IN 1910 the Santa Fe built to Brady, giving an outlet to the Gulf coast. This was followed by the designation of Brady as the junction of five highways, two of which have received official recognition by the Federal highway department, viz: The Fort Worth-Brady-Stockton, and the Puget Sound-to-the-Gulf. Located as it was in the center of a rapidly developing agricultural and stock country, and commanding an immense trade territory, it was but natural that Brady's growth should be steady and continued.

But citizens and visitors alike will tell you that all these years Brady has been taking root, and it is only in the past twelve months that she has given evidence of a growth and development which promises to land her in the real "city" class within the next few years. The citizens, themselves, feel the change in public spirit and remark among themselves about it—and the visitor is at once impressed by the way Brady's live-wire citizens are building their city of the future.

Perhaps this new growth and new spirit harks back to the day when Brady's wonderful artesian water supply was first secured at a depth of 2111 feet. Certainly, nothing could have been a greater boon to the city for Brady's reservoir on Brady creek had proven inadequate, and Brady was right on the verge of a water famine when this inexhaustible artesian supply was struck. Brady now boasts of clear, sparkling water—the purest and best in Texas, and the supply shows not the least sign of being diminished when the pumps made a test of pumping double Brady's present consumption.

WITH an unlimited supply of water at its command, it was natural that Brady's first step should be to

beautify her home surroundings. The Brady Civic League added incentive to this move by offering prizes in a "Brady Beautiful" contest which proved so popular that it is to be made an annual event, and liberal prizes are to be offered next year by the Brady water commission.

The next big step in civic progress was taken early this spring when the Brady Chamber of Commerce co-operated with the Brady city council in the establishment of a tourist camp park, conceded by visitors to be one of the best and most attractive in Texas. A screened-in camp house is provided, with ample camp ground in a shady pecan grove along Brady creek, where fishing is fine, and where a bathing pool provides every form of aquatic amusement. Free wood, light and water is provided, and signs placed upon all roads leading into the city direct the visitors to the tourist park.

Then followed the order of the commissioners court ordering the removal of the public hitch rack and fence from about the court house yard, and its conversion into a plaza. A wide sweep of walk now encircles the court yard in a great oval, with lateral walks leading to the four main entrances of the court house. Flower beds are provided for, and will be superintended by the ladies of the Civic League. And, nestling among the leafy trees, is set a most attractive and substantial building of steel and concrete—the McCulloch county rest room. It has proven a wonderful boon to the visiting ladies, and is acclaimed as one of the greatest things the county has done for its citizens. So what was once a nuisance and an eye-sore, has, in the course of just a few months, been converted into one of the most beautiful spots in this section of Texas. Sub-

BRADY: JUNCTION POINT FOR HIGHWAYS AND RAIL LINES

GEOGRAPHICAL CENTER OF TEXAS IS ENJOYING STEADY GROWTH, AND NOW PROMISES FASTER PACE—ENTHUSIASM OF CITIZENS AT HIGHEST POINT.

The town of Brady, located in McCulloch county, and in what is popularly known as West Texas (although the geographical center of the State lies but 20 miles northeast of Brady) cannot be termed a youngster, although it really is one when compared with the older towns of the State. It was located in 1876 and, with a vision of its future importance, it was called Brady City. Gradually it emerged from the village class, and the word "city" was dropped as no longer required in the designation of the city. The Frisco railroad came to Brady in 1903 and helped its progress and development wonderfully. Gradually permanent business houses replaced many of the wooden shacks dating back to pioneer days; beautiful residences were built; the citizens voted bonds for the purpose of taking over the water and light works, and establishing both a municipal waterworks and light and power plant, equipping it with one of the best filtering plants in the State.

substantial concrete benches placed beneath the trees offer a resting place for visitors. The final touch in this work of beauty is to be found in the ornamental light posts, which surround the entire plaza and which will furnish illumination for the same.

