

## MCCULLOCH COUNTY SENDS BANNER LOT CONTESTANTS TO STATE MEET

### MCCULLOCH COUNTY WINNERS IN COMANCHE DISTRICT INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE MEET TO GO TO AUSTIN THURSDAY TO CONTEST FOR STATE HONORS.

The notable triumph of McCulloch county contestants in the District Interscholastic League meet, held at Comanche last month, has its sequel this week in the sending from this county of the banner delegation of contestants to the State Interscholastic League Meet to be held in Austin Friday and Saturday of this week. Brady, Rochelle, Fife and Calf Creek will send representatives to the State Meet, Brady entering two young ladies and three boys; Rochelle entering seven boys; Fife entering one young lady, and Calf Creek entering one boy. From the many favorable comments upon the performance of the contestants at the Comanche meet, McCulloch county citizens are confidently expecting the capture of first honors in various of the events entered at Austin.

Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Vincent plan to leave Brady Thursday carrying the Brady contestants to the State Meet. The party will include Misses Mary Lyle Vincent and Mable Wilder, winners of first place in Girls' Debate in the District meet; John Allison Polk, winner of first place in the Hurdle Race and second place in the 50-yard Dash; Walter Adkins, winner of second place in the Hurdle Race, and Max Hutschenreuter, winner of first place in High Jump. Only winners of first place in literary events are entitled to enter the State lets, but winners of both first and second place in athletic events are entitled to go to the State meet, and may enter any athletic event, not being confined to the event in which they won. However, the Brady athletes will be entered only in those events in which they won.

#### Rochelle Entrants.

Rochelle, which won first place in the District Track events, will have a long list of contestants at the State Meet. Douglas Clary, who won first place in the Mile Race; Ollie Clary who won second place in the Mile Race; Wesley Gainer who won first place in the Discus Throw and second place in the 880-yard run; Leroy Cates who won first in the 880-yard run; Tom Blackburn who assisted in winning the Mile Relay; Leron Cottle who won first in the 440-yard dash, and Mark Mitchell who won second place in the 440-yard dash. In addition to the foregoing, D. Clary took third in the 440-yard dash, L. Cottle got third, and W. Gainer fourth in the Shot Put.

Mr. Downing, field manager of the West Texas Commercial College at Sweetwater, Texas, is in the city this week, interesting the citizenship in a proposition to establish the Brady Commercial College here. The college is to be opened just as soon as an enrollment of twenty-five can be secured and present plans are to secure the charter membership and have the college open on Monday, May 14th, or ten days hence. The Texas Commercial College at Sweetwater, represented by Mr. Downing, is an old-established college, and some time back opened a school at Lamesa, where the success already attained has virtually assured that the Lamesa branch will be made a permanent school. Mr. Downing is confident that equal success can be attained in the Brady field. Alton H. Perry, president of the college, will come here from Sweetwater tomorrow, and will go thoroughly into the local situation and the possibilities of the local field with Mr. Downing.

#### PLAN TO OPEN COMMERCIAL COLLEGE HERE

Mr. Downing states that individual method of teaching is employed, and that, therefore, but twenty-five students can be enrolled, unless a sufficient number of additional students are obtained to enable the securing of additional teachers. Three courses of study are offered, viz: Commercial or Business course, Stenographic or Shorthand course, Secretarial or Combined course. Day and night school will be operated, the latter enabling attendance of those employed during the day time. Students may attend either the day or the night school, or both. Diplomas and positions are part of the inducements offered students.

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## TECH TO BE BEST SCHOOL IN U. S. SAY THE REGENTS

That the Texas Technological School will be a big prize for the town which gets it, and second to no college in the United States, is indicated by statements coming from members of the board of regents. The board met in Fort Worth Tuesday, and in reporting the meeting the Fort Worth Star-Telegram says:

"Developments from the initial meeting of the Texas Tech board held here Tuesday, at which preliminary plans for the establishment of the college were discussed, may materialize when the board meets in Fort Worth again in 30 days, it was indicated by board members after the close of the session.

"Selection of a president of the new institution and certain building plans were discussed at the Tuesday meeting, which lasted several hours. It was held in the directors room of the Star-Telegram building. No intimation of who the board is considering for the presidency was given.

"The board expressed the intention, however, of seeing that the college would be 'second to none in America.'

"Those attending the meeting included Amon G. Carter, chairman; former Governor W. P. Hobby of Beaumont, Dr. J. L. Nunn of Amarillo, R. A. Underwood of Plainview, John W. Carpenter of Dallas, Clifford B. Jones of Spur, Mrs. Charles DeGroff of El Paso and Charles W. Meadow of Waco.

"In a statement giving the subjects of discussion at the meeting, Carter made it plain that the board of directors had no connection with the locating board, which is to choose a site for the new institution.

"The questions it was deciding have nothing to do with the location, he pointed out, but are questions which will have to be settled before any steps toward building the school can be taken, wherever the locating board finally decides it shall go."

Miss McCall is one of Brady's most charming, attractive and universally popular young ladies. A graduate of high school in the Class of '22, she is now attending State University. Her grace, charm of manner and poise give assurance that "Lady Brady" is sure to be recognized as a queen among the sponsors, and her appearance in the All West Texas Pageant is certain to reflect credit and glory to Brady, the land of her birth. Miss McCall will come home from the university about the middle of the month especially to take part in the pageant.

The new automobile license tax doesn't in so many words bar the highways to any class of motor trucks, but when it levied a tax of from \$1,000 to nearly \$1,300 per annum on the excessively heavy ones and imposed an extra penalty of \$1 per hundredweight for solid tires, it reached that end without specifically saying so. A light delivery wagon costs as little as \$11.73 a year, a one-ton Ford truck costs \$15.85 and trucks that with their loads weigh as much as 11,000 pounds cost less than \$70 a year, but when the big "hogs" with loaded weight of from ten to twelve tons get into the running, the tax mounts too fast to suit the owners thereof. The expected result will be that there will be many light and reasonable heavy trucks going over Texas highways, but that the excessively heavy cars, which have played havoc with every attempt at road-building the smaller counties have made, will be for sale or they will contribute to upkeep of the roads somewhat in proportion to their injury thereto. The new law is not effective until January 1 next, so owners of the huge trucks will possibly have time to get rid of them.—Denton Record-Chronicle.

#### BRIEFLY TOLD.
