

At the meeting at Ballinger in March it is intended to invite the sheriffs of the counties adjoining this district to attend the meeting and to then present to them the plan of operation and to invite them to form other associations. In this way it is hoped that the formation of the sheriffs association of 35th Judicial District may mark the beginning of a movement of like nature spreading out and covering the entire state, and may ultimately lead to closer co-operation and more efficient enforcement of the laws in the entire state of Texas.