NOR are the county commissioners the only progressives, for the Brady city council, itself, is composed of a live bunch, working harmoniously and zealously to promote the city's interests. Here is the list of accomplishments of the Brady city council since the spring election in April: Ordered election for adoption of statutes governing street paving, sewer and sidewalk construction, etc. This was carried by a large majority, and Brady is now in line for street paving, a sewer system, several miles of sidewalk, and other civ-

ic improvements. Established an annual park fund, which has enabled the city to take over Brady's 40-piece band, which henceforth becomes the Brady Municipal band; and also enables park improvement and extension. Has relieved the merchants of the burden of providing a night watchman, and also the citizenship of the care and maintenance of the Brady cemetery, both of which now become municipal projects. Has authorized Brady's "white way," and also the installation of street lights along the main residential streets. This latter is the most recent act of the city fathers, and the installation of concrete turning posts throughout the business section has already been completed, and, within a few weeks Brady's "white way" will be a reality. Each of the turning posts

will be surmounted by ornamental light posts, which, in conjunction with the county's lights about the court house plaza, will give Brady the most attractive "white way" of any city of its size in the South.

And the Brady school board—don't forget to list them among the live wires. At the request of the board, the citizens of Brady recently went the limit in voting bonds for a new high school building. The board has just selected the location for the new building on a high elevation, commanding a view of the entire town, and has let the contract for a building strictly modern and complete to the last detail. Incidentally, the board has provided a new school building for the Mexican pupils, in addition to the colored school already maintained.

It is but natural that the citizenship should center their activities in the Brady Chamber of Commerce, thereby making it a wonderfully efficient organization. With the election recently of Wm. D. Cargill as secretary, a budget was subscribed to assure the carrying out of many projects of interest and benefit to every citizen in the county. These include a program of "more hens, more cows and more sows" on the farm; the creating of better marketing facilities; the building of highway systems throughout the county; the underwriting of a great county exhibit which is to be made an annual affair, and many others.

THEN there followed the organization of a luncheon club, founded upon the Rotarian principle of "service before self," and which hopes in the near future to be officially recognized as the Rotary club of Brady. Its members are behind every move for the good of town and country. Through their efforts, there has been

organized a home building association, which already has its second home completed. The fostering of the Brady "white way," was another of their undertakings. Now free city mail delivery, together with a sidewalk building campaign, the numbering of the houses and the designation of all streets by markers, is a project upon which the club has centered its activities and will put over. The highways improvement projects are also receiving endorsement and active support from the club. Another big undertaking is the sponsoring of a movement to secure the 1924 convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and every effort will be made to have Brady named the convention city for the meeting at that time.

It follows as a matter of course that this spirit of enterprise and progress should find expression in the growth of business and residential sections of the town, and both are enjoying an unprecedented building boom. In addition to the two houses built by the local building and loan association, numbers of other modern residences are under construction and being contracted. Three new business blocks are also being completed. The Gibbons block, a two-story building, occupying the main business corner of the square, provides two additional store rooms, both of which are already occupied, and also several suites of up-to-date offices. The Ogden-Bell block, now nearing completion, will give Brady three additional store buildings, and the S. W. Hughes block provides a handsome addition to the south side of the square. The completion of the new Brady compress gives Brady one of the most modern of plants, with a capacity of 1000 bales pressed per

**STOCK COMPANY IS FORMED TO BUILD
MODERN \$50,000 HOSTELRY IN BRADY**

BRADY HOTEL COMPANY FORMED WITH \$50,000 CAPITAL STOCK FULLY SUBSCRIBED — THREE-STORY BRICK STRUCTURE TO GRACE N.-W. CORNER SQUARE.

With a capital stock of \$50,000, fully subscribed, the Brady Hotel Company has been formed for the express purpose of building a modern, \$50,000 hostelry on the northwest corner of the square. Articles of incorporation are to be filed at once, and following the issuing of a charter, the company will be permanently organized, and contract for the new structure will be let without delay. It is planned to have the building completed and ready for the public by March 1st. A 20-year lease has been made C. C. McBurnett, proprietor of the St. Angelus and Landon hotels at San Angelo, and one of the best hotel men in West Texas.

