McCULLOCH CO. QUARANTINED AGAINST ANTHRAX

County Judge Evans Adkins is in receipt of advice from W. A. Wallace of Fort Worth, chairman of the Live Stock Sanitary commission of Texas, establishing a quarantine around McCulloch county against Mason county, because of the outbreak of anthrax among the cattle in the latter county. The chairman's action was in response to a request for the quarantine made by Judge Adkins as a protective measure for McCulloch county stockmen.

The chairman also advised that a sufficient number of guards be employed to guard the line between the two counties to prevent the movements of live stock in violation of the order.

The letter from Mr. Walker closes with reassuring advice as to the extent of the outbreak in Mason county, which would indicate that the epidemic is well under control and that the danger of spread to McCulloch county is not imminent if proper precautionary measures are taken. The letter concludes as follows:

"Reports from the veterinarians of this commission in the area under quarantine for anthrax, state that the situation is greatly improved and we do not believe there is much danger of the outbreaks in McCulloch county; if, however, anthrax should break out, please advise your people to burn all carcasses on the spot on which they died, and to notify this commission at once."

COPY OF OFFICIAL BALLOT RUN-OFF PRIMARY ON SAT.

Next Saturday, August 28th, the run-off primary election of the Democratic party will be held in Texas. The chief interest, of course, centers in the governor's race between Bailey and Neff, but nominees will be named Saturday for two other state offices, viz: Lieutenant Governor and Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. Every man and woman who voted in the July primary should feel it his or her duty to go into the run-off primary and vote his convictions. Also any qualified voter who is a Democrat and can conscientiously subscribe to the party pledge, is entitled to a vote. Those who expect to be absent from the county, but not out of the state on election day, may cast their ballot at any time this week, depositing same with the county clerk. 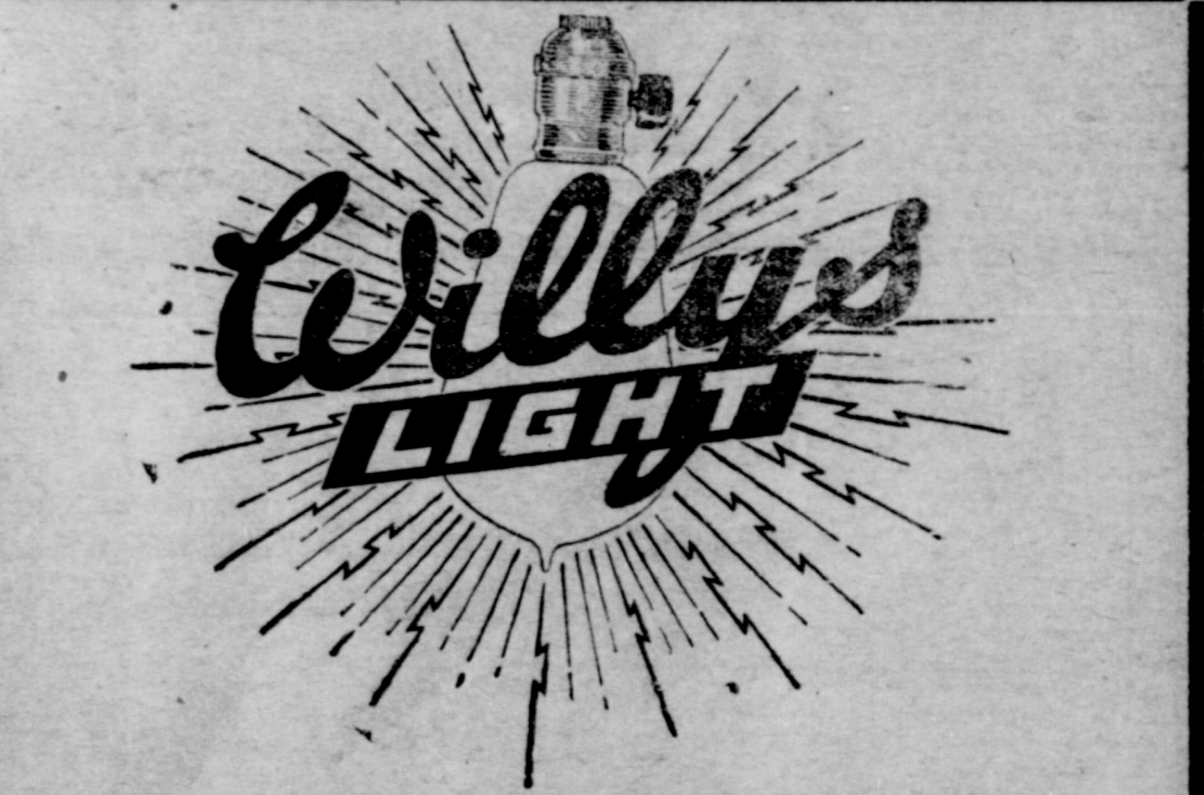

