

## 21ST ARTILLERY BAND HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING IN THIS CITY

### LARGE CROWD GREETED REV. J. H. TAYLOR AND DAUGHTER, MISS IDA, DURING VISIT TO MISSISSIPPI

The following account of commendation upon the part of the Rev. J. H. Taylor and daughter, Miss Ida, is taken from the Daily (Miss.) Corinthian:

"Farmington experienced a great day Sunday when Rev. J. H. Taylor of Brady, Texas, and his daughter, Miss Ida, conducted an all-day service there with intermission at noon for luncheon. The elder was a former resident of that section, is well known in the county and has a host of relations here. His friends are legion and when it was announced that they were to be present Sunday it was a foregone conclusion that there would be a large congregation to greet them. But they were hardly prepared for such a tremendous outpouring and such a royal welcome.

"During the forenoon the service hour was taken up with a talk from Miss Ida, who has spent a number of years in China as a missionary. Her subject was one of particular interest, dealing with the customs, superstitions and practices of these strange little people. To the natural interest in the discussion she added a splendid faculty of transmitting the information she desired. And this one characteristic with the exception of her Christian devotion, has made for her successful work more than anything. Not half the people present were able to get into the church but notwithstanding the crowded conditions there was the most profound interest from the beginning to the close of this talk, and a demand for more along the same line in the afternoon indicated that the end came all too soon.

"She told of the experiences of the missionaries and the preachers and Christian workers in that heathen land, of the customs of the people and the difficulties those who are working in this field have to face. As an illustration the speaker told of going to one place where there were a large number gathered to hear the Bible

stories. She took as her text, "As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness even so must the Son of Man be lifted up."

"When the text was announced they began to want to know who Moses was, and the whole Bible story had to be related in order to have her hearers understand the spiritual side of the story. And so it is in almost every instance. The historical foundation must be laid before the hearer can be reached in the manner desired.

"In the afternoon, Rev. Taylor preached a sermon strong in his practical application, as a characteristic of him in the pulpit. There was one profession. Following his sermon another short talk was made by Miss Ida before the large gathering dispersed. An excellent dinner was served at noon, from the numerous well-filled baskets that found their way onto the grounds."

### 21ST ARTILLERY BAND TO FURNISH MUSIC FOR MASONIC PICNIC HERE

ORGANIZATION INCLUDES STATE'S BEST MUSICIANS AND MATERIAL—DIRECTED IN EUROPE BY DR. J. W. RAGSDALE OF THIS CITY.

Although the matter of holding the Brady Masonic Lodge No. 628 basket picnic was decided upon some weeks ago, and set for beginning today (Tuesday), was definitely postponed to Thursday, July 15th, in order to allow all members of the regimental band time in reaching Brady. H. P. Jordan has opened up the Club house grounds for the party, including men with their wives, families, etc., camps being pitched, and every convenience will be theirs during the stay here. About fifteen pieces of the band is present at this writing, with others expected to arrive.

The 21st Artillery Band was organized and had its inception at Camp Stanley, Leon Springs, soon after the beginning of the World War. The entire membership was composed of men who had not waited to be drafted into service, but volunteered themselves at the very beginning of our recent great struggle and every member was instrumental in making the record possible this band has made. Their work is surpassed by none, being recognized by foreign nobility as well as being held in the highest esteem and given due regards by our own fellow men.

Members of the organization appeared before President Wilson, Poincaré, Alfonse, Manuel, Albert, George, Clemenceau, Prince of Monaco, Duchesse of Luxemburg, King of Italy, and played under Walter Damrosch. The 21st Artillery Band traveled through all foreign countries; was on front 110 days, doing active military duty. In times of peace a military band's duty is to participate in all camp duties in which music is required, to keep instruments in proper shape, as well as attending regular band practice. But in times of war they are called upon to take the lead in all offensives, the louder the playing the more enthusiasm being aroused in the fighting ranks in midst of battle. Not that they stop here. The band organizations participate in actual fighting as well as the doughboy in the front line trenches when active combat is going on. The 21st Artillery band did not touch their band instruments for four months while on active duty. They participated in the St. Mihiel, the Meuse, the Argonne, all being major operations. Minor operations were Frapple, Vos-

ges, Mts. St. Die, Du Venelle forest, Verdun front.

Following the cessation of hostilities in Europe, with other organizations they were returned home for demobilization. A plan was submitted whereby they could assemble each year, with their instruments, at some point for a get-together meeting. This was all adopted and in coming to Brady for the first annual meeting, Dr. J. W. Ragdsdale of this city, who was director of their operations in Europe, is to be commended for having induced them to come here. The party will be on their encampment here until the latter part of the week.

