S. C. DUNN PASTOR M.E. CHURCH HERE TRANSFER COWAN

The Rev. J. W. Cowan, pastor of the Brady Methodist church, returned Monday from San Marcos, Texas, where he had been in attendance upon the West Texas Methodist conference, at which he was transferred to the North Texas district. He left again Wednesday night to attend the North Texas conference, at which he will receive appointment of a pastorate for the coming year. S. C. Dunn of Sonora was given the Brady appointment, succeeding Bro. Cowan, and with his family is expected here the coming week.

The transfer of Bro. Cowan to the North Texas district was made at his own request, in order that he and Mrs. Cowan might be nearer their daughter, Miss Alma, who is attending T. W. C. at Fort Worth. The regret at the departure of this estimable family, is shared equally by Rev. and Mrs. Cowan and members of the Brady church, as well as the Brady citizenship in general, and all hope that his new appointment may prove a pleasant one. Wherever they may locate, the best wishes of their friends will accompany them. Rev. Cowan and family came here two years ago from Midland, and his pastorate has been most pleasant and successful, the local church enjoying a substantial growth, both in numbers and in spiritual strength.

Rev. Dunn and family are not entirely strangers here, he having held a meeting at the local church something like three years ago, and having previously held an appointment in this county. A cordial welcome to citizenship awaits Rev. Dunn and family. His first sermon at the Brady church will be preached a week from next Sunday.

The Rev. J. H. King, who was pastor of the local church something like ten years ago, and who is, therefore, well known to the local membership, was given the appointment of presiding elder, with headquarters at San Angelo. Rev. King succeeds the Rev. J. M. Perry, who was given the San Marcos appointment.

The Rev. I. T. Morris, former pastor of the Brady church, was returned to Sabinal.

BRADY KNIGHT TEMPLARS HAVE FIERY BANQUET

Brady Commandery, Knight Templars, No. 68, concluded a two-days' banquet Wednesday evening, the menu for which was prepared by Chef Sir Knight M. P. Wegner, ably assisted by Sir J. B. Whiteman. The piece-de-resistance proved to be chili con carne, a la Wegner. Place favors were crystal ice, served in cubes, and palmetto fans.

Prior to the banquet proper, Fire Chief Sir Whiteman explained to those assembled that, owing to the state fire insurance laws governing the storage of large quantities of combustibles, it was necessary to observe certain precautions. The place favors, ice and fans, were to serve a very useful purpose. By gently waving the fans over the edibles, flames might be produced for those desiring extreme flavor. Should the menu prove too fiery, the ice cubes were to be used as extinguishers (patent not applied for).

The coffee for the occasion was thrice tested, and improved upon, by no less personage than Sir Knight Jack Drago, the official coffee-maker of the Commandery, who finally pronounced it good, whereupon everyone present sampled the concoction and pronounced Sir Drago a most able judge of good things.

During the course of the banquet, lax observance of the fire rules caused an alarm of fire to be sounded, and smoke and flame was seen in the direction of Sir Knight J. H. Taylor. The cause of the conflagration was discovered to be that someone had inadvertently turned the fan on Bro. Taylor, instead of on the edibles. Prompt action saved the day, and Bro. Taylor proved himself a veritable fire-eater by emerging from the conflagration unscathed. Further investigation proved that Bro. Taylor had gone beyond due caution and was, at the time, consuming large quantities of the fiery elements being engaged with his second helping.

Music was served during the banquet by Sir Knights A. J. Ricks, O. B. Westbrook, and others, careful selections being played upon the piano. All present sounded high praises of Chief Wegner for his selection of elements that were fiery, and which entered into the menu.

Death of J. H. Daniels.
J. H. Daniels, prominent citizen of the Waldrip community, died suddenly Wednesday afternoon, after a brief illness. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon under auspices of the Five Masonic lodge, of which deceased was a member, interment being made in the Waldrip cemetery.

Mr. Daniels was aged about 65 years. He and his family have lived in the Waldrip community for the past fifteen years or so, coming to this time he was engaged in farming, and was regarded as one of the most substantial and prominent citizens in that section.