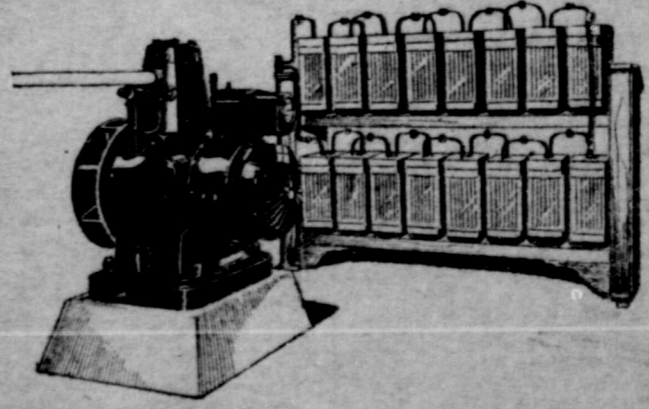

It was he who contended that no creature was greater than its creator, and caused the principle to be established that congress has the power to limit the exercise of the writ of injunction by the subsidiary Federal courts created by legislation. And it was in this debate that he won his opponent, Senator Hale, and that gentleman acknowledged his conversion on the floor of the senate.

Joe Bailey was always recognized as such a man as Henry Clay or John C. Calhoun during the years of his service in Washington, and no man ever denied that he was a Democrat or believed that there was an adversary in either party that could take any laurels from the great Texan.

Can we afford to turn this man down because a few "expedient" Democrats, who are jealous of his success and the reputation that he has won, are leagued together for his ruin?

NATIONAL COMMITTEE PLEASSED THAT BAILEY WILL TAKE STUMP; --TO BE USED AT BIG RALLIES

Washington, July 31.— Announcement by former Senator Bailey that, regardless of the outcome of the Texas run-off primary, he will offer his services to the Democratic party in the Presidential campaign, was received with pleasure at headquarters of the Democratic National Committee.

Senator Harrison, of Mississippi, floor leader for the Cox forces at San Francisco, who has just been appointed in charge of the speakers' bureau, was especially glad.

Will Welcome Bailey.

"Senator Bailey's help will be welcomed and very much appreciated," he said. "He will be of great help to the party because the Texan has such a reputation as an orator."

Senator Harrison indicated that Bailey will be regarded as one of the Democratic oratorical heavyweights, to

be used at important Democratic rallies in the large cities of the North, East and Middle West.

Senator Harrison does not intend to permit Bailey's differences with the administration to interfere with the effective service it is thought he can give the Cox candidacy.

Senator Harrison indicated also that other Texans will be drafted for the campaign.

Sheppard Will Speak.

"Texas produces real speakers who can make political speeches. These men are in and out of Congress and I intend to call upon them," he said.

Governor Cox has previously invited Senator Sheppard to participate actively in the campaign because of his prohibition prestige. Senator Harrison will arrange an itinerary soon for Senator Sheppard in the prohibition strongholds of the West and Middle West.

HOTEL RECORDS PROVE BAILEY TEXAS RESIDENT

Taylor, Texas, Aug. 17.—In his speech here tonight Mr. Bailey insisted that he has never given up his Texas residence, that the law says a residence once acquired is abandoned or forfeited only where there has been an intention, announced or evinced, and that instead of evincing any such intention he has been stronger in his Texas residence.

He says he came to Texas thirty-five years ago and settled at Gainesville while they must admit that he was a legal resident of Texas during the twenty-two years he served in Congress and declared his status had never changed. He said he frequently had gone to Tucson Ariz. to San Francisco Calif. and to Lexington, Ky., and they searched the hotel registers to see if he had registered from Washington, but found he signed from Gainesville, Texas.

