

## County MOD Drive Misses \$3,000 Goal

### \$2,100 in Collections Given Chairman for Drive Ending Tuesday

Castro County almost, but not quite, reached its March of Dimes Quota. With a total of \$2,135.67 turned in to Steve Taylor, county chairman, the county drive fell \$864.33 short of the \$3,000 goal.

The only collections yet to be made are from coin receptacles set up in public places over the county. It is guessed that several hundred dollars may be represented by these boxes.

Donations to the Infantile Paralysis fund came from all over the county, but some of the top figures came from Nazareth, Hart and Dimmitt.

Nazareth held a March of Dimes Dance Tuesday night and collected \$347.05. \$160 of this figure coming from the sale of pies and cakes. \$55.41 as collected by Nazareth school children.

The Hart Progressive Home Demonstration Club sponsored a basketball game between Hart and Plainview that netted \$122.15. Hart school children gave \$97.34 to help fight polio.

Several top fund-raising campaigns in Dimmitt included one conducted in Dimmitt Schools which netted \$301.84, mostly in loose change. The Mother's March on Polio, conducted Monday night and headed by Mrs. Bob Estes, blanketed the city in about thirty minutes and came up with a total of \$381.76.

Other fund raising activities during the drive included coffee day sales at cafes, bars and at Hart, Lion blue crutch sales, and local benefit basketball games.

The money collected will be turned in to the state drive chairman and put into use helping the nation's 68,000 polio victims.

All Castro County farmers are invited to the 10th annual Soils Fertility Day program scheduled Tuesday, February 14 in the Carlie Theater.

Beginning at 10 a. m. Tuesday the day's program will kickoff with a welcome and introductory

address by T. E. Harrison, president of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce.

Immediately following will be a farmers' panel composed of Leo Witkowski, stubble mulching and deep chiseling; Noble Howard, Hybrid grain sorghums and weed control; San Gilbreath, grain sorghums; Willie Hawkins, Sr., water conservation; M. L. Simpson, Jr., dairying and legume pastures; and Hugo Byers, cotton.

Winding up the morning's activities will be Mr. John Shrunk of the Irrigation Equipment Company, Inc., Denver, who will speak on irrigation and irrigation equipment beginning at 11:15. Mr. Shrunk, a native of Nebraska, has been with his company since January 1953 conducting irrigation schools and clinics over the United States and to putting out technical information for the use of the company's dealers and distributors. He also assists the Sprinkler Irrigation Association in conducting schools and irrigation clinics over the United States.

Luncheon for the farmers will

be in the Dimmitt School Cafeteria, and admission will be by tickets passed out to those entering the theater only. The luncheon will be at 12 o'clock and is sponsored by the Castro County Chamber of Commerce.

At 1 o'clock, following the luncheon, Bob West will show a series of slides on soil conservation.

Jack Barton, soil conservation practices expert from Texas A & M will speak beginning at 1:15. His talk will be followed at 2:00 o'clock by another A & M Extension service man, Mr. John McHaney. As a farm economist, he will speak on the general farm outlook for this and coming years.

Winding up the day's activities will be an hour-long speech beginning at 2:45 by Mr. Dooley Dawson, vice-president of the Second National Bank in Houston. An all-around farming expert, Mr. Dawson will devote most of his time to general soil conservation practices.

The program is sponsored jointly principally by the A & M Extension Service, Fort Worth & Denver Railroad and the Castro County Farm Bureau. Purpose of the Soils Fertility Day is to acquaint local farmers with the latest practices in Soil Conserva-

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## 100 Register With Blood Clinic On First Day

Drive Continues Until Next Thursday at Castro Co. Hospital

About 100 people reported to the Castro County Hospital for the first day of the blood-typing clinic Tuesday.

The Dimmitt Fire Department participated in the first day of the drive by staging a simulated run to the hospital. About thirty of the people following the fire truck wound up having their blood typed.