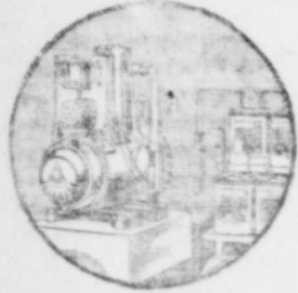

During the fall months I have so much to do and see after, that it is hard to get time to write, but now hope to be able from now on to be more regular with the Echoes.

Some have cotton in the fields yet and some are done and are helping those in other parts of the county who were more fortunate than this part of the county was this year in making cotton, but not so in any other product except cotton.

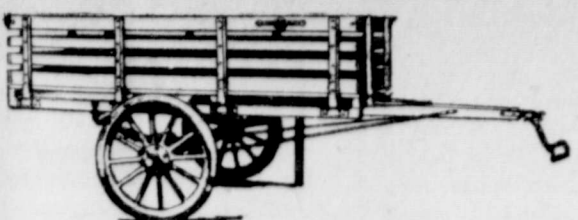
It is raining and has been for two or three days. It sure is soaking the ground full of water and is fine for fall planting of grain, but there is none sown as yet.

I am just a little bit late or just a little bit slow one or the other, or maybe both, but I am going to take this method of thanking the management of the McCulloch County Co-Operative Exhibit or fair for the fifty dollar premium awarded to Lost Creek for the small amount of interest that was taken by the citizens of Lost Creek. It looks like we got more than was deserving but Lost Creek will be in the ring next year from what I can learn of the citizenship.

So we thank all and thank all heartily and must say that the fair management was good and will be hard to improve on.

I see in The Standard of Oct. 22, the question "Are Hogs Cotton Pest Exterminators?" I do not question the honesty of the man at Blanket, neither do I question the fact that it is profitable to raise pigs in cotton fields for I have raised some good pigs in the field among the corn and cotton, but believe me I never did see the pigs feeding on anything but tender weeds. I have never seen a pig eating any part of a cotton plant except to chew up the seed or seed cotton. It appears to me that if a pig would pick up cotton squares that had been punctured and eat them they would eat the tender foliage of a cotton plant. But I have never seen one do it. However, I suppose they could be starved to it. So to be plain about the matter I think that pigs will not do any other good than to keep down weeds. But I do know what will be profitable and practical and that is chickens and turkeys. If a man had his field properly fenced and sufficiently stocked with chickens and turkeys, they will do no harm to the plant but will bug that cotton field every day over and over. What could a man stock his field with that will pay better than chickens and turkeys? Hoge will catch and eat grass-

hoppers, but a turkey will get two to the hog one. Now listen to this. A man who lives in or near Fredonia, Texas, told me that on his farm this year the boll weevils practically ruined the cotton crop. He said that his man had a patch of feterita or maize with a small patch of cotton planted between the house and the feterita patch. He said the chickens made daily trips to and from the feterita, going through the cotton. This cotton is making one-half bale per acre. The chickens did it. I have seen the chickens hunt the weevils and have seen them catch the weevils and eat them. This is more than any

man ever saw a pig do I am sure. So the chicken has the hog beaten. Chickens and turkeys will devour any insect that feeds on a cotton plant. So it will be both practical and profitable to raise turkeys and chickens in the growing cotton. But as to the beneficial effect of the pig it still remains a question.

