**H. E. JONES TAKES CHARGE BOWMAN LUMBER CO. YARD**

H. E. Jones this week checked himself in as manager of the Bowman Lumber Co.'s local yard. Mr. Jones and family moved here Monday from Menard and are making their home in the F. R. Wulff residence on the southern extension of Blackburn street. He expresses the greatest of pleasure at again being located in Brady, and says he is back here to make his home permanently among us.

In selecting Mr. Jones as manager of the local yard, the Bowman Co. have secured not only a most capable lumber man, but one who is known far and wide among the citizens of this section. For many years Mr. Jones was engaged in the mercantile business at Rochelle, and later was manager of an automobile firm in Brady. and says all his records have checked up to a dot. Brady citizens will be glad to welcome Mr. Jones and family to citizenship here once more.

Mrs. J. A. Holton has the sympathy of all in the death of her father, Z. B. Whitehurst, who passed away on Monday evening, the 18th, at his home in Darling, Miss. The sad message was received by Mrs. Holton Tuesday morning, and she left on the night train to attend the funeral. Mr. Holton accompanied her to Fort Worth.

At the time of death, Mr. Whitehurst was 60 years old. He was a prominent educator and had occupied professor's chairs in colleges in Texas, Mississippi and Alabama. **OVER \$14,000 STATE AID ALLOTTED McCULLOCH COUNTY SCHOOLS-'20-'21**

**WONDERFUL HELP TO RURAL SCHOOLS MADE CONDITIONED UPON MEETING REQUIREMENTS OF STATE AID RULES—CO. SUPT. DELIGHTED WITH REPORT.**

McCulloch county schools have been allotted \$14,020 State aid, according to an announcement just received by County Superintendent W. M. Deans. The sum is apportioned among 21 schools of the county and varies from \$153 to \$1790. In the cases of a majority of the schools, the amount allotted was within a few dollars of the amount requested by Superintendent Deans.

The amounts allotted are conditioned upon each of the schools meeting the requirements of the State aid rules, and, needless to say, every community so benefited may be depended upon to put forth every effort to retain the full amount of aid awarded. The McCulloch county schools have been making wonderful strides in recent years, and this fact could have no clearer demonstration than the fact that those schools which have received the largest awards are invariably those which have the best and most modern school buildings. This demonstrated beyond question of a doubt that the school spirit is advanced proportionately with the improvement and development of school buildings and equipment.

Every citizen of McCulloch county may well take pride in the achievements of the McCulloch county schools and every community should put forth every effort, not only to retain the state aid at present allotted, but to place itself in position to still further



**PLANTERS GIN AT MAY WARNED TO CLOSE BUT CONTINUES OPERATION**

Disregarding an anonymous warning to close down, the Planters gin at May, of which B. F. Stone is manager, is continuing in operation, according to a report received here today.

The warning to cease operation was posted at the gin Sunday night or Monday, it is reported here, but the gin management has chosen to disregard it entirely and the plant is now running to capacity. Mr. Stone is said to have regarded the warning as of little consequence, and announced his intention of paying no attention to it.—Brownwood Bulletin.

**MANY SCHOOLS UNABLE TO OPEN ON ACCOUNT OF LACK OF TEACHERS**

Austin, Oct. 19.—A number of schools in Texas are unable to open, because they have no teachers, according to information from the State Department of Education. Reports from county superintendents of fifty counties show 187 vacancies in the schools. Officials of the Department said these vacancies are practically all in the one-teacher schools that pay an average salary of about \$75 per month for terms of six months.—Brownwood Bulletin.

**WATER SUPPLY FOR BRADY.**

In this issue we present a proposition outlined by Mayor J. E. Shropshire outlining a plan to secure an additional supply of water for Brady by drilling a well. The proposition has undoubted merit, and the fact that great quantities of pure water have been found in wells drilled by oil men in this vicinity would appear to make the securing of water by drilling an almost assured fact.

In the past several years, the proposition of drilling a well to secure a water supply for Brady has been frequently discussed by various citizens, and it has been proposed to raise a fund by popular subscription to drill a well and ascertain the possibilities of a water supply from this source.

The Standard is not in position to state whether it would be feasible or practical to use part of the bonds already voted for improvement of the Brady water supply in the drilling of a well. Should the well prove a failure, such a source of action would doubtless result in much censure falling upon the heads of those who advocate such a move.

A better plan, it occurs to us, would be to drill the well with funds raised by popular subscription. Then, if the well proves a success, let the bond money be used to purchase the well at actual cost, thereby reimbursing the citizens who make the drilling possible. Should the project be a failure, no doubt the subscribers would be willing to pocket their loss in the satisfaction of knowing that their efforts and money had been expended in a public service, and that their reward might be the securing of a water supply through other means, with the bond money they had saved to the city.

**PROPOSITION TO SECURE SUPPLY OF WATER FOR BRADY FROM A WELL**

To the Citizenship of Brady:

I think that we now have a chance to supply our town with an abundant supply of good water, at a reasonable cost, and wish to submit the following scheme for the consideration of our people:

The plan is to drill a well on the Water and Light property, at the plant.

In the San Saba valley from Camp San Saba to Voca, they are getting flowing water at depths ranging from 400 to 700 feet. Just East of Brady, in the King well they struck the same sand at a depth of about 1000 feet. Mr. Morgan struck the water in the lime just above this sand at about 800 feet, in the Crothers place just north of Brady. The same flow of fresh water was struck on the Crew place this side of Rochelle, and drillers think that the same sands produce flowing wells in the valley North of Brady, at the Zellie place, in Lohn valley, and in the Deep Creek valley near Milburn and Mercury.

