

ALL EQUIPMENT FOR NEW POWER AND LIGHT PLANT AT HAND

GENERATORS FOR NEW LIGHT PLANT ARRIVE AFTER SIX MONTHS DELAY

ALL EQUIPMENT NOW AT HAND, EVEN TO SMALL PUMP FOR FILTER PLANT ORDERED ONLY LAST FRIDAY—WORK OF INSTALLATION NOW IN PROGRESS.

The long-delayed, much-hoped for and urgently needed generators for the Brady Water & Light Co.'s new power and light plant have finally been received. Sound praises, all! After six months' delay the shipment finally rolled into Brady, and the shipment includes everything needed in the way of equipment for the new plant. Even a small pump for the filter plant, which was ordered by wire only last Friday, arrived Sunday by express. Work of installation of the new generators is now in progress at the plant and will be pushed to completion at the earliest possible date.

G. B. Rowden, expert engineer and electrician, was sent here by the Dallas office of the Fairbanks-Morse Co., arriving Monday morning, for the purpose of superintending the work of installation. After making a thorough examination of the engine now in operation, he spoke in highly commendatory terms of the manner in which this piece of machinery had been set up by Superintendent W. O. Kirchner and his assistants, stating it was one of the best pieces of workmanship for men not experts in this line of work that he had ever seen, and that the setting was out of the ordinary, everything being found in first-class shape.

Unfortunately, before Mr. Rowden could begin his work, he received a message from a doctor at Brownsville, stating that his wife was very low and advising him to come to Brownsville at once. Mrs. Rowden has been under treatment at the sanitarium there for some weeks, and when Mr. Rowden started for Brady, her condition was considered most favorable. Mr. Rowden left on the night train enroute to his wife's bedside.

While this unfortunate incident

may serve to delay the completion of the new plant, nevertheless Mr. Kirchner is going right ahead with the work of installation. The Dallas office of Fairbanks-Morse has been advised of the situation, and is expected to send another man at the earliest possible opportunity.

All the old steam plant, which was discarded some six weeks ago, has now been disposed of except one boiler and the fire pump, and everything is being shaped up so that the new equipment can be handled and placed with the greatest ease and to the best advantage.

The complete filter plant is also now at hand, and is being installed without loss of time.

J. D. BLACKBURN PLACED UNDER \$1,000 BOND FOR SHOOTING OF H. C. CUMMINS

CUMMINS APPARENTLY MAKING GOOD RECOVERY AT LOCAL SANITARIUM—EXAMINING TRIAL CONTINUED UNTIL NEXT MONDAY—BOTH MEN USED GUNS.

Examining trial of J. D. Blackburn on the charge of shooting H. C. Cummins last Thursday evening, was begun last Monday morning at 10:00 o'clock, and after examining Eph and James Cummins, aged 20 and 10 years respectively, sons of the victim of the shooting, the trial was continued until next Monday morning, awaiting the outcome of Mr. Cummins injuries. The defense introduced no witnesses or testimony. Meanwhile Mr. Blackburn is under \$1,000 bond, which amount was placed by Justice N. G. Lyle last Thursday evening following Mr. Blackburn's surrender to Sheriff Wall.

The shooting, which occurred at

the line fence between the Cummins and Blackburn places in the Dodge community last Thursday evening was the outcome of a quarrel of several months' standing, and which had its inception last fall. Upon two different occasions the men had personal encounters, following which friends endeavored to smooth matters over and re-establish the two upon a friendly basis. The trouble continued to smolder, however, and that the ill feeling between the two continued to grow is evidenced by the fact that both men were armed while working in their respective, and adjoining, fields.

From the testimony of the two Cummins boys, who were eyewitnesses, the two men at the time of the shooting were working about 100 yards apart, Cummins and his boys being engaged in chopping cotton, while Blackburn was running his cultivators. Just before the shooting, according to the testimony, Blackburn advanced across his field towards the fence about 50 yards, drawing his gun, a .38 revolver, as he did so, and leveling it at Cummins with both hands. About the same time, Cummins took about 10 steps towards Blackburn, drawing his gun, a .45 Colts automatic. Blackburn shot first, twice in rapid succession. At the third bullet Cummins reeled, but regained his balance. In the interval Cummins had shot a number of times, the exact number being not stated, as he was using smokeless powder and the automatic fired so rapidly as not to make the number of bullets fired distinguishable. Following being struck, Cummins turned back towards his house. Blackburn fired two more

shots. The testimony of James Cummins, aged ten, who was working closest to his father, showed that some words were passed between the two men just before the shooting, but what was said was not stated. He further testified that as the men changed their positions and advanced towards one another, he was placed almost in line with the bullets from Blackburn's gun.

Eph Cummins, the other son, was at work about 300 yards distant, and while he observed the entire shooting, he did not hear the conversation. Following the incident, he carried his father to the house on his back and phoned for the doctors.

As before stated, the defendant introduced no witnesses, and his side of the case remains unstated.

Newman & McCollum have been retained as counsels for the defendant, and County Attorney E. P. Lea is being assisted in the prosecution by Judge Joe A. Adkins.

The bullet which struck Cummins entered in the interspace between the 1st and 2nd ribs, passed through the lung to the left of the sternum, and out through the scapula or shoulder blade.

Following the shooting, Cummins was carried to the local sanitarium, where latest reports are that he is doing as nicely as could be expected and has a good chance for recovery should nothing untoward develop. Blackburn came to town of his own accord and surrendered to Sheriff Wall.

