Dairy Show Winners Are Announced

A total of 68 animals were entered in the first Castro County Dairy Show in three divisions, Guernsey, Jersey and Jersey 43 head. Approximately 300 people witnessed the judging.

A Guernsey heifer shown by B. J. Brannan was made Grand Champion of the Guernsey Division.

Morgan Dennis showed both the Grand Champion bull and cow in the Milking Shorthorn division. R. N. Gollehon showed the Grand Champion Jersey Bull and Doyle Davis the Grand Champion Jersey female.

Interest and competition was keen in all divisions.

An attraction to the show this year was a Junior Division for Club boys in the Jersey division. The cow shown by Doyle Davis, Hart 4-H Club boy won this division and the heifer shown by Doyle also was reserve Champion.

A total of \$102.00 was paid to exhibitors in the various divisions by Dimmitt Business men. The show was sponsored by the Dimmitt Lions Club.

I. B. (DOCK HOLT) IN RACE FOR STATE REPRESENTATIVE

The News has been authorized to announce the candidacy of Judge I. B. (Dock) Holt of Olton for the office of State Representative of the 120th Legislative District of Texas, subject to the action of the Democratic Primaries.

Judge Holt has served as County Judge of Lamb County for the past two terms, and previous to his election as County Judge, he had served his county as District Clerk and Tax Assessor and Collector. While authorizing the News to announce his candidacy for Representative from the 120th District, Judge Holt stated that he would be in Dimmitt in the near future in the interest of his campaign.

WHEAT FARMER DIES IN WICHITA FALLS

Crosbyton, April 14.—W. Perry Lamar, 56, well known in the South Plains area and a resident here for 27 years, died in a Wichita Falls clinic Sunday. Mr. Lamont entered the clinic two weeks ago after a heart attack.

He was a wheat farmer, rancher, business man and a member of the directors of the Crosbyton Co-op Hospital. He came to Crosbyton as a rural school teacher.

Survivors are his widow, a daughter, Mrs. Marie Ingram, and his mother, Mrs. Jim Lamar, all of Crosbyton.

Funeral services have been tentatively set for Tuesday in Crosbyton.

Mr. Lamar was an extensive land owner in Castro county.

Members of the Commissioners Court, City Commission and other interested citizens went to Lubbock Wednesday to appear before the State Highway Commission to urge the completion of paving the highways in Castro County. The delegation received some encouragement from the Highway Commission which indicated that at least one of the gaps in Castro county, presumably between Dimmitt and Hart, would be paved this year, and that the gap in Highway 51 south of Dimmitt would probably be paved next year. Although no promise was made as to the exact date for the letting of a contract for paving in any of the gaps in the county's highways, those who attended the meeting at Lubbock feel that the county's chances of getting some much needed paving has been greatly enhanced.

Those attending the meeting were Judge E. L. Ivey, County Commissioners J. O. Ayers and T. R. Davis, Mayor Jack Cowser and City Commissioner Goodwin Miller, Messrs E. B. Wright, C. J. Mapes, Edgar Ramey, Edwin Ramey, Bub Ramey, Swain Burkett, Charlie McLain, and T. A. Singer.

Judge E. L. Ivey acted as spokesman before the Highway Commission in making known the County's highway paving needs, while Mr. Burkett represented the City Government in requesting the paving of Highway 86 from the business section west to the intersection with the High School street. In asking for the completion of Highway 86 within the city Mr. Burkett explained to the Commission that the request was made in anticipation of a city paving project which would hinge on the paving of this portion of the highway. He was assured the State would cooperate with the city in the program and that a contract for the paving of Highway 86 in the city limits would be let when the first large paving contract in the county is made.

Members of the delegation who attended the meeting at Lubbock Wednesday declared that there would be no let up in the efforts of local citizens and officials until all of the designated highways in Castro county are paved and a just amount of farm to market paving is secured.

JOE W. JENNINGS ANNOUNCES FORMAL PLATFORM

Joe W. Jennings, of Hale county, this week announced the formal platform on which he seeks election to the Legislature from the 120th Legislative District.

In the last election Jennings received 6,026 votes of a total of 12,379 votes cast, being defeated by 327 votes. "Had I received 165 more votes I would have been elected by a narrow margin," he said. "With a more vigorous campaign this time, I feel confident that I will be successful," he said, "many citizens having indicated to me that they want a change at Austin. I have never held any political office."

A native Texan, Jennings graduated from Texas A. and M. in 1911, taught vocational agriculture, managed a ranch in Bailey county 1916-18, served as county agent in Lubbock and Randall counties, and since 1920 has farmed in Floyd county where he owns and continues to operate a 360 acre farm since moving to Plainview.

His platform advocates:

1. Retention permanently of 4 cents per gallon refund on farm-used gasoline.
2. Equitable proportion of farm to market roads for West Texas.
3. Adequate support of the needy aged, underprivileged children, the deaf, dumb, blind, and insane, but is not in favor of creating an Utopia for any group of citizens.
4. American system of free enterprise, as opposed to government regimentation.
5. Reorganization of Texas Legislature by reducing House of Representatives from 150 to 93, three representatives from each of the 31 senatorial districts, same being designated as Places One, Two and Three, so arranged as to equally represent each district.
6. Adequate, but not exorbitant salary for legislators, thus tending to reduce length of regular sessions and to decrease number of special sessions, and to give legislators something over the expense of attending. This would make the members independent of gratuities of well-meaning friends and free them from obligations thus incurred.
7. Four-year terms for all elective offices, both state and county, reducing expenses of elections and increasing services services of public officials.