"They told you I did not want to make Liberty bond speeches because I was unwilling to advise my friends to make a bad investment. This is an unadulterated lie. I did not refuse to make speeches for any such reason as that. I did refuse to make a speech once when a committee came to my office and invited me to make a speech to sell the bonds. I did not want to interfere with the sale of the bonds and did not accept. I knew if I went down there and spoke I must say what I think; therefore, I said: 'If I go you will sell fewer bonds.' My refusal was based on this fact: They were telling everybody the bonds were the best investment in the world. I knew they would go to a discount, and I was right, as all of you know, for they have gone below par. Purchasers now sell them at a loss. If I went there and told them the bonds were such a fine investment I would be telling a lie. If I told them they were not a good investment, but they ought to buy the bonds out of patriotism, I knew I would be speaking opposite from the other speakers and they might not sell so many bonds. I did not speak because I wanted them to sell as many bonds as they could. They said I did not want to advise my friends to make bad investments. I have no friends in Washington. I have only acquaintances there. My friends are in Texas. I would have been glad to have seen those Washington men buy as many bonds as possible, as they had been making money in Government contracts, and I wanted the Government to get as much of it back as possible."

BAILEY SAYS HE ALWAYS VOTES FOR NOMINEES

Haskell, Tex. Aug. 9.—In his speech here tonight Mr. Bailey made specific answer to the question propounded by Mr. Neff at Waxahachie as to whether Mr. Bailey would vote for him (Neff) if he is nominated. Mr. Bailey said he always votes for the nominees and that includes Mr. Neff, but that he will not ask Mr. Neff whether he will vote for him (Bailey) because he might change his mind as he did about Mr. Thomason. In this connection he said:

In his speech at Waxahachie the other night, Mr. Neff calls on me to say whether or not I will vote for him if he is nominated. I might answer that Mr. Neff's nomination is such a remote contingency that I could not be fairly required to anticipate it, but I do not choose to make that answer.

"When I enter the primary election I will always keep the pledge and abide the result and I shall do that even if it should require me to vote for Mr. Neff. I might now ask Mr. Neff whether or not he will vote for me if I am nominated, but I will not take the time to do so, because remembering that he declared on at least two occasions that he would not vote for Mr. Thomason if Mr. Thomason were the only man in the race and then the second day after the primary declared he would, of course, have voted for Mr. Thomason if he had been in the run-off. I wouldn't know but that after saying he would vote for me Mr. Neff might change his mind and vote against me."

BAILEY MANAGER SAYS ADDITIONAL OATH IS ILLEGAL

Dallas, Aug. 12.—That the action of the State Democratic Executive Committee, in session a few days ago, looking toward the election judges administering a party oath to voters on Aug. 28, is not to go unchallenged and unnoticed is indicated by a statement just issued by Luther Nickels, campaign manager for Bailey.

Commenting on the resolution passed by the executive committee, Nickels said:

"Such an order is contrary to Democratic principles and merely means a third degree system at the polls. The Terrell election law is plain. It provides for a pledge as to the Democracy of the voter on the primary ballot, with a promise to support the nominee of the primary. This pledge is all that is provided under the law. The law does not contemplate conferring inquisitorial powers on election judges. Who is to be the judge as to whether a prospective voter's fealty is in doubt?"

"If by such illegal methods we hear that any Texas voter has been deprived of his franchise or bullied out of voting through cross examination by partisan election judges we will see to it that members of the election board guilty of such methods are prosecuted."

If the trend of sentiment toward Mr. Bailey continues during the next few days at the rate it has been going during the past few weeks, Texas will witness one of the most remarkable political landslides in the history of the State.

Bailey chided Neff for what he charged as an abandonment of the Neff plank. This is expressed, he said, in a campaign card which the Taylor Bailey Club is circulating. The following is printed on the card, and it was read by Bailey: "Reward Offered — Lost, somewhere between Baylor University and Neff's Law Office, Neff's land plank. Finder will please return to Socialist headquarters and receive as your reward a slice of your neighbor's land."

The publishers of this book declare that 'Sketches for Who's Who in America are prepared from first-hand material only.' As a matter of fact the material is furnished by the subjects of the sketches themselves. In said sketch it is said: 'Neff, Pat Morris, Lawyer, born McGregor, Texas, Nov. 26, 1872, etc.'"

"W. A. Fraser, a high official of the Sovereign Camp of Woodmen of the World of America, Omaha, Neb., today wired a member of a Woodman lodge in Texas: 'Neff born 1872; policy issued 1905. Hope he will be your next Governor.'"

"This means that Mr. Neff's application for a Woodman policy and for membership in the lodge states his birth date as being Nov. 26, 1872. The telegram was in response to the telegraphic inquiry as to what the Woodmen records show about Neff's age."

"Martindale's American Lawyers Directory is an annual publication in general use by lawyers of the United States, and contains a brief history, etc., of practically all the lawyers of the United States. On page 821 of this publication for 1918, the year of Mr. Neff's birth is given as 1872."

