Several top fund-raising campaigns in Dimmitt included one conducted in Dimmitt School which netted \$301.84, mostly i loose charge. The Mother's March on Polio, conducted Monday night and headed by Mrs. Bob Estes, blanketed the city in about thir ty minutes and came up with total of \$381.76.

Other fund raising activitie during the drive included coffee day sales at cafes here and at Hart, Lion blue crutch sales, and local berrefit basketball games.