In the building of this hotel, Brady foundations will be constructed sufficiently heavy to enable the addition of two stories, whenever the need appears. With a south frontage, the building will provide store space as well as lobby and dining room on the first floor. The second and third floor will each provide 26 rooms, giving 52 rooms in all. Thirty-four of the rooms will have connecting baths, while the rooms on the north side will be without bath. The construction of the second and third floors will be such as to make all outside rooms.

The above is an outline of the plans tentatively agreed upon; however, Architect Roy E. Lane of Waco, who drew the plans, and C. C. McBurnett, the proprietor, will be in Brady Thursday, at which time a meeting of the stockholders will be called and the plans finally decided upon.

The new hotel will be furnished in sumptuous manner, the furnishing to cost not less than \$20,000. According to the terms of Mr. McBurnett's lease, he is to furnish the hotel complete, and he will go to Grand Rapids Mich. and Chicago in January to purchase the fixtures.

Following the subscribing of the capital stock, a temporary organization was formed with W. D. Crothers, president; C. H. Vincent, vice-president; F. R. Wulff, secretary; W. H. Ballou, treasurer. In celebration of the momentous occasion, President Crothers, accompanied by the enthusiastic share-holders, proceeded at once to the hotel site, and turned the first spadeful of dirt for the new Brady Hotel.

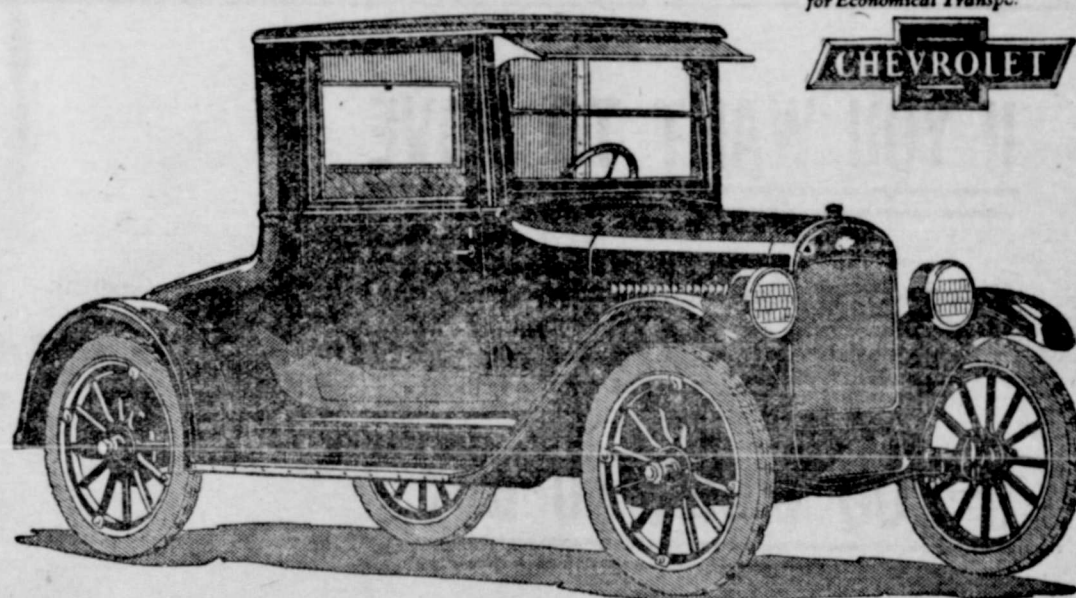

TWO BIG DEALS IN BRADY BUSINESS PROPERTY CONSUMMATED PAST WK.

F. W. HENDERSON BLOCK, NORTHWEST SIDE SQUARE, BOUGHT FOR \$32,000 BY SYNDICATE—ANOTHER COMPANY PURCHASES E. B. RAMSAY BLOCK.

