

New Herbicide In Works for Grain Sorghum

A concentrated research effort at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station since 1957 has proven the feasibility of a new pre-emergence herbicide for weed control in sorghum states Dr. A.F. Wiese, extension service Agronomist. This herbicide will be called Propazine, and in 1962 will be available for use on sorghum fields being produced for seed. As yet, USDA label clearance has not been obtained for use on sorghum to be produced for feed. It is anticipated that complete label clearance will be obtained by the 1963 sorghum season. The chemical composition of the herbicide is 2-chloro-4, 6-bis-(isopropylamino) -s-triazine, a very close relative of simazine and atrazine which are successful pre-emergence herbicides in corn. Propazine may be applied in bands over the entire field. Broadcast applications will eliminate the need for cultivation during the entire season. It is not toxic to cotton, it will be particularly useful to farmers in cotton producing areas or farmers who have grass weed problems which cannot be controlled with applications of 2,4-D.

The availability of propazine to farmers is the end result of an intensive herbicide evaluation program at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station over the past 4 years. During that time, approximately 25 chemicals were tested for possible pre-emergence herbicides in sorghum, but none of them have proved as effective as propazine. Yields from the 1958, 1959 and 1960 test plots at the Experimental Station were 6,150, 6,440 and 5,460 pounds per acre, respectively, for normal cultivation, propazine applied broadcast at 4 pounds per acre. Crab grass control in the plots with 2 pounds per acre of propazine was equivalent to that of normal cultivation.

Because of favorable results in 1958 and 1959, more extensive testing of the herbicide was conducted in 1960 and 1961. In 1961, a 10 acre conservation bench on the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station was treated with propazine at the rate of $\frac{1}{2}$ pound per acre in a 10 inch band over 40 inch rows of sorghum. This was equivalent to 2 pounds per acre broadcast. This treatment gave outstanding control of pigweed, even though over 6 inches of rain fell during the first two weeks following planting and the area was too wet for cultivation until August 1. One cultivation eliminated the weeds in the middles and this bench leveled area was the cleanest field of (See HERBICIDE, Page 12)

Creation of the airport primarily through voluntary labor by the Jaycees, has resulted in more employment, brought increased business to the town and put Dimmitt on the air map for future growth, according to the article in Flying magazine.

The article is written by Bascom Nelson, a resident of Dimmitt.

At present there are eleven aircraft based at the Dimmitt field, including four operated by a crop dusting firm.

Although the project has not made a lot of money, it has met expenses and provided the community with an important service. "Without fanfare," the Flying magazine article states, "the Dimmitt Jaycees probably developed the most workable system possible for procuring a good, usable airport for a small town."

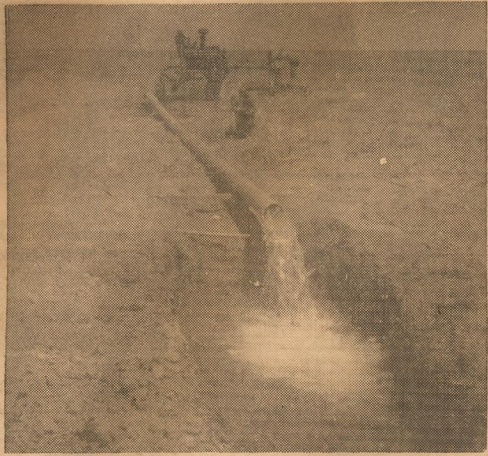

Survey Shows Castro County Water Table in Slow Decline

According to records recently published by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, the ground-water level continues to decline in Castro County.

W. L. (Bill) Broadhurst, Chief Hydrologist for the Water District, states that water levels in more than 50 observation wells that are measured annually by the Texas Water Commission and the High Plains Water District indicate that ground water beneath the County is gradually being depleted.

Broadhurst says, "to illustrate what is occurring throughout Castro County, we have picked at random five observation wells that have been measured since January 1950. Each of the wells selected is from a different part of the County."

He continued, "for purposes of illustration, we picked observation well No. 32, 2 miles east of Frio, on land owned by Charles R. Springer; well No. 58a, about 1 1/2 miles northeast of Dimmitt, on land owned by W.H. Fuller; well No. 202a, 1 1/2 miles southwest of Nazareth, on land owned by Frank Huseman; well No. 410b, located 6 miles southeast of Har, on land owned by L. D. Pickering; and well No. 529, about 3 miles southwest of Flagg on land owned by

John L. Spencer."

