

W. T. Andrews To Be Head of Bank

W. T. Andrews, Active Vice President of the Spur Security Bank, since 1930 when he was promoted to that position from Cashier, will continue with that title and be the active head of the bank, it was announced following a meeting of the directors this week. Clifford B. Jones, Vice President for many years was named President and will devote more time to the affairs of the bank than in the past. E. S. Lee, Assistant Cashier for several years, has been named Cashier. No changes in the present personnel of the bank is planned.

Mr. Andrews has been with the Spur bank since 1914 and was very closely associated in the operation of the bank with the late President, Walter B. Lee.

At a meeting Tuesday morning the Board of Trustees of the Spur Independent District made a contract with Judge Clyde F. Elkins of Lubbock to collect delinquent school taxes in this district for all years including 1935. The contract was effective from October 14. Judge Elkins will have an office at the Chamber of Commerce with H. P. Gibson while in Spur.

Judge Elkins has been assisting the Lubbock school district the past eleven years and at this time represents several districts over the South Plains.

NYA To Assist With Terracing

College Station — About 1,000 farm boys on relief will soon be put to work helping county agricultural agents run terrace lines it was planned at a recent meeting between L. R. Griffith, state NYA supervisor; Ray Roberts, assistant supervisor; and member of the Texas Extension Service.

This \$100,000 work project will continue for six months starting immediately in one county in each of the 12 Extension Service districts, as quickly as possible, the plan will be enlarged to take in about 50 counties and include the entire 1000 boys. The boys will work from 34 to 70 hours a week at prevailing hour wage rates.

It is estimated that the work would provide survey lines for terracing on approximately 100,000 acres of farm land which if terraced would improve land value in Texas on an average of 8 per acre.

County Agent Lane states that several of the NYA boys will be used in this county to assist in running terrace lines. Farmers who are interested in terracing and would like to have their lines run without cost are asked to file their name and dates for the work with the county agent's office. The work will be carried on through the winter months.

Judge T. M. Green Dies At Dickens

Judge T. M. Green, pioneer citizen, died at his home south of Dickens Monday night after several months illness. Funeral services were held at the family home at 3:30 Tuesday afternoon with Rev. A. P. Stokes, Baptist minister of Afton, officiating. Interment was in Dickens cemetery in charge of Bill Kinney.

Judge Green was born in Culpeper County, Virginia in 1871. He came to Dickens County in 1891, the year the county was organized. He was married to Miss Jeffie Hutson December 22, 1897. To this union were born eight children, they are: Mrs. John Draper, Wichita Falls; Elbert, Archie, Tom Merrill, Lawrence, Robert, Dayton Worth and Morris, all of Dickens. Other survivors are three sisters: Mrs. Nellie Davis of Spur, Mrs. R. C. Forbis of Afton, Mrs. Virgil Davis of Long Beach, Calif. and one brother, J. D. Green of Roaring Springs. There are seven grandchildren. All were present for the funeral except Mrs. Davis of California.

Judge Green for many years worked for the Spur Rancho and other ranches in this section. He had made his home at Dickens for 39 years, being honored by public office three times. In 1918 he was appointed sheriff to fill the unexpired term of R. L. Collier, resigned. Then later he served six years as Commissioner from Precinct No. 1 and also six years as Justice of the Peace for the same precinct, retiring from the latter office January 1, 1935. Judge Green was known for his fairness and willingness to serve his county. He was known far and wide for his decisions and conduct of office as Justice at Dickens.

Surplus Certificate Money Received

The County Agent's office has received \$16,668.90 from the national surplus tax exemption certificate pool. 1040 of the checks are being distributed this week representing 17.5% of the tags placed in the pool from this county. This closes out this pool since the Supreme Court declared the AAA unconstitutional and stopped the sale of the certificates. The cotton pooled this way through the certificates brought an average of 3.7 cents per pound on these surplus certificates. If the AAA had remained in effect at this rate of sale farmers of Dickens County would have received better than \$80,000 for their surplus certificates.

Texas Tech To Be Center For Big Radio Broadcast

Lubbock, Oct. 12.—(Special) Texas Tech will be on the air Friday night, October 23 from 6:30 until 7:30 over the Texas Quality Network including radio stations WFAA-WBAP, KPRC, and WOAI. Bond Issue Voted 3 to 1

The \$15,000 proposed bond issue of the City of Spur carried by a 3 to 1 vote in the special election held Monday. The vote was 138 for and 43 against. City officials stated that arrangements had already been made to sell the bonds without cost to the city and the sale will be expedited as fast as possible. Work on the installation of the new city water system is moving along rapidly now and will be published to completion as rapidly as possible.

It is hoped by city officials to be able to start the paving program in the near future. All the survey work has been done but there is still some preliminary work to be done which will be completed by the time the labor becomes available.

Under the paving program the city is to be out very little expense compared to the total cost, most of the cost being paid by the WPA. Approximately six miles of the city's streets are included in the program which will furnish labor employment for several months next year.

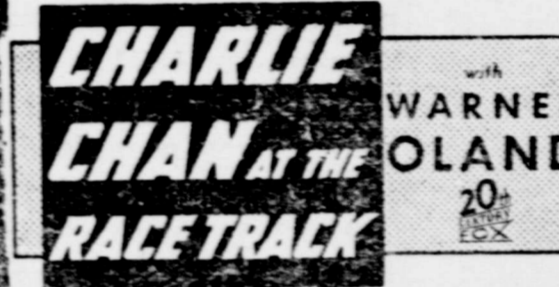

"We plowed and set the lawn in Bermuda grass. Some of it died during the summer but the most is coming out since the rain. We laid a flag stone walk using native red rock."

"We replaced the barbed wire fence with a green picket one. That has made a much more attractive fence and makes it easier to keep the chickens out. The fence cost \$30.00."

"We already had plenty of trees growing. They are Chinese elms and are set in rows but make a good shade. We are making a group planting in the back with a big cottonwood that is already there."

A check of the goals for the year shows that four lawns have been set with Bermuda grass; 40 shrubs set are living and three trees are living.

MAKES PROFIT ON TURKEYS

"One year I sold 126 turkeys for \$302. That was the most I made in any one year and I have raised turkeys for the last eleven years," says Mrs. O. S. Harvey, who is president and home food supply demonstrator for the McAdoo home demonstration club.

"If it had not been for the money from turkeys we would not have been able to make any improvements in our home until we finished paying for it last fall. My turkeys have been sold at prices ranging from seven to thirty-one cents per pound."

"A steam pressure cooker was the first thing I bought when I sold my first turkeys. Since then I have bought a kitchen cabinet, linoleum for all the floors, wire and posts for the yard fence, two chicken houses, a sewing machine and all our clothes and linens."

"I think turkeys are such a little trouble. I feed my little ones hard boiled eggs and cottage cheese, when older they range for their own feed and have access to the feed stacks. I have made nests of old barrels that the turkeys like so I don't have to watch them to locate their nests now. I have Bourbon Red turkeys."

Mrs. Harvey has been a member of the McAdoo home demonstration for the last four years and is finishing her second year as president of the club. Her work as home food supply demonstrator has not kept her from raising turkeys this year. She has 47 that will soon be ready for the market.
