Callahan County Rural Schools

Out of the 30 some odd rural schools in Callahan county, only 5 are now open; they are: Union, Belle Plaine, Bayou, Gilliland and Oplin. Dressy, Dudley and Iona schools have closed for several weeks to allow the students to help gather the cotton crop. Other schools have not opened yet.

Cross Plains Seeks To Cancel Warrants

Suit for cancellation of warrants in the amount of \$67,000, assertedly executed in payment for a road built by the Municipal Engineering company, Inc., has been filed in the 04th district court here by the city of Cross Plains. J. M. Radford, the Republic National bank of Dallas and the city of Fort Worth, named as holders of the warrants, are made defendants.

The plaintiff city asserts the reservoir, which was to serve the city water works system, "was constructed in porous earth and would not hold water." Claim is also made that the drainage was too small.

Contract between the city and the engineering company was entered into in December, 1929, and warrants were executed to the Republic National Bank and Trust company, the petition sets out.

The Municipal Engineering company is now "defunct and its charter has been cancelled," according to the plaintiff.

The city of Cross Plains is represented by Searbrough, Ely and King of Abilene.

Grayhound Bus Drivers Awarded For Safe Driving

Eight bus operators of the Southland Greyhound Lines have just completed a two year's driving record without an accident of any kind, according to J. A. Knutson, Operating Manager of the company. These men have been awarded the two year gold award for safe driving. With the award goes a pearl studded pin.

The eight men to receive this award are: Roy Benskin, E. A. Brown, J. E. Doherty, L. D. Porter, H. Honnell, E. Layne, L. Springer and J. Walsh. Over the two year period each of these men have driven approximately 125,000 miles, a distance equivalent to five times around the world, without a single accident.

To date 56, which is nearly two-thirds, of the Southland Greyhound bus operators have won the one year safety award.

Mr. Knutson states that Southland Greyhound Lines, over the period from January 1st to October 1st operated 4,563,541 miles and averaged only one accident every 198,658 miles of operations. This includes even minor accidents, such as scratched fenders. This is one of the most outstanding safety records of any public transportation company in the entire country. Mr. Knutson attributes this remarkable safety record to the careful schooling of drivers, plus regular safety meetings. There has never been a passenger fatality on the Southland Greyhound Lines since it began operations.

Alrah Edwards Died In Abilene

Alrah Branden Edwards, son of the late Sam T. Edwards, a former resident of Callahan county, died at his home in Abilene Monday afternoon of last week, following a long illness. His health was impaired by a severe attack of influenza two years ago; he has been confined to his bed for several months.

Funeral services were held at St. Pauls Methodist Church at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, with Dr. J. W. Hunt, president of McMurry College and Rev. R. S. Marshall, pastor, officiating. Burial was made under the Masonic Lodge, with an escort of Knights Templar. Mr. Edwards held Masonic membership in Paul Revere lodge, Chicago, and was also a member of Paul Revere Knights Templar.

Alrah Edwards was born at Grandbury September 20, 1882. He came to Callahan county with his parents when a young boy, the family living for a while at Putnam and Clyde and later moved to Abilene, where the family has lived for the past 25 years. He is survived by his wife and daughter, Mrs. Ralph Wolfe and a son Bobby Edwards; his mother, Mrs. Sam T. Edwards and a sister, Mrs. C. T. Hutchison, all of Abilene.

For many years Mr. Edwards had been southern district manager for the stentotype department of La Salle University of Chicago. He was also the inventor of a stentotype machine.

Little Clark Winton Pearce Seriously Ill

Little Clark Winton, the little two year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Pearce, is critically ill at the Griggs Hospital. The little boy, the only child of these fond parents was taken ill Friday of last week and on Saturday night at 11 o'clock he was operated on for appendicitis. His condition has been serious from the beginning of his illness, but everything that medical skill and careful nursing can do is being done to restore the little fellow to health again.

One of the biggest gridiron thrillers ever played at Baird, resulted Friday in a victory for the High School team here over Moran, 20 to 14. Judson Atchison who scored ever point for Baird, broke off left tackle into a broken field and ran 55 yards for the deciding touchdown 50 seconds before the game ended.

Baird tallied first, when the game was eleven minutes old, Atchison going over for the touchdown and kicking goal. Moran rallied and accounted for all its points in the first eight minutes of the second quarter. Weber went over for the first Moran touchdown and Hddman for the second and Snyder plunged the line for both extra points.

It was late in the third quarter before Baird caught up, with Atchison driving through the line for the touchdown then kicking the goal for extra point. His last minute run broke the tie.

The game was Baird's second conference victory having won over Cadodo 1 to 0 by forfeit.