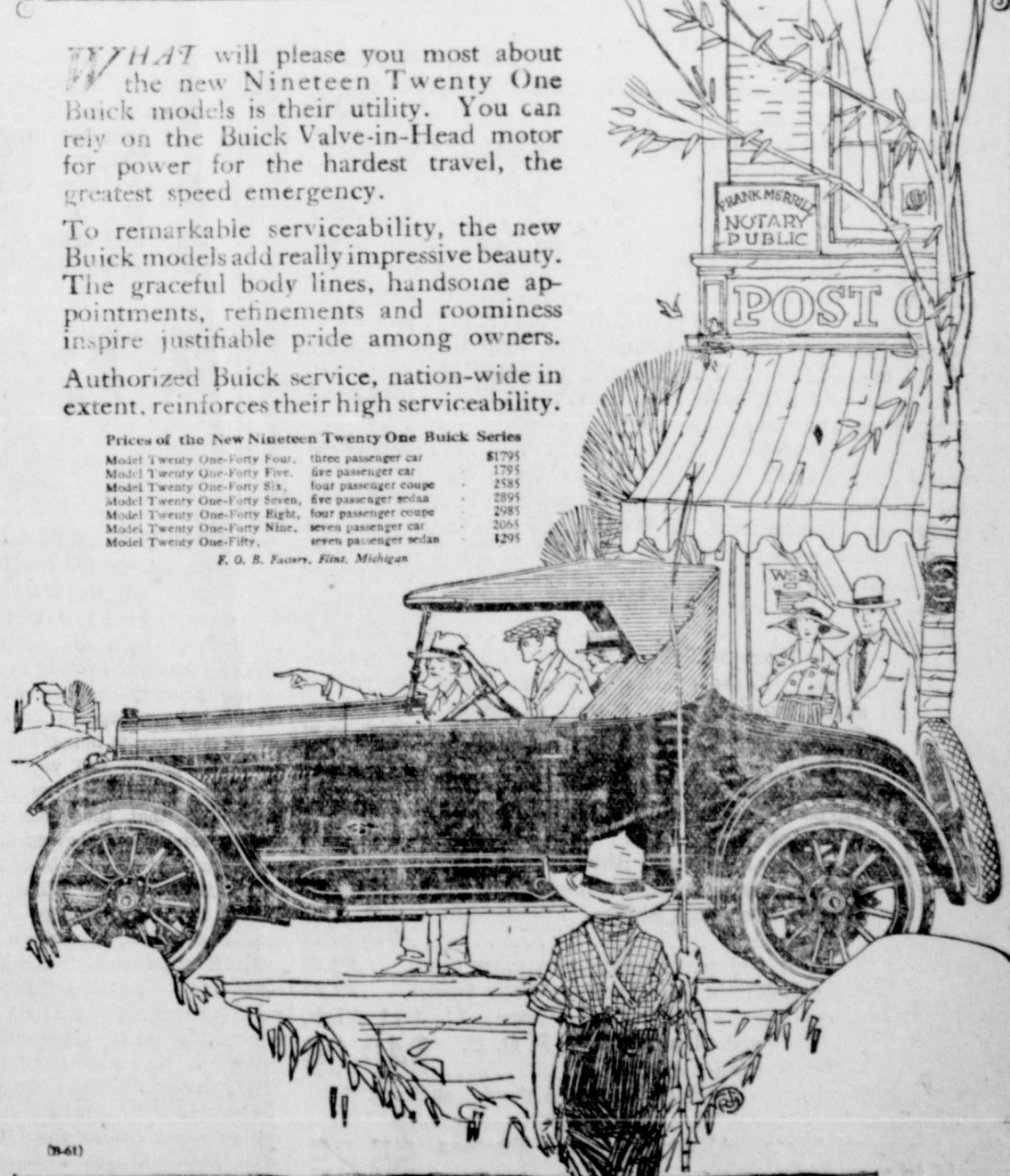

THE NOVEMBER ELECTION.

There are six tickets printed upon the ballot to be voted upon in the general election to be held next Tuesday, November 2nd—Democratic, Republican, Black-Tan Republican, American Party, Socialist and Independent—the latter being blank. Caution should be observed by all voters in the marking of their ballot so as to make their vote legal. To vote a straight ticket, all that is necessary is to scratch all tickets, except the one it is desired to vote. For instance, if the voter wants to vote the Democratic ticket straight, then he must scratch the Republican, Black-Tan Republican, American, Socialist and Independent tickets, leaving the Democratic column unmarked.

However, should it be the desire of the voter to vote a mixed ticket, then he must exercise care not to leave two names for the same office. All names for the same office must be scratched except the one desired by the voter. For instance, should he desire to vote for the Cox and Roosevelt electors and the county officers on the Democratic ticket, but for the nominees for state office on some other ticket, he should scratch out all presidential electors, and all county officers on all tickets except the Democratic, but should scratch the state officers he does not desire to vote for, on all tickets including the Democratic.

In scratching the ballot, care should also be exercised not to run the marks through the constitutional amendments at the bottom of the ballot, and these should be marked separately according to the voter's choice. There are three of these amendments.

The first amendment provides for giving incorporated towns, having less than 5000 population, the privilege of increasing their local tax rate by a majority vote. This amendment does not increase taxes. It merely confers the privilege to do so, provided a ma-

majority of the voters of any town are in favor of increasing the town tax. This amendment should carry, as nearly every small city in the State is in need of a higher tax rate to meet the necessary expenses of maintaining its schools and other departments of a city government.