Two of the largest deals in Brady business property have just recently been consummated, in the purchase, by syndicates of local citizens, of the F. W. Henderson block on the northwest side of the square, and also the purchase of the E. B. Ramsay block cornering on the southwest corner of the square and extending one block west. The first-named property changed hands at a total consideration of \$32,000, while the latter was purchased for \$12,500. Both pieces of property were purchased as most desirable investments.

Acting in behalf of a syndicate composed of himself, J. A. Maxwell, Walter Morrow, G. R. White, H. F. Schwenker, G. C. Kirk, H. H. Sessions and H. P. Jordan, B. A. Hallum closed the deal with Mr. Henderson. The property in question is composed of Lots 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 in Block 11 of Fulcher addition and has a frontage of 110 ft. with a depth of 90 ft. Occupants of the property are the Simpson & Co. garage, J. H. Behrens Grocery Store, Behrens Bros. Meat market and the Blue Ribbon bakery. The property was acquired in 1916 by Mr. Henderson for \$16,000, and, therefore, at its present purchase price shows a gain of 100% in value in the period of six years.

Mr. Hallum has one-fourth interest in the company Mr. Sessions and Mr. Jordan, one-sixteenth each, and the remaining members have a one-eighth interest each.

The new owners plan to materially improve the property, and expect to make it not only one of the most attractive business blocks in town, but one of the best business locations as well.

E. B. Ramsay Deal.

The purchase of the E. B. Ramsay property was consummated by H. P. Jordan, acting upon behalf of a syndicate composed of H. C. Samuel, B. A. Hallum, W. H. Ballou, R. Wilensky, Sam McCollum, Bailey Jones, H. H. Sessions and himself. The first four each have one-sixth interest in the newly-acquired property, while the last four each have one-twelfth interest. The property is composed of Lots 1 to 9 in Block 17,

Fulcher addition, and has a frontage of 200 ft. with a depth of 90 ft., including everything in the half block. Part of the property is improved, and is occupied by the Murphy Filling Station, Smith Bros. Barber Shop, Ramsay Paint and Paper shop and Carpenter shop, and Williams Repair shop. A residence occupies the balance of the property. It is the plan of the new owners to at once improve the property, which, on account of its location on the direct road to the Tourist park, is certain to enhance materially in value and attractiveness as business property.

"That Telephone is Out of Order"

day, and with 80,000 square feet of wharfage — ample to accommodate 6000 bales. The Embury gin, destroyed a year ago, has been replaced with a gin of the latest model. The Texas Company spent a large sum of money in the construction of a new warehouse, together with reservoirs and wharfage on the railroad right of way. The Mayhew Produce Co. has completed a cold storage plant, by means of which the company will be able to refrigerate the many carloads of dressed turkeys and chickens shipped to northern and eastern markets by the firm each year during the pre-Thanksgiving and pre-holiday season.
One of the greatest forward steps has been the organization of a stock company to build a new \$50,000 hotel for Brady. Stock has all been subscribed and application is to be made at once for a charter. The new structure will grace the northwest corner of the public square, and will be modern and complete to the last detail.
Small wonder, then, that citizens and visitors alike perceive the different spirit that pervades the Brady atmosphere—the concrete facts are before their eyes, where none may mistake them. RIGHT WHERE IT GROWS.

The committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce which recently toured cotton mill States of the South in search of data which would prove useful in determining the future of cotton manufacturers in West Texas has returned with words of encouragement. The undertaking of the investigation is a bit of enterprise which ought itself to be commended. On the face of things, taking cotton out of the gin directly into the mills seems to be a part of good business. We grow the cotton, we gin it, we grade it. Also we wear it, sleep under it, some of us. But between the time we sell it and the time we buy it back again the cotton has gone on a meandering trip up one railroad and down another, with perhaps a coastwise trip or ocean voyage or two thrown in. And the only reason for our buying all that freight in addition to the actual factory cost of the goods is that we haven't the factories.

