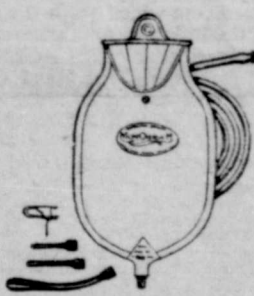

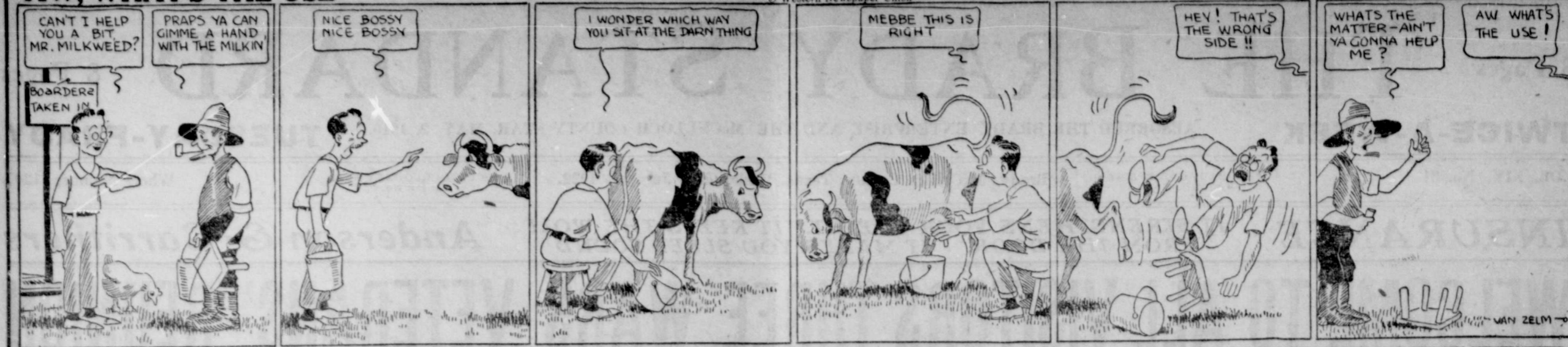

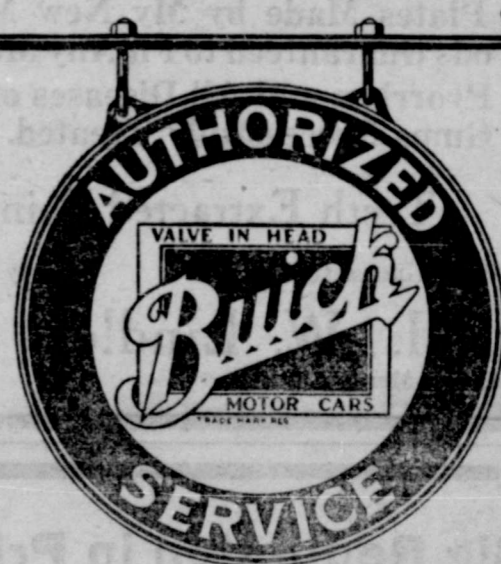

City of Brady, Texas, June 20, 1922. The City Council of the City of Brady, Texas, was convened in regular session in the City hall, in the City of Brady, on the 20th day of June 1922.

PRESENT: E. L. Jones Mayor; J. H. Ogden, W. F. Roberts, C. A. Trigg, B. Simpson, Aldermen, and E. G. Gilder, City Secretary, when among other proceedings, were had to-wit: It was moved by W. F. Roberts, Sr. and seconded by C. A. Trigg that an ordinance entitled:

"An Ordinance Ordering a Special Election to be held in the City of Brady Under Provisions of Article 1016, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, to Determine Whether or Not said City Shall Accept the Benefits of Chapter 11, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, Providing that Cities Accepting Its Benefits Shall Have Power to Improve Any Street, Avenue, Alley, Highway, Public Place or Square, or Any Portion Thereof, Within Their Limits, by Filling, Grading, Raising, Paving or Repaving the Same in a Permanent Manner, or by the Construction or Reconstruction of Sidewalks, Curbs and Gutters, or by Widening, Narrowing or Straightening the Same, and to Construct Necessary Appurtenances Thereto, Including Sewers and Drains Making Provision for the Holding of said Election, and Declaring an Emergency," to be placed on its first reading.

Ayes: 4. Nays: 0. Motion carried, and the ordinance was read in full by the Secretary. Moved by C. A. Trigg, and seconded by J. H. Ogden that the Ordinance pass its first reading.

Ayes: 4. Nays: 0. Motion carried. Moved by W. F. Roberts, Sr., and seconded by B. Simpson, that the ordinance be placed on its third reading and final passage by caption.

Ayes: 4. Nays: 0. Motion carried. Moved by B. Simpson, and seconded by W. F. Roberts, Sr., that the ordinance be placed on its third reading and final passage by caption.

Ayes: 4. Nays: 0. Motion carried. Moved by C. A. Trigg, and seconded by J. H. Ogden, that the ordinance be passed finally.