This water-bearing stratum dips to the North and West; but seems to underlie this county generally. It was found at the Douglas well, about 6 miles West of Brady at 1365 feet. It rises to the surface and flows in the low altitudes, viz, in the Colorado and San Saba valleys; but does not flow in the higher altitudes. We ought to be able to reach this sand at the plant at about 1100 feet, and ought to get the full benefit of the water production thereof at about 1300 feet. The water, when reached on this side of the mountain, has always been fine, and abundant, though we will likely have to lift it about 300 or 350 feet by pumping.

We can drill and equip this well for less than half of the funds that we have voted and sold bonds for, and have the funds on hand, dedicated and ready for that purpose, and I think that we should put down the well now, while we have drillers and machinery in the country, capable of the job.

Everybody talk it up and discuss it, and if you agree with me, let's go. I think that such a well with the supply that we have from the pools, will insure an abundant and permanent supply of nice water. We now have a good light plant, so let's finish the job with an adequate supply of good water.

Write about it, and let's meet and talk about it, and, if practical—it's a good thing. Push it along.

**ARE HOGS COTTON PEST EXTERMINATORS? PROFITABLE IF PRACTICAL**

**QUESTION INTERESTS COTTON MEN, WHO DESIRE FULL INFORMATION—STANDARD "STARTS SOMETHING" WITH ACCOUNT OF SWINE PASTURED IN FIELD.**

Is the hog to play a new and important part in the production of cotton in the South? The question arises from the news report which credited hogs in the Blanket community with exterminating the boll weevils in the cotton field of a farmer living in that vicinity. The article, reprinted in The Standard, came to the notice of A. M. Martin, at one time a Brady citizen, and now a member of the firm of Anderson, Clayton & Co., cotton factors at Houston, Texas. Mr. Martin inquires as to the authenticity of the article, and predicts, if true, that there is a great field ahead for hogs in the cotton growing country. To the best of The Standard's information, the pasturing of hogs in a cotton field will do exactly what the article stated, viz: rid the field of punctured forms, fallen squares and the boll weevils that cause the damage.

The following is the letter received from Mr. Martin, following the publication of the news item regarding what the hogs accomplished along the lines of boll weevil extermination:

"An article in your paper of September 28th, entitled 'Cotton Is Saved from Worms by Swine in Fields' has been read by me with a great deal of interest and sounds too good to be true.

"I would like to know if this is one of those fairy tales that float around in the papers or is it an actual fact. If this is a fact and can be relied upon you have given it entirely too small a space in your paper for if such results can be actually accomplished there is a great field ahead for hogs in the cotton growing country. And the newspapers should proclaim it in their largest type. Now is the time for The BRADY STANDARD to become famous in being the first paper to discover a profitable method of destroying the cotton pest. I am not joking but want to know what there is in this. And hope you will write me what you know about this and if you do not know anything definite suggest you investigate and hope you will advise me the result of your investigation. Best wishes to all Brady friends, and trust you will advise me at your earliest convenience regarding this HOG TAIL."

The Standard can claim no credit for being the original discoverer of this method of pest extermination. It merely reprinted the article from one of the state papers. However, if we can help the cotton-growing interests by giving the matter further publicity, we are only too glad to do so. The article was numerous copied, and given widespread circulation. The statement appears to be substantiated, however, in the experiences of other farmers. We direct attention to the statement made by J. T. Roberson (O. I. C. U. R. Right) in his letter from Wonder, Ore., and which appeared in The Standard of October 12th. The paragraph referred to reads:

"In The Standard I received today

Here is the article which aroused Mr. Martin's interest:

**COTTON IS SAVED FROM WORMS BY SWINE IN FIELDS**

Blanket, Texas, Sept. 20.—The browsing of swine in cotton fields will solve the cotton pest problem and treble the swine production of the State. W. B. Starley, living near here, will raise a half bale of cotton to the acre, while his neighbors will gather but little. Starley tells the secret. He has platted his cotton field into hog pens. The porkers are allowed to roam at will in the patches. They snout up the fallen forms, punctured by the pests and gather up the weevils that fall from the squares. Thirty-six pigs are growing fat and the cotton on the stalk is getting a chance to grow into white fleecy staple. The hogs also root about the rows, gathering up the larvae, but they do not uproot the plants. The droppings of the hogs also fertilize and build up the land.


with wisdom, is proven by the statement made to The Standard reporter a few weeks ago by Ernest Tetens of Lohn. Tetens reported having a splendid cotton crop, while his brother, whose cotton field is but a short distance away and separated only by a field, suffered heavy loss from boll weevils, and saw but little chance to make a crop. In discussing the difference in their yields, the Tetens boys referred to the article anent running hogs in the cotton patch. It developed that Ernest had pastured both hogs and turkeys in his cotton field, while his brother had not. Ernest says that while the hogs root along the furrows, they do not root up the cotton plants, so it would appear that there could be no possible objection to pasturing hogs in this manner. As a matter of fact, not only does the cotton appear to have been materially benefited, but the hogs themselves fattened on the feed thus obtained. The Standard, in common with Mr. Martin, would be pleased to have other farmers tell us of their experiences along this line, feeling assured that publicity of this sort will eventually redound to the benefit of the entire citizenship.
