Dr. Standifer came to Spur when the town was established in 1909 and in 1910 built the sanitarium which he operated until 1920. During their residence here the Standifer family made innumerable friends over this entire section and the Doctor established a reputation for performing feats of medical and surgical skill bordering on the miraculous, and numbers of local families have continued to go to him wherever he might be with their troubles and illnesses after he had moved away.

In 1920 Dr. Standifer sold his sanitarium to Dr. P. C. Nichols, the present surgeon-in-charge, and moved to Vernon, Texas, where he built a hospital. Later he moved to Lamesa where he operated a hospital for a time and some six years ago moved to Turkey to take charge of the Turkey hospital, a well-known institution which he su-

The election is today and it is the duty of every citizen who has a poll tax to go to the polls, located in the Spur National Bank building and vote their sentiments on this question.

Several arguments are propounded pro and con concerning the sale of beer which was legalized in the State election last year.

Whatever agreement is suggested, however, will come to nothing un less it is accepted voluntarily by the creditors. Although the local farm debt adjustment committee are appointed by the Governor of the State, the Committees cannot and will not compel acceptance of any proposal they put forward. Their usefulness lies in their capacity to propose a sane, workable plan of debt settlement, some plan that will appeal to the intelligent self-interest of both the debtor and his creditors and which will at the same time avoid unnecessary foreclosure.

Our committees have been very successful in making hundreds adjustments in this State and have stopped numbers of foreclosures They are ready to assist any farmer in distress and to see that his creditor interest is justly protected.

Farmers wishing to take advantage of this service should contact the local county committee, and failing to make proper adjustments the County Committee will then call upon the State committee if th occasion demands.



Will the interest of share croppers and tenants be protected in the making of allotments and the issuance of exemption certificates Yes. Necessary regulations will be made to protect their interests.

Does the Act provide forrevoking exemption certificates issued in case the producer violates the provisions in the voluntary acreage reduction contract for the use of rented acres?

Will all producers who desires exemption certificates be required to file application for same? Yes. Both producers who have signed an acreage reduction' contract and those who have not will be required to file an application before receiving exemption certificates.

To whom will producers apply for exemption certificates? To the Secretary of the Cotton Production Control Association.

BALE TAGS

Can bale tags be transferred from one bale to another? No. Severe penalties are provided for these provisions of this Act.

What action should a producer take if a bale tag becomes detached? Notify the Commissioner of Internal Revenue at once.

ADMINISTRATION OF THE BANKHEAD ACT

Through what local organization will the Department of Agriculture administer those provisions of the Act for which it is responsible? The Cotton Production Control Association. 