According to Broadhurst, four of the five wells selected are typical irrigation wells while well No. 58a is a windmill.

Broadhurst did some figuring and came up with the following statistics:

He concluded "The declines shown for the five observation wells indicate that we have a problem that needs to be faced up to and recognized. It is a problem that can be partially, but not completely, alleviated by individuals making more efficient use of both rain water and ground water. All waste should definitely be minimized."

Broadhurst continued, "Castro County has a great deal of ground water in storage beneath its surface; however, with an average water-level decline of near 3 feet per year, the fact is evident that the ground water is being depleted and the situation calls for wise use of water, both now and in the future, to maintain an excellent and high-level irrigated agricultural economy."

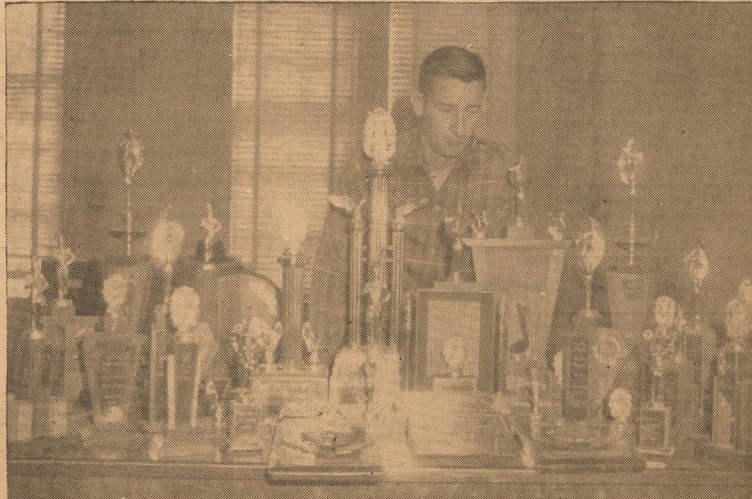
On Friday they will participate

School Renovation Contract Let

The Dimmitt School Board was elated last week to find that renovation of the present High School Building would not exceed the amount they had to spend.

Total amount of the bid to completely remodel the old building is \$106,245. After their experience with bidding on the new High School building, there was considerable apprehension on the part of school officials.

The winning bid went to Hammock Bros. Construction Company

of Lubbock. Their base bid was for \$99,900 and to this was added some ceramic tile, lightproof blinds for classrooms for movie education, electric drinking fountain, electric clock system, and a public address system.

The program includes new floors, ceilings, lighting and heating systems, windows, doors, painting and other general renovations.

Work will begin as soon as school is out and will be mostly completed

by the beginning of the fall term. The contractor plans to have everything done except the final cost of interior paint and finishing the floors by school time. These two items will be completed the following summer.

High base bid was for \$125,359. Four bids were received.

This is the final major contracting in the schools new building program, financed by a \$1 million bond election recently.

Piano Auditions Begin Soon

Mrs. Howard Hershey, local Chairman for National Guild of Piano Teachers announces that Dimmitt will be one of the centers for the nationwide auditions involving over 60,000 piano players. The hearing will be from (dates) April 30 to May 4 at South Elementary School.

Conducting the auditions here will be Mrs. Wayne Coleman of Crystal City, Texas, well-known among music circles in this state for her piano accomplishments. A graduate of the University of Texas, she has studied under such noted instructors as Virginia Norta, Everett Pittman, Anna Jackson and Tekla Staffel. She has been a member of the Austin Symphony Orchestra (1955-57) and has taught both privately and in the Brownsville Independent School District. She is a member of the National Guild of Piano Teachers and is chairman of the National Guild of Piano Teachers Audition Center of Crystal City.

The image of today's music student is far different from the beribboned, curled, ruffled little girl of a generation ago who haltingly played one piece a year in an endless recital. Today's cool, self-possessioned student plays an entire program for an adjudicator, accepts suggestions, gets a rating, certificate or diploma, and builds a repertoire with technical and musical background. Many factors have brought this about but the

greatest influence is the National Guild of Piano Teachers, a non-profit organization functioning in all States including large centers in Hawaii and Alaska. It was founded by Irl Allison who was a Professor of Piano in Abilene University. As it spread over the States, enlightened parents recognized the motivation so important to child development, and teachers declared it spear-headed the trend toward broader musical development and improved status for the profession.