The entire affair is a most regrettable one. Both men are prominent and highly esteemed citizens, and the shooting occasioned quite a sensation among their friends over the county.

The Republican party being ruled mostly by old men and cold men, its vision is foreshortened and its usefulness impaired by that vein of selfishness which has run through it like a living stream ever since the day when it became the buttress of those special interests which sheltered themselves behind protective tariff walls. As Americans, Messrs. Harding and Coolidge are above reproach; as Republicans, they may be tarred with a stick wielded by men who lack a good deal of being all that statesmen should be.—State Press in Dallas News.

In probate court last week, the J. H. Drinkard will was upheld, by a decision handed down by County Judge Evans J. Adkins. J. T. Smith of Lohn, trustee of the estate, was defendant in the suit brought by Mrs. Drinkard and adopted daughter, Mrs. Ratliff, attacking the will. Newman & McCulloch appeared as attorneys for the plaintiffs, while Joe A. Adkins and J. E. Shropshire acted for the defendant. Judge T. C. Wilkinson of Brownwood and two Fort Worth attorneys also were interested in the case. Following the rendering of the decision, notice of appeal to the district court was given by the plaintiffs.

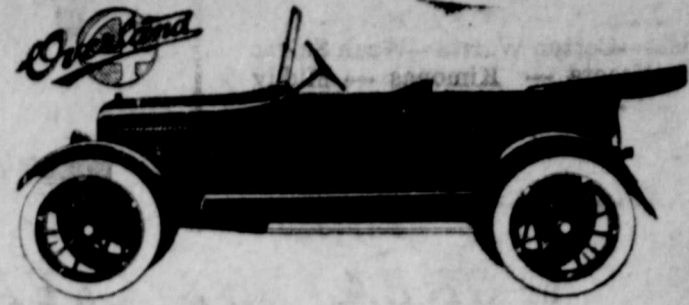

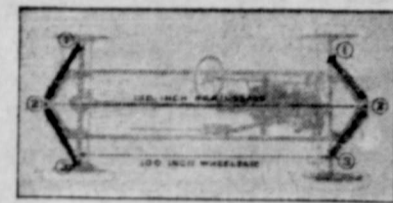

Kindergarten Helps for Parents

This is No. 43 of a series of articles issued by the National Kindergarten Association. They will appear weekly in these columns.

By MRS. KATHERINE CHURCH SOLOMONS.

The routine duties of the wife and mother are the same in practically all homes. Food has to be purchased and prepared; the house has to be kept clean and in order; there is shopping to be done, also sewing, mending and washing—a big item in families with young children—and there are the children.

Very often the mother would seem to have little time or strength to spend other than in attention to the children's actual physical care and requirements, and yet by a little wise thinking and arranging she can start many plays and occupations which will not only give the children pleasure and teach them how to do things but result in a quieter, easier and more joyous task for herself.

The Home Atmosphere.

One of the most helpful factors in the harmonious development of mother-and-child life is a right attitude of mind. It is, of course, most desirable that it be one of contentment and peace; but too often mothers, in addition to the work of house-keeping and the bearing and rearing of children, are obliged to contend with problems of sickness and family disagreements. However, if she can meet such situations with intelligence and courage and with self-control, she will create a home atmosphere which will be measureless in its influence.

The Yard.

A yard can be made an ideal playground at a moderate expense. Playing in sand appeals more than anything else to children of three and four years. It will engross and keep them occupied for hours at a time. Therefore, the first thing to put in the yard is a sand box. This can be done by nailing four boards together and partly embedding them in the ground. Babies should not be allowed to play by themselves in the sand until they are old enough to know that they should not put it in their mouths. And none of the children

should be permitted to throw sand, because of the danger to the eyes.

Discarded cooking utensils and a few tin spoons give the children an opportunity to imitate mother's fascinating operations in the kitchen. In warm weather they can have water to mix with the sand. This makes the play all the more real and engrossing.

Older children find many more things to do with sand. They pile it up and make hills out of it, dig holes and fill them with water, or make representations of the many things that children love to play and think about.

Pretty patterns can be made in damp sand by drawing with a stick, by pressing stones, pebbles or seeds into it, or by using such objects as grooved shells or the rim of a cup.

Gardening is one of the most wholesome and healthful ways in which children can be employed. Each child may well have a space in the yard allotted to him for planting and tending a little garden of his very own.

All kinds of outdoor games can be played in the yard and the children can romp to their hearts' content. For the young children, games with a rubber ball or with bean bags are the best.

Older children enjoy having a swing, but it is likely to be dangerous for the little ones when they are running heedlessly about.

Play Materials.

Almost all children have wooden blocks of one kind or another to play with and they scarcely need to be shown what to do with them. They love to make such things as houses, trains, trolley cars, buildings, bridges and furniture. Any materials that lend themselves to representation of this kind are a delight to children. Kindergarten tablets (round, square, oblong and triangular pieces of wood of the dimension of one inch) can be used for representing many things;

also colored sticks and slats of different lengths, and seeds of different varieties. A catalogue of kindergarten materials will be sent upon request by Milton Bradley Company, Springfield, Mass., or by E. Steiger & Co., 49 Murray street, New York.

In the same way, children enjoy representing objects in clay, and by drawing and painting. Clay work, however, is better left for school by mothers who have much to do, as work in this material requires considerable attention and direction.
