## SOAKING RAINS GENERAL OVER THIS TERRITORY

Soaking rains fell over a wide territory in West Texas on Saturday night, and again on Sunday night. The total precipitation in Brady registered 1.4 inches, and an equal, or greater, amount was had over the entire county. The rain fell slowly, and was accompanied by a steady drop in the temperature, until a near-frost was registered.

The rain followed a period of about two months dry and pretty weather, which was especially favorable to the gathering of the cotton crop. The dry earth absorbed practically all of the moisture, and the dry holes on the various creeks took up the overflow, so that few, if any, of the creeks were caused to run, despite the considerable amount of the precipitation.

The rain was not especially desired by farmers gathering cotton, and will have a tendency to lower the grade of the fleecy staple. However, stockmen and farmers wishing to sow small grain are rejoicing over the precipitation, which was badly needed by them.

The return of sunny weather this (Tuesday) morning, will soon dry the fields, and cotton picking will again be rushed.

## JAS. E. FERGUSON, PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE HERE

For the first time in its history, Brady had within her borders a candidate for the presidency of the United States, in the person of Jas. E. Ferguson, who is running for the honor of the highest office in the land on the American Party ticket.

The ex-Governor was introduced by Judge Evans Adkins, who made it clear that he did not agree with Ferguson's policies, but officiated upon the occasion as a courtesy to the city's guest. Beginning with a small number present, the crowd was augmented by stragglers until the district court room was filled to about capacity. That there were many sympathizers in the audience was proven by the fact that Ferguson was cheered to the roof at times. Especially was this noticeable when he made statements in line with Republican policies.

Ferguson denounced Cox in strong terms, and was even more severe in censuring the Democratic party, predicting that the country would go to the bow-wows within five years if a change was not made. He tore the League of Nations into shreds, and presented the league in fanciful and farcical manner. He stated his opposition to woman suffrage, but did not touch upon the prohibition question. He also took a slam or two at Neff and predicted McGregor's election as governor of Texas by a large majority.

Ferguson stated that there were but two men in the presidential race—Harding and himself—and conceded that Harding would win in the Novem-

ber election, but predicted his own election four years hence, and gave warning to his audience that all who wanted postoffices then had better see him now.

## HAILSTONES RUIN 100 BALES COTTON NEAR BALLINGER ACCORDING TO REPORT

Ballinger, Texas, Oct. 20.—It is estimated that more than 1000 bales of cotton were destroyed by a heavy hail storm which struck in a thickly settled section of the county north of here late yesterday afternoon. The hail stripped everything in its path, extending ten miles long and five miles wide. A number of farmers lost their entire crops, having picked very little cotton.

BROWNWOOD MAN ROBBED AND MURDERED MONDAY

Brownwood has a startling murder mystery in the death Monday night of last week of J. N. Weatherby, proprietor of the Ford garage at that place.

"Brownwood was thrown into consternation about noon Tuesday when it was reported that the dead body of J. N. Weatherby, proprietor of the Ford Sales Station and garage in this city, had been found by the side of the new Bangs road about seven and one-half miles west of town.

"Tracks were visible around the car, and also going to and coming from the body but as to these the officers decline to say anything for publication.

"The exact spot where the body was found was just beyond the farm of Joe Orton. The body was found by C. N. Rogers and Travis Gilmore, employees of the Ford Garage and Filling Station, who had gone to ascertain the cause of the absence of Mr. Weatherby from the garage and from home, as inquiry had been telephoned to the garage by Mrs. Weatherby, who had become alarmed early this morning when her husband without speaking to her of any intention of being absent had failed to come home.

"The belief that Mr. Weatherby had gone out of town on a business trip was strengthened when the young men met Kavanaugh Smith, who had just come in and stated on meeting them that he had on coming through Bangs on the train this morning, seen an old and apparently broken down Maxwell car, standing near Bangs. Gilmore and Rogers believed this might be Mr. Weatherby's car and at once started for Bangs to investigate.

"It was then about ten or ten-thirty o'clock. A few miles out of town they came upon a piece of a Maxwell car that had evidently been jarred loose from a car that was being driven at a high rate of speed, when the piece was lost. The lost piece was examined and found to be a part of the old Maxwell car, so the young men stated, or near enough like some of the pieces of the car that they hurried on, still believing that Mr. Weatherby had broken down somewhere and needed help. A short distance further they came upon the car itself and as has been stated, found the body.

"The inquest held by Justice Cross developed the fact that the dead man's face had been beaten to a pulp, and his head crushed, as if by repeated blows by some heavy and blunt instrument.

"It had evidently been the intention of the murderer or murderers to take the body completely out of the country and conceal it. The trail of investigation by the county and city officials was then taken up and the result shows that they acted promptly and quickly.

"The only motive assigned for the murder is thought to be that of robbery as Mr. Weatherby is said to have had diamonds on his person valued at something like \$2500. The diamonds were missing when the body was found."

BRADY HIGH PLAYS EXCELLENT FOOTBALL BUT OVERWHELMED BY SAN SABA

Brady High played a spectacular game against overwhelming odds Saturday afternoon on the home gridiron, and won commendation for their pluck and gameness. The San Saba eleven outclassed them from the start but the locals won praise from the visiting coaches and players, and were credited with putting up better opposition to the San Saba bunch than that aggregation met with in playing the experienced Brownwood eleven. With a little more practice, and coaching, the locals are certain to play a game that will make hard sledding for their opponents. The visitors won Saturday's game by a score of 40 to 0.