Purpose of the clinic is not so much to compile a list of donors as it is to assure a quick method of checking blood-types of accident victims. Often there is little time to make a laboratory check and quick blood identification can be of vital importance.

The 10-day clinic will continue to be held until next Thursday from 2 until 5 each afternoon except Sunday. All persons not having their blood type on file at the hospital are urged to be on hand one day this week for typing. Red Cross blood-donor cards are acceptable as blood-type identifications. An estimated 300 people in Dimmitt are represented in the file at present.

## ASC Paid Out \$109,000 in '55 To County Farmers

The Castro County ASC office last year paid out \$109,000 to county farmers and have a budget of \$111,000 for 1956, Doyle Thomas, ASC manager said this week.

The amount paid last year went to an estimated 350 farmers, Mr. Thomas said, with an automatic limitation of \$1,000 payment to any one farmer for participation in the soilbuilding and conservation program. "About seventy-five percent of last year's figure went into the installation of concrete irrigation pipe," Mr. Thomas said. The ASC can pay as much as fifty percent of the cost of concrete pipe installation so long as the total figure does not exceed \$1,000 for any one farmer.

## Junior Fat Stock Show Here February 10-11

### 4-H and FFA Youngsters to Compete For Livestock and Poultry Awards

Castro County 4-H and FFA youngsters will get a chance to show their results with farm animals at the second annual Junior Fat Stock and Project Show at the Fair Grounds Friday and Saturday, February 10 and 11.

Sponsored by the Castro County Chamber of Commerce, the show will include calves, lambs, pigs and poultry. Ollie Liner, Hale county agent from Plainview will judge the livestock. A poultry judge is yet to be selected.

4-H adult leaders and mothers will sponsor a noon luncheon for the youngsters Saturday.

According to Marvin Simms, Castro County agricultural agent, all livestock must be in place by 7 p. m. Fri. and all animals must be weighed at the time of entry and tagged. Each boy and girl will be allowed to place not more than two calves, two pigs and two lambs in any one class of singles. He may, however, enter three calves, three pigs, or three lambs in the show. He will be allowed to place only two animals of any class in the sale which will follow the show.

All livestock (calves, hogs and sheep) will be sifted for condition, quality, grooming and training. All entries were to have been in the Castro County Chamber of Commerce office by February 1, 1956.

J. O. Seale will be superintendent of the Calves division. The calves will be divided into light and heavy-weight divisions, with the first and second place winners in each of these classes competing for grand champion and reserve champion. All calves must be less than 18 months in age and none will be allowed in the show that has not been on feed at least ninety days prior to the show. 1957 beef calves must be on feed, by the exhibitor for at least 180 days prior to the show. Awards

in this division will be ribbons for the first five places, banner for grand champion and rosette for reserve champion.

J. V. Wescott is lamb superintendent and five classes of lambs will be shown. They are Southdown, Southdown crosses, other shuntton breeds and crosses, fine wool type lambs and groups of three lambs. Awards are ribbons for first five places, banner for grand champion and rosette for reserve champion.

## 2,250 Poll Tax Receipts Issued County Voters

Castro County citizens went after their poll taxes this year in a big way. More than 400 more poll tax receipts were issued than ever before prior to the deadline Wednesday. The Sheriff's office issued an estimated 2,250 paid receipts and filed fifty-one exemptions. The rush came during the last two days as about 25 percent applied just before the deadline.

Discounting run-offs and special elections, the poll tax receipts will permit voting in Dimmitt's city elections this spring, the July and August primaries and in the November general elections.

## Drifting Snow Hampers Traffic Over County

### School Dismissed As Mercury Drops To Around Zero

Old Man Winter gave Castro County a hard time this week. Temperatures hovered around freezing and Wednesday night saw the mercury plummet to around four degrees below zero.

An estimated four to six inches of snow fell Wednesday night and Thursday morning, piling drifts as high as five feet and making extremely difficult driving conditions until city snow plows began work shortly after 8 o'clock.