The second amendment on the ballot is similar in intention to the first. It confers upon rural districts the privilege to increase their special school tax from the present maximum rate of fifty cents on the \$100 to one dollar on the one hundred dollars value of property. This amendment does not levy a tax; it merely confers the privilege and leaves it to each school district to determine by a majority vote whether or not the district desires to increase its school tax. This amendment, should also carry, and it is very important that voters who favor better schools, should vote for it.

The last amendment confers upon the Legislature the right to fix, in any amount they choose, the salaries of State officers and public officials, from governor down, whose salaries are now fixed by constitutional limitation. For instance, the salary of the governor of Texas is \$4000 a year. If this amendment is passed it empowers the Legislature to make the governor's salary, or that of any other state officer, any amount it chooses. It is hardly likely that the voters will endorse such an amendment, and a heavy vote will doubtless be cast against it.

BETTER SCHOOLS AMENDMENT.

Every citizen who believes in better schools—in giving the school children of Texas greater and more liberal education, in raising Texas from 39th rank among the states of the Union in Educational standing, should vote for the School Amendment in the general election next Tuesday. This amendment is the second printed at the bottom of the election ballot, and those favoring the same, should vote "FOR" the proposition, scratching out the paragraph reading "AGAINST."

CONGRESSMAN BLANTON, WHO WAS TO HAVE SPOKEN IN BRADY, CANCELS DATE

Congressman Thomas L. Blanton, who was to have spoken in Brady yesterday, as well as elsewhere in this vicinity during the week, in the interest of the National Democratic campaign and the San Francisco platform, has wired notice of cancellation of the engagements, assigning as reason that his aid is more urgently needed in contested states. Mr. Blanton had also challenged W. D. Cowan, candidate for Congress on the American Party ticket, to meet him at his appointments in joint debate and to defend the American Party platform. Cowan last week issued a statement through the San Saba Star declining to accept Blanton's challenge.