Moran led in first downs 11-10; Baird carried the ball 38 times for 205 yards; Moran 49 times for 241 yards; Baird tried 7 passes had 4 incomplete, 1 intercepted and two completed for 23 yards. Moran tried 14 passes 9 incomplete, 3 intercepted and 2 complete for 33 yards. Baird punted 7 times for 230 yards; Moran 6 times for 210 yards. Baird drew 5 yards in penalties; Moran 35 yards. REMEMBER—Cross Plains will play here this after noon (Oct. 21.)

Around The World Backwards

Plennie L. Wingo, Abilenian who is walking around the world backward, spent Tuesday night and until noon Wednesday in Baird, leaving here for Fort Worth where he will complete the journey, started from that city in April 15, 1931.

Wingo wears glasses specially equipped to enable him to see what goes on behind him. He walked facing opposite to his destination from Fort Worth to Boston, from Hamburg, Germany to Constantinople and from the Pacific coast back to his home in Abilene.

He has paid expenses by doing street stunts for theatres and other advertisers, and has even walked backward along tops of high buildings. He was barred from crossing Asia but worked his way on ships to resume his round-the-globe journey after shipping that continent.

Texas Takes First Place In Democratic Campaign

Texas takes first place in the Democratic campaign, Roy Miller was told today by James A. Farley, Chairman of the Democratic Committee. This ranking was based upon the work of the organization handling the general campaign and upon the drive for funds as well.

"Texas should be proud of the record made by the native state of the nominee for Vice-President", Mr. Farley's telegram said. "I expect all groups and individuals in Texas interested in the election of the Democratic ticket to continue to work in complete harmony with, and as directed by, your organization at State Headquarters, so that Texas can maintain its present leading position", Mr. Farley concluded.

"Naturally I am grateful that our State has earned this signal honor in the successful campaign the National Committee is now conducting", Mr. Miller said. "Texas will do all that is required and more than is expected of her in this campaign. Our finance organization, headed by Frank

Scotfield, is confident that it will be able to remit to the National Headquarters by October 15th, more than the \$100,000 quota originally set for this State.

"We can and should show our appreciation for the honor done our state in the placing of John Garner on the national ticket of the Democratic Party, with voters and funds," Preliminary reports from the Medallion drive which was instituted Saturday are very pleasing, it was said.

Centennial Amendment Not Mandatory

Voters are reminded by the Texas Centennial Committee that the Centennial Amendment is merely an enabling act that will permit but not require State aid for the Centennial. If it is adopted by vote of the people November 8th, the Legislature will be governed by whatever conditions may exist when the holding of a Centennial celebration is considered by that body. The time, place or places and charter of the celebration will be fixed by the Legislature, at all. The Amendment expressly prohibits any appropriation for any other than the observance of the "heroic period of early Texas history", thus preventing the fixing of a precedent for State support of any expositions, fairs and celebrations in the future.

Parcel Post Became Higher October 1st.

Washington—Increased rates on parcel post mail becomes effective October 1st.

The postoffice department, calling attention to the new rates which were approved in February by the interstate commerce commission, said Friday that the increase were intended to cut into the annual deficit this class of mail has produced. Based on revenues and expenditures for 1930, the department figured parcel post was being handled at a net loss of \$15,000,000.

While there was a material loss on parcels in the first three zones, those beyond were handled at a profit. The new scales are designed to equalize the rates. No change is to be made on parcels for local delivery.

The increases will run from one to three cents, depending upon weight and distance.

The new rates are: First and second zones, 8 cents for the first pound or fraction of a pound and 1.1 cents for each additional pound or fraction; third zone, 9 and 2 cents, respectively; fourth zone, 10 and 3.5 cents; fifth zone, 11 and 5.3 cents; sixth zone, 12 and 7 cents; seventh zone, 14 and 9 cents; eighth zone, 15 and 11 cents.

The postage of parcels mailed on rural routes for delivery will be 2 cents less than at these rates and 3 cents less when for other than local delivery.

The new regulations permit mailing matter up to 70 pounds in weight and as large as 100 inches in length and girth combined.

A big day at the Baptist Church next Sunday is what we are going to have. A splendid quartette and we might have more than one special number. Come and help us make it a good day.

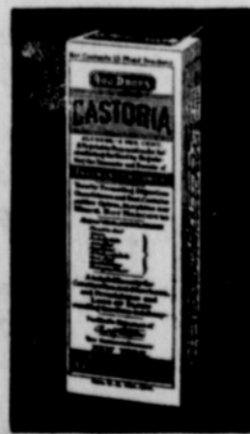
The subject for the morning service is "The Victorious Cross."

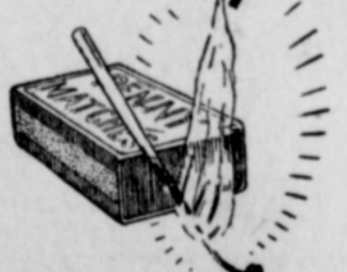
