



The community exhibit was simply grand; many of the people told me it was equal to the Dallas fair. The live stock and poultry department was good. But the judging was a failure in some respects. I do not envy the community because they received a higher score than we did. If it was due them they justly deserved it, and sick quite a while, I am glad to re- I am glad they did so well. But listen! Lost Creek had live stock in the parade and on exhibit and some Sunday with his parents, Mr. and poultry, but I see nothing but 0 0 in the final score. Lost Creek received fourth prize on booth score, according to the judges. But accord ing to the judgment of at least one thousand people who told me that Lost Creek was the best booth in the hall, it seems different. I had men of worth tell me they had been to State fairs and even World fairs and they said we had products in our booth that excelled anything they had ever seen in all their travels. We exhibited ten varieties of fresh vegetables; we exhibited five distinct varieties of fresh fruits; five distinct varieties of farm grains, besides pumpkins and potatoes; we had fiftyfive jars of canned goods of all varieties of fruits, vegetables and jellies and more pecans than all the rest combined; and crochet and needle work and paintings too numerous to mention, as fine as silk and not a prize on any of it. Of course, Lost Creek being the smallest district I think in the county, was foolish, in the outset, to think they could compete for prizes against large, consolidated districts, like Montgomery-Voca districts, or Lohn-Fairview and others; but we folks are ambitious and do not believe in letting anything like the county fair pass us by without taking stock. 



EARLY MARKETING OF TUR-KEYS MOST PROFITABLE IS OPINION OF STATE DEALERS

Local produce dealers are of the pinion that early marketing of turkeys this year will be most profitable, and they will urge turkey growers to arrange to bring in their turkeys just as soon as the Thanksgiving market is open. They base their opinion upon the fact that statistics show about 3,000,000 pounds of dressed turkeys held over from last year on cold storage in Chicago and New York, and also the threatened compeition of birds shipped from South America, Australia and New Zealand by packing house interests.

The following article, reprinted from the Fort Worth Record of Ocober 26th, is said to set forth the situation very plainly:

John Collier of the Fort Worth Poultry and Egg company, predicts cheaper Thanksgiving turkeys this places. year. He recently attended a convention of produce dealers of Texas visible supply obtained.

In discussing the situation, he high school exhibit,

"Consumers throughout the United States, who have been complaining view. of the high cost of living, will be much pleased to know that their Thanksgiving and Christmar turkey is to be much cheaper this year than it has been since 1912.

"The dealers throughout Texas, assembled at Dallas, in their annual convention, have compiled their figures and find there will be between 600 and 700 carloads of dressed turkeys shipped out of the state of Texas between now and January 1,

"The dealers in Chicago and New York City still have on hand three nillion pounds of dressed turkeys, which were bought one year ago, and which must be sold this year to be Dodge. consumed at Thanksgiving time and enough other poultry to total 25,- Creek. 883,000 pounds.

"Salesmen have been in Chicago and New York from Australia and New Zealand trying to make contract with the Chicago dealers for turkeys to be shipped from these countries which will arrive during December.

"Representatives of packing house interests in South America have been forwarding many heavy shipments of fine dressed turkeys during the past two months and they estimate during the next twelve months they will Sweden. have approximately five million pounds of South American turkeys to be distributed from New York city.

"Texas leads all the other states in the union in the number of turkeys raised and shipped out of the state; view. and it is estimated that the present crop will bring into the state about 31/2 million dollars.

"Nearly all the dealers feel that the turkeys marketed in November will bring more money than those held back and sold late in Decem-

"That lower prices must prevail to the producer of turkeys this year, than last year, can easily be understood, when it is known that the dealers in the East and North have lost as much as 15 cents per pound on carloads of turkeys bought in Texas last year. This loss was partially brought about by the fact that France and Ireland shipped in large quantities of turkeys which sold in the New York market in direct competition with the Texas turkey.



ERECTED TO PERPETUATE MEMORY OF TRAIL DRIVERS

All patriotic Texans are urged to contribute from five dollars up, towards the erection of a monument to the old time trail drivers-the men who "went up the trail" to Kansas in the early days. The Old Time Trail Drivers Association, of which Geo. W. Saunders of San Antonio, is organizer and president, has started a movement to erect a \$30,000 monument at Brackenridge park, San Antonio, which is the logical point on the old trail. Every individual who contributes ar much as five dollars will be listed and his or name will be printed in a neatly bound booklet which will be sent free to all contributors. It will contain interesting facts about the aims and purposes of the association as well as data in reference to trail driving.

The early cowboys blazed the way for the civilization we today enjoy; they had a part in the history of our great state, and we should perpetuate their memory by erecting this monument. A Texan cannot stand on the field of San Jacinto without feeling a greater devotion to his state: he cannot stand within the sacred precincts of the Alamo, where men died for others, without having his heart purged of selfishness; he cannnot think of the old cattle trail without remembering the sacrifices and dangers encountered by the pioneers of a great industry -the cattle industry of our state.

The Northern Trail started in 1867 and closed in 1895. During those 28 years 9,800,000 cattle and 1,000,000 horses were driven out and sold by the trail drivers, which, estimated \$10 per head, amounted to a grand total of \$108,000,000 which was placed in circulation during those years by the establishment of the cattle industry. At the close of the Civil War and during the early seventies our ranges were overstocked with cattle. There was no money in the state. It was up to the early cowmen to find a market for their cattle, and the great problem was solved by a few of our most venturesome cowmen driving small herds to Kansas in 1867 and 1868, and from that time on until the trail closed a steady stream of herds was kept up and the ranges the different states were gradually stocked, bringing to Texas that prosperity which has existed for so many years.
