BAILEY FOR GOVERNOR SECOND IN COUNTY-FIRST IN STATE

ED JACOBY WINS PUBLIC WEIGHER **RACE IN PRECINCT 1 BY 6 VOTES**

SEE-SAW BETWEEN CANDIDATES ENDS IN JACOBY'S FAVOR IN RE-CHECKING OF VOTES-OTHER COUNTY RACES WALK-AWAY FOR SUCCESSFUL ONES.

The see-saw in the race between W. F. Evans and Ed Jacoby for Public Weigher Precinct No. 1 was finally decided in Jacoby's favor this morning when a re-checking of the votes from the various boxes in the weigher's precinct showed that 31 votes had been credited to Evans at the Waldrip box instead of the 21 votes cast. Up to this time, Evans had showed a lead over Jacoby of four votes. The error turned the balance in Jacoby's favor by six votes. By agreement between the county candidates prior to the primary election, there will be no runoff, and Jacoby wins the contest unless the official counting of the ballots next Saturday discloses errors in favor of Evans sufficient to overcome Jacoby's present lead. The Camp San Saba box is the only one not reporting up to the present, and until these returns are received, Jacoby can show a lead of but one vote over Evans. DALLAS, July 26 .- Headquarters here of Joseph W. Bailey, candidate for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination, announced today that a telegram had been received from R. M. Dudley of El Paso, manager of the campaign of R. E. Thomason, announcing Dudley would support Bailey in the runoff primary of August 28.

The message, addressed to Luther Nickels, said:

"While I do not agree with Mr. Bailey in many things, yet I do know where he stands. He has not advocated issues because they were popular; he has not made a campaign of misrepresentation, nor thrown mud at his adversaries. He has not made a sectional issue. For these and many other reasons I shall support Mr. Bailey."
