A STARTLING SITUATION.

A dispatch from Wichita, Kan., says startling state of affairs exists in Greenwood county from the fear of rabid dogs. A gentleman who arrived from there says the whole county is terrorized. Nine persons have been bitten and three have died after suffering the most acute pain from hydro-phobia. A mad dog went through the county about a month ago and bit a ing the most acute pain from hydrophobia. A mad dog went through the county about a month ago and bit a number of dogs and cattle and this appeared to infest the whole county. Two weeks ago a dog came into the yard of William Jones and bit Mr. Jones and two of his children. Wednesday one of the children died in great agony, and the next day the father and other child followed. A madstone was circulated among the persons who had been bitten, and it is hoped that no other deaths will occur, as these persons were all bitten before the Jones family. A wholesale slaughter of canines is now going on.

FLOOD IN MEXICO.

Fifteen Hundred Lives Lost-One Thou Corpses Recovered-Property Loss Estimated at \$27,000,000.

EL Paso, Tex., June 29 .- Additional advices from the flooded districts in Mexico say: At Leon the destruction was even worse than at Silao. At that place on Monday the 18th the waters commenced rising rapidly, breaking through the dikes in spite of all efforts to dam up the breaks. Houses were rapidly undermined and fell about the streets in the greatest confusion. The people huddled together wherever shelter in the steadily pouring rain shelter in the steadily pouring rain could be found. A rough estimate of the lives lost by drowning and being buried under the crumbling walls, is 700, and it is feered an investigation will show the number to be even greater. The loss to property is estimated at \$27,000,000. Steps to relieve the suffering of the afflicted people have been taken all over Mexico and assistance will reach sufferers as soon as possible. Another account says the as possible. Another account says the lives lost will probably number 1500 and that 1000 bodies have already been recovered. An official telegram re-ceived by the collector of customs at Del Norte says 100 miles of the Mexican Central is rendered impassable and that it will be ten days before mails can be transported and three weeks before freight can be transported.

MOBILE, ALA., June 28 .- The cele brated Magnolia farm and race course estate of the late Wm. Cottrill was sold on the 1st of May to John M. Barth, the purchase price being \$10,000. DOMESTIC HINTS.

One pint of sweet milk two eggs, one p nt of flour, half a cup of butter, one teaspoonful of cream of tartar, one half teaspoonful of soda, a pinch of salt. Bake in waffle irons, well heat-

TAPIOCA FRUIT PUDDING. One-half cupful of tapioca soaked over night in one quart of cold water. In the morning cover the bottom of a baking dish with any kind of fruit, either canned or fresh, sweeten the tapioca with one-half cupful of sugar, add a little salt and nutmeg, pour over the fruit and bake one hour. Serve with sauce.

Three cups of flour, one cup of but-termilk, one-half cup of buter, two teaspoonfuls of saleratus, two teaspoon-fuls of cinnamon, one teaspoouful of ginger and two eggs.

GRAHAM BREAD.

Take twice as much graham as white our, two teacupfuls of the former and one each of white flour, sour milk and nolasses, or less of the latter if not liked pretty sweet, and one teaspoon-ful each of salt and soda. Mix well; pour the mixture into a buttered pan and steam two hours.

SEYMOUR PUDDING. One half cup of molasses, half-cup of milk, half-cup of raisins, seeded and cut in halves, half cup of currents, cut in halves, half cup of currents, half cup of suet, powdered. half-tea-spoonful of soda, one egg, 1½ cups of graham flour, spice and salt to taste. Boil or steam for 2½ hours.

WELSH RAREBIT.

Half a pound of English cheese, three eggs well beaten, one scant cup of fine bread crumbs, three tablespoonfuls of butter, melted, two teaspoonfuls of made mustard, one saltspoonful of salt; mix all well together, and beat to a smooth paste; have ready some slices of toasted bread, from which the crust has been pared; spread them thickly with the mixture, and set them upon the upper grat ng of the oven until they are slightly browned. Serve

FRICASSEE OF FOWL. 





Cotton is not doing so well; there is some complaint of cotton worms and in some localities they are destroying the young cotton; it has also been very full of lice, which has retarded its growth considerably but there is plenty of time to make a good average crop yet if we have no more damage from worms and lice. We are having entirely too much rain for cot ton, but not enough to hurt the grain crop as yet."