He irrevocably opposes:

1. Any form of state control of our underground water resources. If, and only when, any control should appear advisable that it be under districts governed locally by elected representatives, subject only to such advice and information as may be necessary or desirable from the State Board of Water Engineers.
2. Any new or higher taxes and deficit financing, except in cases of dire necessity. Strict pay-as-you-go state fiscal policy and building up in good times a cash reserve to serve as a cushion in leaner years.
3. Unnecessary governmental interference in private business and agriculture—more business in government and less government in business.
4. Government by special blocks or by pressure groups.

I have and will make no commitments to any one and will pass on legislative matters as they arise and on the basis of the public welfare.

"It will be impossible for me to see every voter in the district," Jennings said, "and I will appreciate efforts of those who endorse my platform and me as a man to tell their neighbors about me and what I stand for."

INFORMATION ON 80 PER CENT FLOUR

Enriched 80 per cent flour, to be on grocery shelves soon, has the same vitamin content as enriched flour, but is higher in protein value according to Miss Edith Lawrence, food preparation specialist of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service.
 The story of American flour, Miss Lawrence says, goes something like this: For many years modern white flour has been losing important values in milling. In order to have it white and fine, and of good keeping quality, the outer coat of the grain was removed. With it went seven-eighths of the thiamine and niacin, three-fourths of the riboflavin, and four-fifths of the iron, as well as some calcium, phosphorus and better quality protein.
 Some of these values were returned when the bread was enriched with the three lost B-vitamins, thiamine, riboflavin and niacin, also iron.
 Only about 65 percent of the flour and flour products on the market, however, have been enriched.

Flours rank in this order in nutritional value: Whole wheat, enriched 80 per cent flour, enriched white flour, unenriched 80 per cent flour, and unenriched white flour.
 The new 80 per cent flour is much finer and lighter in color than whole wheat flour. Unenriched it has only about 40 per cent as much thiamine as whole wheat flour, only half as much as riboflavin and iron, and a fourth as much niacin.
 On the foods preparation end, tests conducted by the USDA Bureau of Home Economics under commercial baking conditions revealed that the difference in bread made with the old and new flours was not as great as had been expected. The loaves made from the 80 per cent flour did not rise quite as well as those from white flour, and the bread had a slightly off-white or creamy cast. The Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics has had reasonably good success in making biscuits and pastry with the 80 per cent flour.

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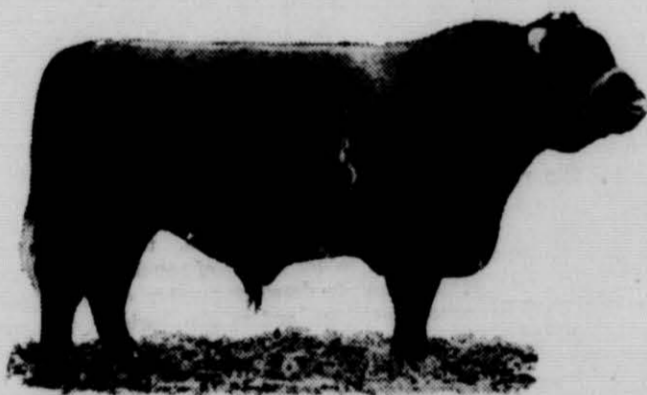

Pint of Peaches Yields Three Desserts



WITH wise planning, one pint of peaches can go a long way, writes the Country Cooking Editor of nationally circulated Capper's Farmer. The above picture proves her statement, for there's a pie, a salad and an upside down pudding, all rich with peaches—all the product of one pint of fruit.

Peach Patsys
 1/2 c. sugar 1/2 c. white bread crumbs
 1/2 c. milk 1/2 c. butter
 1/2 c. peach juice 1/2 c. sugar
 1/2 c. peaches 1/2 c. milk
 1/2 c. vanilla 1/2 c. egg whites

Soften gelatin in cold peach juice. Scald milk. Beat egg yolks slightly; add sugar and salt. Pour scalded milk gradually into egg mixture, stirring until blended. Cook in top of double boiler until of custard consistency. Remove from heat, add softened gelatin, and stir until dissolved. Cool. When mixture begins to thicken, fold in stiffly beaten egg whites, vanilla and chopped peaches. Pour into baked pie shell; chill until firm. Before serving, arrange slices of peach and a large peach half in design on top of pie.

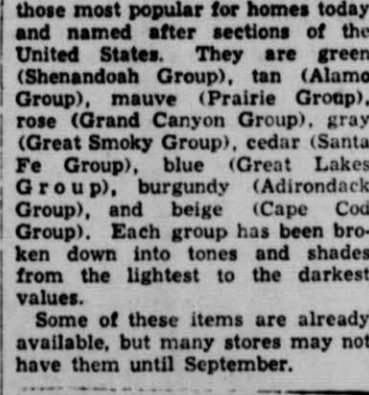