"The legislative record for the sessions of 1901 during which Mr. Neff was a member of the House of Representatives, shows his age then as 25 years, and the same record for 1903 shows his age as 28 years."

NEFF'S VILLIFICATION OF BAILEY AND BAILEY FOLLOWERS DENOUNCED IN ADDRESS BY JUDGE SCOTT OF WACO

Judge Sam R. Scott of Waco introduced Bailey. The introduction of Judge Scott was replete with attacks of Neff. He attacked Neff's war record, both during the great war and during the Spanish-American war.

Neff Bitterly Attacked. "When Neff was a young man," he said, "Neff declined to volunteer then because he was afraid he could not learn to cock a gun and pull its trigger."

No campaign in the history of Texas politics has been featured with such a vilification as the campaign now on, he asserted, and the responsibility for it he laid at the speeches which Neff has made. Surprised that Neff should "recall such an example," Judge Scott retorted that "Mr. Neff is chairman of the board of trustees of Baylor University, great central educational institution of a great religious denomination."

As a candidate for office, especially as a candidate for the high and dignified office of the Governor of Texas, he thought that Neff should pitch a campaign on a "high plane," instead of resorting to the mud-slinging tactics of a ward politician. Cheers and Applause.

Excerpts from recent speeches of Neff were read. In some of them Neff cast aspersions on Bailey, calling him "Joe," and alluding to his followers as those who believe in "booze and boodle in Texas." Another excerpt he read painted the former Senator, "for twenty years a figure of national renown and fame," as "being hog-tied."

With much vigor Judge Scott read from the Waxahachie speech of Neff in which Neff said that all of the "back alley bums and saloon pimps" were for Bailey. "And that is the language of the chairman of the board of trustees of a religious institution," commented Scott. There were hisses directed at Neff. Laughter and tumultuous applause came when Scott asked:

"Where did Pat Neff learn such language as that?" A voice: "Baylor University." "No," said Judge Scott, "but it is strange that a man who is so good as to be kissed by men, as Neff was kissed at Mexico by a man, who never baited a fishhook, shot a gun, nor drank anything stronger than Brazos water, could use, with such ease, language about 'saloon pimps.' (Cheers and cries of 'Hit him,' 'Treat him rough,' and 'You've got him nailed.')

An entirely new tack of campaign against Neff was used by Judge Scott, who challenged Neff's own war record and said: "It comes in mighty poor grace for Mr. Neff to attack someone else's war record when he has no war record of his own to boast of." "Lip service" were two words which Judge Scott used to describe Neff's record. Recalling that Neff

has made statements that the "Kaiser lovers are all for Bailey," Scott asked: "Since when did Neff stop trying to get the vote of the Kaiser lovers?"

Judge Scott read a biography of Pat Neff, written by Dr. S. P. Brooks and issued by the Athenaeum Literary Society of Baylor University, "sold for a dollar a throw," and featured by a full page portrait of Neff. In that biography Brooks described Neff: "Although a Texas born, and a rustic, Pat Neff never baited a fishhook nor shot a gun—he does not know one card from another, and does not know how to play any kind of a social game. He has never drunk anything stronger than Brazos water."

Former Speech Recalled. Further along in the biography, Dr. Brooks relates that Neff is of "German-Irish ancestry."

Judge Scott said that he has been acquainted with Neff for many years, and related an incident of Neff's campaign for county attorney several years ago. He made a speech in a German-American community, and Scott said: "Openly bid for the German vote." He boasted in that speech Judge Scott asserted. Neff said: "My fellow citizens: I fetch my ancestry from the banks of the Rhine; for it was there that my forefathers lived. Then the name by which they went was spelled N-e-e-f and pronounced N-e-e-f. They came to this country and they changed the 'i' to 'e' and called it Neff."

"Although I am now thousands of miles from the Rhine there is still a tenderness in my heart for the dear old fatherland."

Two Men Contrasted. Neff's campaign for county attorney of McLennan County was before the war. Scott drew a contrast between Neff's war record and Bailey's war record. Bailey bought more Liberty bonds than Neff bought; Bailey bought bonds for himself, his two sons, his wife, Neff bought bonds for himself, and "made a four-minute speech for the sale of bonds."

Scott vitiated those who haven't the human heart to "recognize that a man whose only sons are fighting the battles of his country cannot be disloyal to the country in whose army his son is fighting."

"Why didn't Neff volunteer?" he asked. (Much applause.) "He was a young man; his wife does not need his support. He could have given her this \$10,000 he is using to make this campaign, and she could have lived on that."

"I have but little patience with the man who is jumping on another man's war record when he has no war record of his own to brag about."