Strictly speaking, we do have the factories—and most of them are making satisfactory profits. But we haven't many of them. The point to the report of the committee is that the data of the Southeastern States can be made to support the proposition that more mills will pay in Texas. It may be hoped that an investigation of Texas mills will be undertaken more in detail by way of confirmation and emphasis of the findings just reported.

It is noteworthy that the committee stresses sociological conditions in mill towns. There have been mill towns where these were bad. The committee found them good, however, at the towns visited. At the present prices of finished goods, as well as of other mill products, it is possible for the mill worker to send his children to school, the committee finds. The committee doesn't say so, but evidently believes, that mills can consistently make a profit without taking it out of the privations of underpaid labor. If that be so, it disposes of the only objection imaginable to putting cotton mills in the premier cotton State and spinning the staple where it grows. No underpaid industry can long exist in Texas, because there is too much competition from better-paid work. But a well-paid industry operating in the midst of a prosperous people and with the raw material at its door needs only skillful management to succeed.—Dallas News.

The care of trees is fittingly discussed by W. Goodrich Jones of Waco. He says:

"The bleak November days have come, and the smoke of burning tree leaves can be seen in every street. But why burn the leaves? Nature does not destroy this much-needed fertilizer, but lays them carefully on the forest floor to enrich the soil."

"About 95 per cent of the tree's food is absorbed from the air and about 5 per cent from the soil. The tree's main sustenance is nitrogen, with a little flavoring of phosphoric acid, potash, lime and other minerals. The tree's leaves, when green with chlorophyll, are the most wonderful laboratory in the world, and in some mysterious way absorb the much desired nitrogen from the air. Air is composed mostly of nitrogen, oxygen, carbon and hydrogen. The nitrogen component is about four-fifths. What makes the plants, trees and the world go round and round is nature's wise provision in never wasting anything. The black soil of Texas is but decayed vegetation. The leaves are a most valuable storehouse of tree food. About 50 per cent of the leaf material is nitrogen, 35 per cent phosphoric acid and 15 per cent the much desired potash, so hard to obtain during the war."

"Knowing the value of leaves, we will now make a bed of them, wet them down, throw on wood ashes and well-rotted cow manure, and dig in this compost around the tree about Thanksgiving Day, November 30, so that the tree can also have a root full of happiness. Next summer we will realize grateful dividends in the deep green leaves, murmuring their many thanks."

"Keep a dust blanket around the tree, which beats doped city water. Bermuda grass will hog all the richness from the soil. One rain is better than ten waterings, as the rain leaches nitrogen from the air, which the hungry rootlets drink up, unless Bermuda and lazy weeds are there. If you have no leaves, buy nitrate of soda or some good fertilizer. Fertilize in winter, as the tree does most of its growing in the spring and early summer."

"The second great enemy of trees, largely due to low vitality, are insects, borers, scale, etc. Dig out the borer, spray this winter after the leaves fall for scale. Make your tree strong and healthy, and it will throw off disease."

"And he shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in his season, his leaf also shall not wither." (Psalm 1).

One of the oldest circus companies of the country is "broke." There are not many children, and not so very many grownups, who have not enjoyed the performances staged by the Gentry Brothers dog and pony circus, but unless the overlooked-for happens, its last performance has been given. One wonders what the next generation of children will have to look forward to from year to year, besides messes, Christmas and the ending of school.—Brownwood Bulletin.

Only a few pills, some cold drinks, the eats and gas to make 'er go were sold, and these only during a stated period. And the citizens of McCulloch joined in the celebration with a right good will.

The football game was the feature attraction of the morning program and was accorded a big turnout. Incidentally, the Brady Municipal band was on hand and furnished an enjoyable musical program. The game between the Coleman and Brady Hi foot ball teams was an exciting and interesting contest. The teams were well matched, and, if anything, Brady had the better of their opponents. Brady scored a touchdown in the first quarter on a forward pass to Samuel, but failed to kick goal.