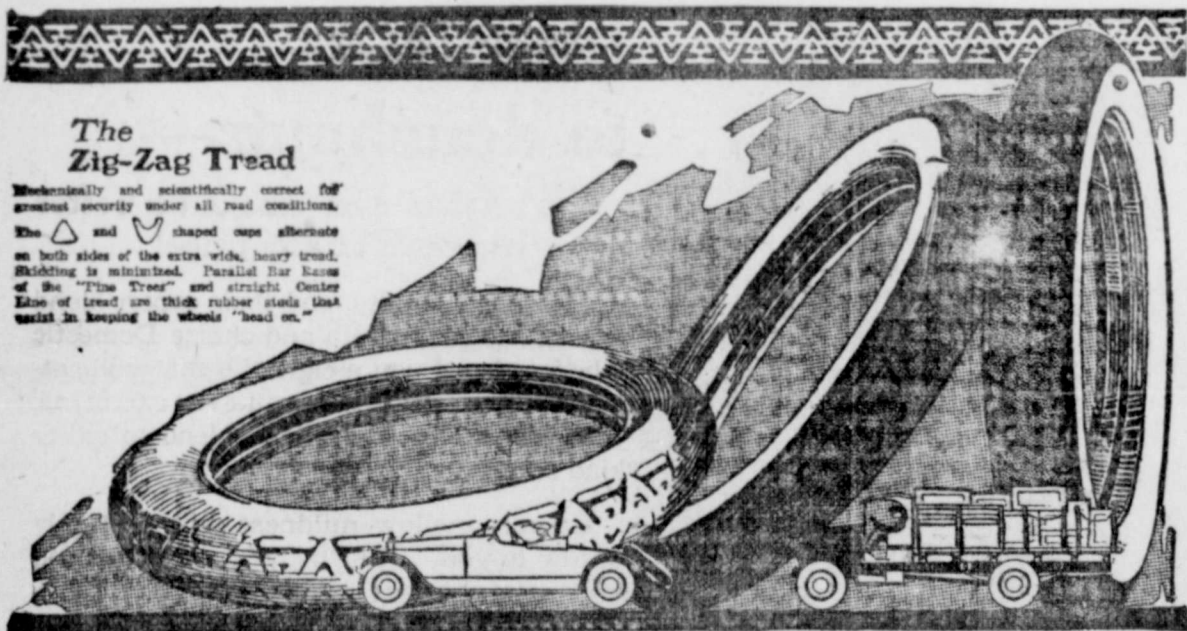

FRIENDS VERY SURE THAT H. P. RODDIE WAS SHOT BY AN UNKNOWN PERSON

A theory that H. P. Roddie met his death at the hands of some unknown assassin is occupying the attention of members of the family and friends of the deceased, and will be fully investigated. The fact that deceased had no apparent cause for the rash act, was in good health and spirits, and left no message as to any sinister intentions against his own life, gives credence to the theory. The Brownwood Bulletin has the following account of the manner in which Mr. Roddie is thought to have met his death: The death of H. P. Roddie at Dallas last Friday morning came as a painful shock to the many friends of the dead man and his numerous family connection in Brownwood and the Brownwood area. He was well known in Brownwood, being a son-in-law of Captain W. F. McCulley, and has been for a number of years until recently spending part of the wool buying season here looking after his large interests in this feature of business. He was especially interested in the wool industry and took keen interest in matters that pertained to that branch of development.

Those who have made a careful study of the incident that ended the life of the man authorize the statement that it is their firm opinion that he did not come to his death by his own hand, but that he was the victim of an unknown person who entered the room where he was staying, wrenched a pistol, which he had seized to defend himself against attack, from Mr. Roddie and shot him with his own gun.

H. P. Roddie, the victim of the tragedy and his brother, Bostic Roddie, were in the room of H. P. Roddie on the third floor of the Southland hotel. H. P. had prepared to take a bath, when he requested his brother to go down to a near-by cafe and bring up a pot of hot coffee. The brother went for the coffee and stated afterward that he was not gone more than fifteen minutes, when he returned and found his brother lying full length on the floor in the bath room, his pistol on the floor near one of his hands, and a pool of blood under his breast. The bullet that did the fatal work had been fired from the front and upper part of the breast and had ranged downward, coming out just above the belt line at the rear and slightly to the left. It struck the floor and lodged in the opposite wall, where it was subsequently found. Evidence has been collected that will show that a man to whom Mr. Roddie had given a check for one hundred dollars, was very much wrought up over the fact that the check had not been honored and the belief is that it might have been this man who entered the room of Roddie to seek settlement, but instead of approaching Roddie in the proper way, undertook to chastise or abuse him and fearing personal violence, Roddie reached in his grip for the pistol with which to defend himself, when as stated, the assailant wrenched it out of his hand and shot

Roddie with his own pistol, and made his escape before anybody could reach the scene of the tragedy. Attendant circumstances seem to corroborate this view of the case.

There is no reason nor motive whatever, in the suggestion that the death of Mr. Roddie was caused by suicide. His home life was pleasant and he was surrounded with everything that could in any way make life worth living. From a financial point of view he was in excellent condition. His assets are said by those who knew the exact truth of the matter to be far above and exceeding his liabilities, and his business in every way was in first-class condition. As a business man his rating was "A1" throughout the financial world, and this should certainly off-set any intimation that he would take his own life because of financial troubles.

The body was shipped to the family home at Brady, where the funeral took place Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock, witnessed and attended by the largest concourse of people, probably that ever assembled in the capital of McCulloch county. Many kind and loving tributes from friends, relatives and acquaintances, far and near were received and the floral offerings were of large volume.

Captain and Mrs. W. F. McCulley, accompanied by their daughter, Mrs. Roddie, and children returned to Brownwood Sunday evening and Mrs. Roddie and children will remain here for a time. W. O. McCulley and family also returned from Brady Sunday evening.

