German tradition read about the small trees or branches decorated with blown-out eggshells. I blewout eggs until my cheeks were sore and decorated a tree full of eggshells.
To blow an egg out of its shell, wash and dry the egg. Then, make a small hole in the small end of the egg by pricking it several times whe large end of the ege. Prick the large end of the egg
several times, making a larger hole than is in the small end.
Blow through the small end of the egg, letting the contents of the egg flow from the large end into a
cup or bowl. Rinse the shell in cup or bowl. Rinse the shell in
cold water and let it dry. The egg contents should be used immediately or frozen.
Blown-out eggshells can be
dyed in the same dyes as harddyed in the same dyes as hardcooked, but you probably wiln need Blown-out eggshells also can be decorated with glued-on paper, lace, sequins, etc.

If you use hard-cooked eggs for your Easter decorations, keep them
refrigerated as much as possible. Do not use eggs that are cracked or that have been out of the refrigerator for more than two hours.
In fact, for a safe Easter, it is best to keep hard-cooked eggs in the eggshells for the traditional Easter egg hunt.