To begin with, the locals were handicapped by the absence of two of their best players, and one of the team was on the gridiron for the first time with the local bunch. San Saba won her first touchdown in the first minute's playing, and proved strong on long forward passes. Her zig-zag playing behind the line was a new experience to the locals, and netted heavy gains for the visitors. On bucking the line and making short passes, the locals proved up strong. At one time they held the San Saba bunch for four downs before the visitors were able to make a yard gain for a touchdown.

The locals expect to get in training under the supervision of a good coach for the return match with San Saba on the 11th. In the meantime games are being negotiated with Santa Anna and Menard, and a return match with Mason is also to be played soon.

H. P. RODDIE, WIDELY KNOWN WOOL MERCHANT, MEETS UNTIMELY DEATH

A message received here last Friday morning from Dallas brought the shocking news of the death of H. P. Roddie, prominent citizen of Brady, and one of the most prominent and widely-known wool merchants in West Texas. Later information was that his death had occurred at the Southland hotel at 10:00 o'clock a. m. from a self-inflicted bullet wound, death being almost instantaneous. Discovery of the tragedy was first made by Bostic Roddie, brother of the deceased, who had accompanied him to the hotel, the two men being on their return home from Ada, Okla., where they had attended the funeral of their brother-in-law, G. A. Lindstrom, who had died at Alexander, La., on the 19th inst. Both Messrs. H. P. and Bostic Roddie had gone to Alexander upon receipt of news of the death of their brother-in-law, and had accompanied the funeral party to the home of their mother in Ada.

No reason can be assigned for Mr. Roddie's rash act. According to Bostic Roddie, his brother was in very good spirits upon their arrival in Dallas, and his only complaint had been that from the pain in his chest he feared he was developing pneumonia. Bostic laughed at his brother's alarm and apparently cheered him up. Then he sharpened his brother's razor and prepared his bath for him, following which H. P. requested that he bring him a pot of black coffee. When Bostic returned about twenty minutes later, he found his brother lying prone upon the bath-room floor, with the pistol lying at his side. Life was already extinct. The bullet had entered the left side, just missing the heart, and had emerged just above the hip, scarring the floor and finally imbedding itself in the door facing. That death was not instantaneous was indicated by the fact that deceased must have taken a step or two backwards before falling to the floor. His hand grip was found standing open, with his purse lying on top his clothes, and every indication pointed to his having opened the grip to place his purse therein, and, seeing his revolver, a sudden and irresistible impulse came over him to turn the deadly weapon upon himself. A man of quick decision, there seems small doubt but what his action was suited to the thought before more sober reflection could overcome the impulse.

The body was brought to Brady on Saturday morning's train, and conveyed to the residence of N. T. Cook, where funeral services were conducted on Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock by the Rev. J. H. Taylor. A large concourse of sorrowing friends was gathered to pay last tribute to the departed, and formed in funeral procession to the Brady cemetery, where interment was made.

Mr. Roddie came to Brady from Brownwood in 1910, establishing himself in the produce business with his brother-in-law, Henry McCully, now deceased. Mr. Roddie later acquired complete control of the business, operating under his own name and extending the business with branches at Menard, Eden and San Angelo. A man of wonderful business ability, and rare business acumen, his rise was rapid, and for the past five or six years he had been recognized as a leading factor in wool and mohair operations throughout West Texas, his operations covering all the western and southwestern portions of the state. Establishing substantial business connections in Boston and the East, he anticipated still further and greater business expansion, and his tragic end interrupts but half-completed plans for his re-establishment in business circles of Brady.

At the time of death, Mr. Roddie was aged 44 years, 11 months and 18 days. Surviving are his widow, and four children, Jack, aged 15, Frank, aged 13, and Bessie and Billie, aged 10. His mother, aged 68, two brothers, R. M. and W. S., and two sisters, Mrs. Linstrom and Miss Jennie Roddie, all of Ada, and a third brother, Bostic, of Dallas, also survive him. Attending the funeral from out-of-town were Messrs. R. M. and Bostic Roddie, and Mr. and Mrs. W. F. McCully and son, Oliver, of Brownwood, parents and brother of Mrs. Roddie.

The aged mother of Mr. Roddie was prostrated with grief, his death being the fourth in her family within the past year. Her husband departed this life in February, and death had also claimed a grand-daughter, and just the past week her son-in-law. Because of the mother's serious condition, the sisters of the deceased were unable to come to Brady for the funeral, and the other brother missed train connections in Dallas and was obliged to turn back home.

In their grief, the deep sympathy of all is extended those left to mourn.

Mrs. Finlay had been in bad health for a number of months, but her illness took a serious turn only about two weeks ago. At the time of death she was about 70 years of age.

Funeral services will be held at Fife Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, interment being made in the Fife cemetery.

The end came peacefully, with all her children surrounding her bedside. JERRY WRIGHT CASE AT ABILENE DISMISSED ON MOTION DISTRICT ATTY.

Jerry Wright was given a complete exoneration of the charge of theft of an automobile in the Abilene district court last week. The theft occurred on February 17, 1920, at Snyder, and Wright was placed under arrest by the Abilene officers when he drove the car about the block and parked it on a side street. The case was tried before a jury, and all evidence was submitted. Wright was taken in charge as he was trying out the automobile, and despite his protestations of innocence, was given no chance to prove to the officers that he was not in possession of the car, but merely on a trade for it.

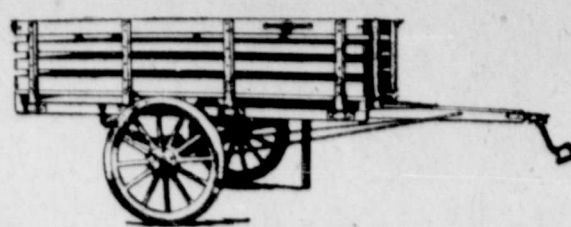