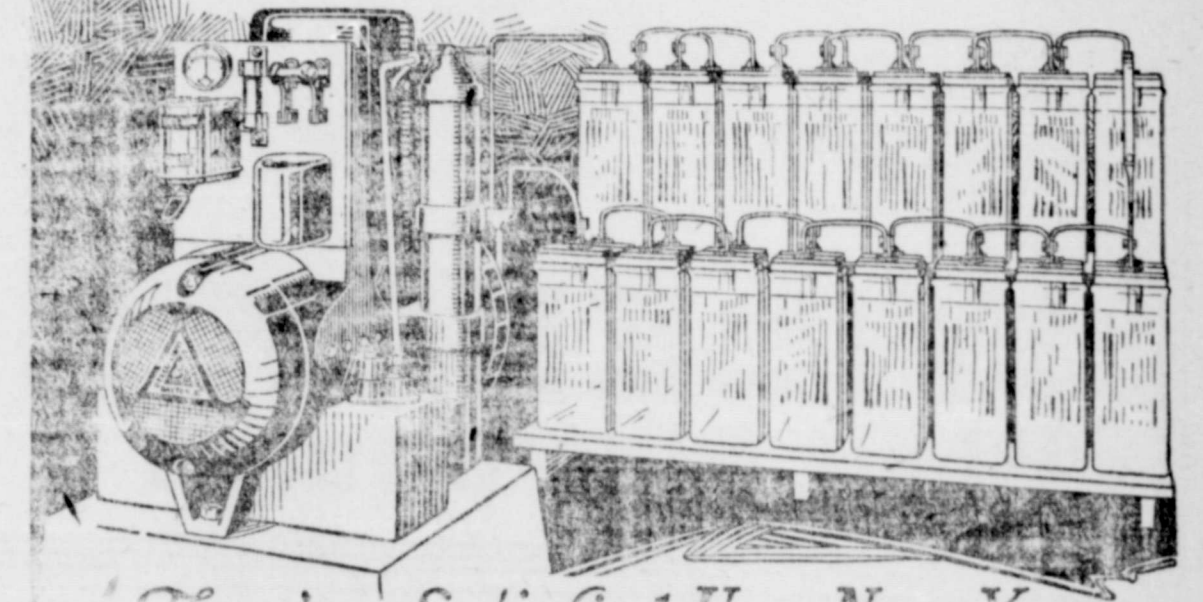

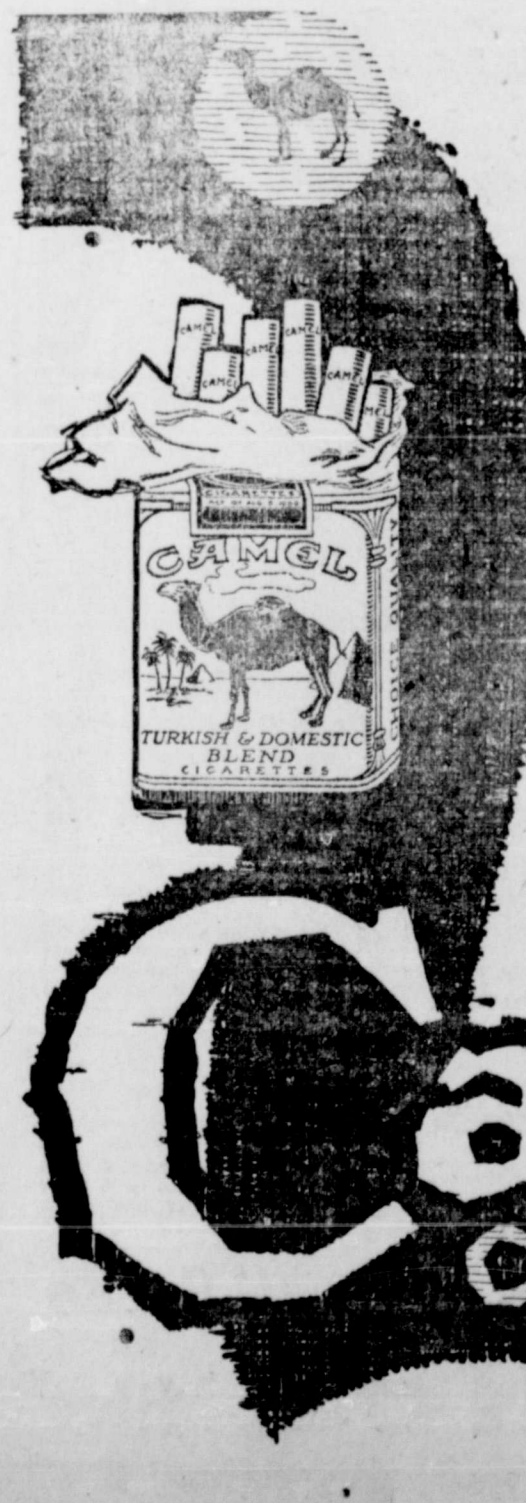