Really, the game should have been Brady's, but due to a decision of the umpire from Coleman, and which was so manifestly unfair as to disgust all the local fans, Brady was penalized 15 yards. At the time, Brady had the ball on Coleman's 30-yard line but the umpire's decision placed it back on the 45-yard line. Coleman then carried the ball on down the line on a series of bucks, until the Brady line stiffened and held. Then the visitors completed a forward pass for a touch-down and kicked goal. This was in the fourth quarter and the game ended 7 to 6 in Coleman's favor.

Afternoon Program.

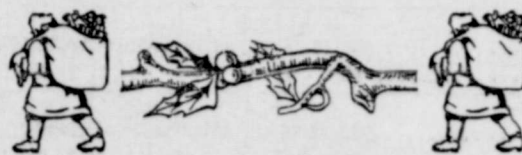

father with his family came to McCulloch county. In company was my brother-in-law, C. C. Turner, who pre-empted one hundred and sixty acres of land. Building material was scarce, Austin being the nearest railroad town, and that was a long road with an ox team. So he looked around and found a little log cabin that someone had built and went off and left; I do not know who built the cabin nor how long it had been built but whoever it was took considerable pains in hewing the logs, and especially the floor. It was made of split logs and hewed smooth as one could do with an axe; the edges were hewn straight so as to fit up close to each other and they left quite small space to have been made of logs. I am

talking about what we called a punch-
eon floor in those days.

We will soon be to the question proper.

Seventeen years ago when I moved to the place I am now, on it was late in the Fall when I got my house built and did not have time to build a barn and I had considerable amount of corn to move. So I bought for little of nothing the little log cabin then owned by J. A. Armor. It had been torn down and moved twice before I got it, so I moved the old cabin and made a crib of it to house my corn in and use it some two or three years, after which it has been standing there and of not much use. A few days ago I decided I would take the floor out of it and make a hog

pen, and I found the old hewn log floor puncheons so sound and heavy it caused me to take especial notice of them; they were not petrified, but almost as heavy as rock and I could hardly cut them with an axe. They look now as if they are just getting in good shape to start to lasting and the most of the logs in the old hut are fairly sound.

In my next I will tell you something else.

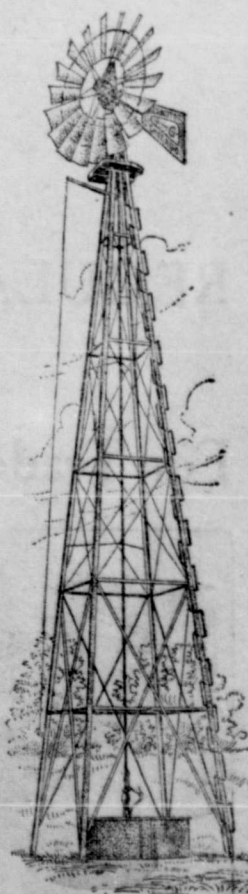

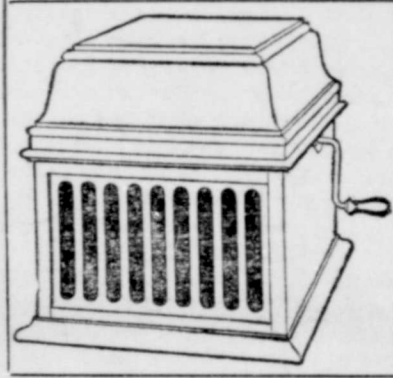

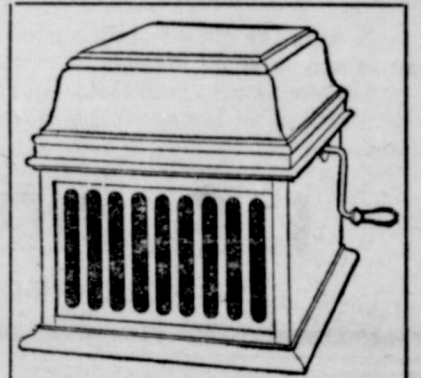
