## 'windfall profit' tax

by the West Central Texas Oil \& Gas Associa tion (WeCTOGA) in Abilene. Harry Bettis of
Graham WeCTOGA, estimated that independent oil pro ducers in the 24 -county area will receive $\$ 981,916,308$ in extra
revenue because of the revenue because of the
amendments. He said independents have historically spent the equivalent of 105 percent of their gross wellhead revenues in exploration-

## Emphysema second only to heart disease

 were among the more than 160 guests attending the two-day showing of quilts sponsored by the Arts and Judges from out of town were overwhelmed at large variety of entries and agonized over their task of selecting first, second and third in each division. Their greatest difficulty was in the Oldest Quilt category and they finally decided to give each quilt a an entry by Leila Harter of Wingate. The quilt was made by her grandmother Harter in the late $1880^{\circ} \mathrm{s}$, as she died about $1883 \ldots$..the first person buried in the Wingate Cemetery.The quilt was a tul
The quilt was a tulip pattern and not bound. Miss
Harter said that her mother offered to bind the quilt but her father wanted it to remain as his mother had left it. She had also made another coverlet of silk scraps put together with briar stitching. We noted several types of stitches such as the wheat, feather and
crow's foot. This type of spread was once very popular and Mary Margaret Leathers entered one made by her grandmother in 1924.
Others in this division were a "Friendship Pattern" over 150 years old, brought in by Melvin Mapes, and