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WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Brady, Texas, has determined the immediate advisability of holding an election to determine whether or not said City shall adopt the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas; and

WHEREAS, Article 1016, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, provides that in such instances a special election shall be called by said City for said purpose, and that said election shall be held as nearly as possible in compliance with the law with reference to regular city elections in said City, but empowering the governing body by resolution to order said election and prescribe the time and manner of holding the same;

Therefore, Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Brady, Texas, that a special election be held in the City of Brady, Texas, at the Court House, which is the regular polling place for said City, on the 5th day of September, A. D., 1922, to determine whether or not said city shall adopt or reject the benefits of the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas.

All resident property taxpayers who are qualified voters of said City shall be entitled to vote at said election. Said election shall be held in accordance with the general laws of the State of Texas, the provisions of the charter of said City, and in accordance with ordinances which affect the manner of holding elections in said City.

The following officers are appointed to conduct said election in accordance with law: E. E. POLK, Presiding Judge. A. B. CARRITHERS, Judge. J. E. WHITEMAN, Clerk. W. H. BALLOU, Clerk.

At such election those favoring the adoption of the benefits of the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, shall have written or printed on their ballots: "For the adoption of the benefits of the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, governing street improvements," and those opposing the adoption of the benefits of the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, shall have written or printed on their ballots: "Against

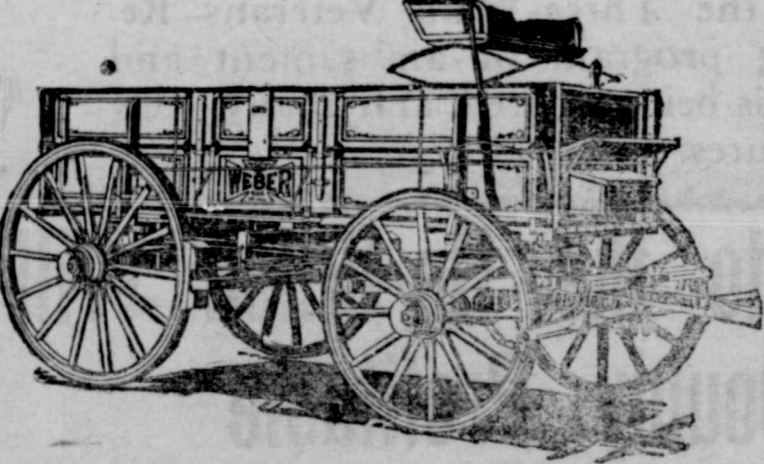

MEERS WELL TEST 34 BARRELS OIL ON ZELLE NO. 1

The Texas-Meers Oil Company's Zelle No. 1 in McCulloch county, 23 miles northwest of Brady and 72 miles southeast of San Angelo, tested 34 barrels of oil June 23 in eighty feet of sand, struck at 385 feet. Drilling through this sand will be begun sometime this week. Jeff Meers, head of the company, announced today. The well is on the west eighty acres of J. P. Sheridan Survey No. 2. Gas which was encountered when the bit hit the sand continues to flow.

Jeff Meers retains leases on 1,440 acres two miles due west of the Lohn shallow field, having sub-leased 480 acres of his original holdings. He is now negotiating with California interests to put down thirteen shallow wells on this tract. Mr. Meers is operating only 55 miles southwest of the new field at Pioneer. His Jeff Meers Oil Company's Zelle No. 2 tested five barrels of oil in from four to six inches of sand struck at 375 feet. This well is 1,000 feet north and 35 degrees east of the Texas-Meers Oil Company's Zelle No. 1.

One thousand feet north and 35 degrees west of the Texas Meers' Zelle and equidistant southwest of the Jeff Meers Zelle No. 2, the Prairie Oil & Gas Company, in drilling to 3,500 feet over two years ago, struck a shallow sand at 395 feet. Gas developed at 1,140 feet and the Strawn sand was entered at 1,255. In the Bend formation, oil was found at 1,750 feet, the sand extending to 1,805 feet. Thus, Mr. Meers has a triangle, each side of which is 1,000 feet, which may be correctly considered proven shallow territory.—San Angelo Standard.

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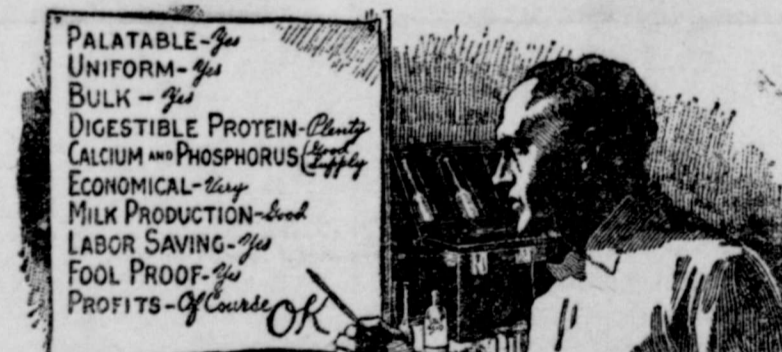
