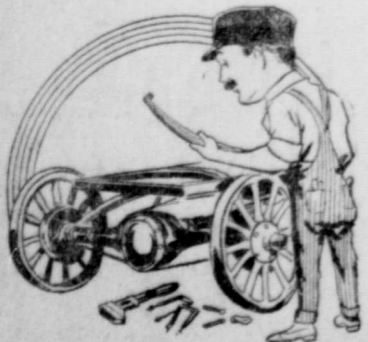

WAR TALKS

By **UNCLE DAN**

Number One

America Must Fight Hard or Germany May Win—Necessity for Military Training.

"Now, Billie," said his mother, "your Uncle Dan is coming tomorrow to spend a week with us on the farm, and if you want to know about the war, here's your opportunity. Uncle Dan is probably one of the best-informed men in the country." Billie clapped his hands and gave such a whoop that he awakened the baby, but what could you expect of a fifteen-year-old boy who is a living interrogation point and wants to know about war?

Uncle Dan arrived in due time and Billie watched for an opportunity. It came that evening after dinner when Uncle Dan had lighted a cigar and taken a seat on the porch.

"I'm mighty glad you came, Uncle Dan. I want to talk to you about the war. We have just put military training in our township high school, but we had a hard time to do it. The Joneses and the Greggs objected. They said the war wouldn't come over here. Grandma Jones said: 'They ain't no use to worry, it will soon blow over.' Well, we put the training in just the same. You ever heard Judge Brownell, the president of the school board, do the slackers up. He said unless we take off our coats and go to it, Germany may yet win, and if she does, she will take over the great British fleet as a war trophy and compel us to do what ever she wants to; that she could make us pay all the cost of the war; the Kaiser could tax us as he pleased and that we couldn't help ourselves. He could make every one pay over a part of what he earns; that he could make the farmers pay rent for their own farms, etc. Now, Uncle, what do you think of that?"

"Well, my boy," said Uncle Dan, "all that Judge Brownell says might easily come true and may unless we go quickly to the aid of the allies with large numbers of men and help them break the German line. Unless we can beat the submarines, they may prevent us from getting enough food to the allies to keep them going. In that case Germany would win. As matters stand today, our greatest need is trained men. If we had had several millions of men with military training in our industries and on our farms when the war came, who could have been called at once for service, I do not believe the Kaiser would have forced the war upon us. As it was, he had no respect for us, and now we are in it and must go through with it. But never again must we be caught so wholly unprepared.

"There is only one safe way," said Uncle Dan, "and that is to adopt permanently universal military training, apply it to every young man who is physically fit, say in his nineteenth or twentieth year. The training can be carried forward in the United States training camps that are now being established for training men called by the selective draft. As soon as these men vacate these stations, they should be filled by younger men, and this should be made the permanent policy of the country."

Billie's mother, Mrs. Graham, had overheard the conversation. She came out and said: "Really, Brother Dan, are you serious as to the dangers of our country? If it is as bad as that, it is high time for us to wake up and do something about it."

"Exactly," replied Uncle Dan. "It is better to wake up now than to be rudely awakened later. We may as well understand, sister, that this is our war and we must win it or God help America. Everything that we have or hope to have—our liberties, our blessings, our opportunities are all involved in the great issue before us. Nothing must stand between us and winning this war. It is a question whether the peoples' right or the Kaiser's might shall dominate the world. If there ever was a holy war, this is it. We are fighting for world liberty. We are fighting for the freedom of humanity. We are fighting for the right of men to govern themselves instead of being governed against their will by a war-mad overlord. Perilous times are ahead of us. We must be prepared to make any sacrifice, to perform any service that may be required of us."

"Oh, Uncle Dan," exclaimed Billie, "may I bring my chum, Jimmie Collins, when we have our next talk? He is a bug on this war business and just crazy to see you."

"Certainly," said Uncle Dan, with a hearty laugh. "If we are to have more talks, I shall be glad to have Jimmie join us."

Billie clapped his hands and ran to the phone and told Jimmie to be over at seven o'clock the next evening.

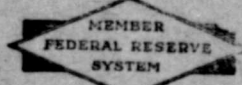

1/2 cup shortening

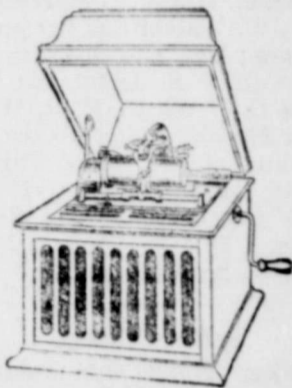

AD VALORUM FOR COUNTY FOR 1918 TO BE 25 CENTS

Approximately \$3600.00 was set aside this week by commissioners court in addition to the sum of \$10,000.00 appropriated at the last term, for the purpose of improving the Brady-Mason end of the Puget-Sound to the Gulf highway. This additional amount was made necessary by reason of the estimate on the improvement recently made by the government road experts. Their figures placed the cost of getting the highway from Brady to the Mason county line at \$27,176.60, whereas the original estimate gave \$20,000 as the sum required. As the Federal aid promised would take care of half this amount, the balance had to be made up by the county.

The two Brady banks agreed to advance the \$3600 to the county for which the commissioners voted to issue road warrants. These warrants will be two in number, each of \$1800 denomination, bearing interest at six per cent, payable annually. In order to take care of the interest and sinking fund, a special fund was created out of the general fund, it being estimated that 4c on the \$100 valuation would be sufficient to take care of this. The county ad valorem was set by the court at 25c on the \$100 valuation, the increase over the present 20c ad valorem tax, resulting from the creating of the above-mentioned special road fund.

The court also pledged itself to set aside a sufficient sum from the auto tax fund and the 15c tax to properly maintain and repair the new highway.

With the foregoing facts to aid them, Brady and McCulloch county good roads boosters will go next Monday to Austin to attend the State Highway meeting, at which time they hope not only to secure the federal aid already promised, but to secure a promise of \$15,000.00 additional for each the Melvin-Doole road and the Rochelle-Mercury road, the former comprising the north

Revenue Cancelling Stamps

Sec. 804. That in any and all cases where an adhesive stamp shall be used for denoting any tax imposed by this Act, except as hereinafter provided, the person using or affixing the same shall write or stamp thereupon the initials of his name and the date upon which the same shall be attached or used, so that the same may not again be used.

After December 1st, 1917, all notes, deeds, stock certificates, bonds, etc., will require revenue stamps, and will have to be cancelled as above (Section 804).

REDUCTION ON TEXAS CATTLE RATE ASSURED

Washington—The department of agriculture received advices today from Atlanta that the traffic managers of the Southeastern railways in session have agreed upon a substantial reduction in the rates east of the Mississippi river to apply on cattle shipped from Texas prior to Jan. 31st.

This concession was made upon representation by the department and the cattle raisers as an emergency measure on account of the drouth conditions in the Southwest. It is assumed that these rates will be published on less than statutory notice.