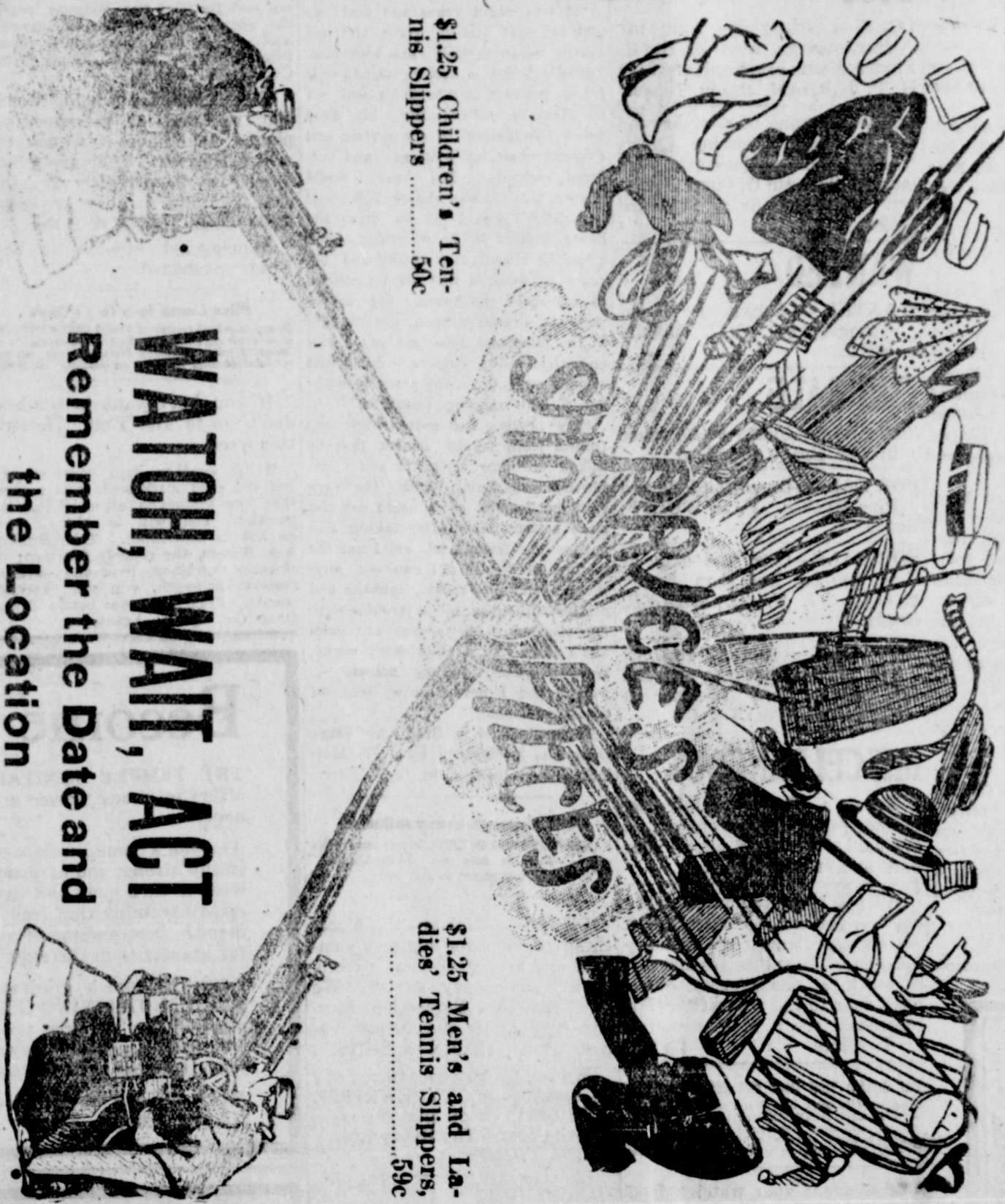

ENOUGH BALLS TO RUN LEAGUES 347 YEARS

Also 52 Miles of Bats—Furnished American Troops by Y. M. C. A.

On the basis of there being played 150 games for the season and allowing five new balls for each game, enough baseballs have been furnished the American troops by the Army Y. M. C. A. to run the National league and the American association for 347 years. Allowing two new balls for each game, there were enough baseballs to play a series of 25 sand-lot games for 7,149 clubs.

There were 355,955 baseballs bought and shipped by the "Y" from July, 1917, to November 30, 1918, for the use of our army. Side by side they would reach 15 1/4 miles, and would make a solid fence of baseballs six feet high for three-fourths of a mile.

Over 100,000 bats were also furnished. Placed end to end, they would reach 52 miles. End to end in the air, they would rise to ten times the height of the highest mountain in the world, or be equal in height to 568 Washington monuments one on top of the other. If these were made in this fashion into one long bat, a man with the build and elbow grease of a giant could stand in your town, swing the bat and hit everything in a radius of 52 miles.