Guild auditions are non-competitive. Each student's judged individually.

Rhythm, accuracy, tone-quality, phrasing and pedaling are among the thirty two points considered in piano playing. Each student plays from memory two to ten numbers and all above elementary stage are required to pass a test on scales and cadences. The auditions are conducted privately to put the student at ease.

Cleaner Movies Object of Drive

In an effort to change the direction motion picture moral tones are taking, the Dimmitt high School journalism class has triggered a state-wide crusade.

Members of the editorial staff of The Bobcat Tales, student newspaper at Dimmitt High School, decided several months ago to get into an active campaign against movies using sex and horror as principal themes.

After making a study of the situation, they decided that government censorship or at least the threat of government censorship would be the only way of obtaining any noticeable success in the venture. They did not feel that an appeal to the producers for cleaner movies would have much effect.

So the class prepared some ninety letters to choice high school

journalism classes over the state, requesting that they promote a letter-writing campaign among their own student bodies. The plan is for the students of all these high schools to write their congressmen on May 1 and 15.

The Dimmitt youngsters hope the congressmen will be deluged with mail requesting a stern congressional look into off-color movies with the intention or threatened intention of doing something about them unless some of the old codes of the Hays Committee of the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America are dusted off and put back into use.

"We don't want to impose more government controls on anyone," Miss Beth Beecher, Bobcat Tales editor says, "But if Hollywood will regulate itself in the best in-

terests of the country's moral standards, then we feel that some sort of government action should be taken. It is our feeling that something must be done."

The Bobcat Tales staff will never know just how fruitful their efforts are unless they write to and get a response from each of the twenty-two Texas representatives in Washington. Only those representatives will know how much mail they receive which was written about movies in Texas on May 1 and 15.

However, the staff has received clippings of write-ups and letters of agreement from schools in Amarillo, Gainesville and Cleburne. More are expected, although the staff considers it unlikely that all school papers cooperating will write and tell the Dimmitt youngsters about it.

During 1960, trials were conducted also on the Frank Zinner, Jr. farm west of Hereford, the Tom Woodward farm at Plainview and on the H.H. Miller farm at Dawn.

On these farms, 2 pounds per acre of propazine applied broadcast gave outstanding weed control for the entire season without reducing yields of sorghum. However, grass weeds were not as easily controlled as pigweed. Sorghum yields were reduced when the herbicide was applied at rates over 4 pounds per acre.

In 1961, band and broadcast applications of propazine were applied to 1 acre plots at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station and at the Douglas Dege farm near Lockney, Texas at rates equivalent to 1.2, and 3 pounds per treated acre. Pigweed was controlled all year by the 1 pound per acre application of propazine. The average yields from the 2 fields for a cultivated check and propazine at 1.2 and 3 pounds per acre applied broadcast were 6,960, 7,270, 6,810 and 6,760 pounds per acre, respectively. On another 3 acre test field at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station, two 10 inch rows of sorghum were planted dry on top of 40 inch tiler beds, treated with propazine and watered to germinate the seed and activate the chemical. This field remained weed free without cultivation for the entire season and yielded approximately 8,300 pounds per acre.

Propazine is a wettable powder and must be applied in 25 to 40 gallons of water per acre. Considerable agitation is required or the material will settle to the bottom of the spray tank. On a four-row rig this can be accomplished with the return from a medium size pump with a capacity of approximately 10 gallons per minute.

Propazine is absorbed through the roots and kills young weeds by inhibiting photosynthesis. Consequently, propazine must be applied to the soil immediately after planting in order that subsequent rain can leach it into the root zone. If rainfall occurs before chemical application, weeds may germinate and grow through the propazine on the soil surface. It is suggested that sorghum seed producers interested in trying propazine in 1962 do so on a limited basis in order to familiarize them selves with the use of the chemical. The successful use of propazine depends on proper calibration of the sprayer. Consequently, farmers should get their sprayers in running order a week or two before the sorghum planting season. Additional information about preparing or calibration of sprayers can be obtained from county agent.