"That's right, call the turn," cried someone in the audience. "But the war with Germany is not the only one that this country has fought," he said. "A few years ago we fought Spain. Where was Neff then? He was a young man, a very young man then."

BAILEY'S PLURALITY IN BROWN COUNTY OVER NEFF WAS 105 VOTES

Dallas, Aug. 6.—Claims made by Bailey's friends at Brownwood that he carried Brown County by 105 votes instead of 45 as reported by the Texas Election Bureau have proven correct. In response to an inquiry to the Bureau's correspondent at Brownwood the following telegram was received Thursday:

"Bailey received in Brown County as revised and reported by letter to your bureau several days ago by me 1,054 votes, Neff received 949."

The correspondent's letter never reached the Bureau, having apparently miscarried in the mails.

SHOULD A GOVERNOR SERVE THE WHOLE PEOPLE OR JUST ONE CLASS?

That calls for a complete surrender, doesn't it? It turns the government over absolutely to one class. It ties those who answer it satisfactorily body and soul.

Bailey answered that question publicly and refused to pledge himself in any such manner.

Neff answered it privately and the answer was such that the Labor League is doing its best to elect him.

Can we hope for a government of the people, by the people and for the people with such methods?

"Bailey says that he does not want to bring whisky back," said Mr. Neff at Taylor, "but he doesn't say anything about wine and beer." There you have a fair sample of Mr. Neff's misrepresentation. Mr. Bailey has said specifically that he is not in favor of bringing back wine, beer nor any other kind of intoxicating liquors. If Mr. Neff does not know that, he has no excuse for not knowing it, for it has been printed repeatedly in reports of Mr. Bailey's speeches. And yet Mr. Neff is fooling many good people.

PRESTIGE WILSON ADMINISTRATION NOT DEPENDENT UPON ELECTION OF NEFF

The Hon. C. Cone Johnson is in error when he assumes that the position of The Star-Telegram is that Mr. Bailey's attitude on the Wilson administration should not be "discussed." We care not how much Mr. Johnson or any other supporter of Mr. Neff, or Mr. Neff himself, for that matter, discusses Mr. Bailey's attitude on the Wilson administration. But when the proposition is laid down that a vote against Mr. Neff is a vote against the Wilson administration, as Mr. Johnson's candidate for Governor declares, and when, in effect, it is held that the more than 150,000 votes cast for Mr. Bailey in the recent primary were anti-Wilson votes, we say that it is a false proposition, that it is not true, and that the gentlemen who make such declarations are showing more concern for Mr. Neff's candidacy than they are for the prestige of the Wilson administration.

The very method of their campaign proves it. Mr. Johnson, for example, quoted a Republican newspaper as interpreting the result of the first primary as a repudiation of the Wilson administration, and instead of showing how absolutely false such an interpretation of the election is, he proceeded to draw the inference from the article that therefore no supporter of the Wilson administration should vote for Mr. Bailey. Suppose Mr. Bailey is nominated, what will these gentlemen who have staked the prestige of the Wilson administration on the Neff candidacy say then? What will Mr. Neff say then? Will he seek to excuse himself by declaring that, of course, he did not mean what he said, as he did with respect to his declaration that he would not support Mr. Thomson if he were nominated? We yield to no man or set of men, inside or outside of Texas, not even to Mr. Johnson or Mr. Neff, precedence in the matter of support of the Wilson administration. We think we have done quite as much as Mr. Johnson and Mr. Neff, to say the least, to maintain the prestige of the Wilson administration in Texas, and we propose to continue to do so. It is for that very reason that we refuse to remain silent in the face of a brazen attempt to put the prestige of the Wilson administration in pawn to be redeemed by the nomination and election of Mr. Neff.

When there was a real question of choice between Mr. Bailey and the prestige of the Wilson administration we did not hesitate to make our choice promptly. We did our full share, we think, in helping to send a Wilson administration to San Francisco in opposition to Mr. Bailey. But it was in defense of the Wilson administration that we took that stand, and not in a blind hatred of Mr. Bailey. Some gentlemen have become so obsessed with the picture of Mr. Bailey created by their own imagination—a picture that makes him out a monster—that they have been betrayed into believing that the picture is a true one and perfectly apparent to all, and that any man who votes for him must in some manner share the nature of the monster they have conjured up. It is these gentlemen who exclaim they "cannot understand how any Wilson Democrat can support Joe Bailey for Governor."

The cold fact is that a great many Wilson Democrats supported Mr. Bailey in the first primary, and a great many more are going to support him in the second.