School is not scheduled for today (Thursday) and according to High School officials will not be held Friday unless weather conditions quickly improve. Teachers, bus drivers and other school employees are assuming no school Friday.

Highway travel was at a virtual standstill and schools were closed all over the High Plains. High winds which piled the snow in drifts along the highways and in city streets added to the difficulty. Weather reports indicated further-freezing weather the remainder of the week.

Business was as usual in Dimmitt but relatively few cars or pedestrians were out in the open.

## Mrs. Willie Slaton Injured in Accident

Mrs. Willie Slaton, first grade teacher in Dimmitt Schools, was reported in fair condition at Castro County Hospital after suffering a broken collar bone late Tuesday afternoon in a two-car collision near the north-east corner of the Court House Square. Her car was turned over when it was struck after pulling out into the intersection going north by another automobile going east. No charges were filed in the accident.

# Arvizu Pipe Co., Dimmitt's First Manufacturer, Began Making Concrete Pipe Last Week

It's not easy to set up a factory and get it into operation—but that's what has been happening in Dimmitt the past several months.

The factory—Dimmitt's only manufacturing plant—is the Arvizu Concrete Pipe Company. This firm takes sacked cement, rocks and sand, and through an ingenious machine, turns it into concrete irrigation pipe, culvert pipe and sewer pipe.

The machine making the pipe was constructed last year under the direction of Mr. James Arvizu in Pecos. He was also installation supervisor at the pipe plant. Some eight men per shift are required to operate the machine and stack the pipe sections both in the building and in the yard. The pipe is formed in three feet

sections up to a maximum of 36 inches in diameter.

In principal, the pipe-making machine is simple, but the complex system of hydraulics, cams and levers of the \$10,000 apparatus is considerably complicated. To begin the operation, a hollow cylindrical form in two sections is placed around a solid steel core and locked together, leaving several inches of space between the two elements. Next a conveyor belt carries concrete up from a mixing pit and pours it through a spout between the core and shell.

Next a mechanical tamper hammers down the concrete as it is poured packing it into a solid mass. The core and outside shell is revolving all the time—the pouring going on one side and the

tamping on the other. The tamper pounds away at about 800 strokes per minute, forcing most of the water out of the concrete and causing it to "set up" within a few moments.

When the form is filled and tamping finished, the core is withdrawn through a hydraulic lift and the outer shell is removed. Bracing rings are placed under the newly-formed three-foot section of pipe and it is put into a steam-room to cure. After this operation it is set out to dry and finish curing-out.

According to Mr. Arvizu this tamping process is a new innovation and the machine in Dimmitt is the only one currently using the principle on the High Plains today.

The plant has plans for a current production rate of 1,200 to

1,300 feet of pipe per day, or about 400 three-foot sections. "Of course if we add two or three shifts, we can double or triple that production figure," Mr. Arvizu said. Ordinarily a field crew can lay the pipe about as fast as the machine can produce it.

The company, begun in California by Mr. Ruben Arvizu, has laid pipe all over the irrigated Southwest. Up to this time their only Texas plant was in Pecos.

Ben Pasley, general manager, has been in the concrete pipe business 20 years, the past 10 in production supervision. He is married and the father of 2 children. He is formerly of Bakersfield, Calif. "We will employ between fifty and sixty people in the plant, ditching crews and sales staff," Mr. Pasley said. "There's a lot

of work to this business and it takes a good many people."

"We looked around over the plains for a suitable plant location," he said, "and decided on Dimmitt. It's in the center of one of the finest irrigation districts in the country. I don't believe we could have picked a better location for our operation."

The plant officially began operation last Wednesday, but was shut down after a one-day run to await arrival of a brake part from Pecos for the casting machine. Current plans are for one 8-hour shift a day unless heavier production demands are made. Mr. Pasley invited all farmers in this area to drop by the plant at their convenience and learn how concrete irrigation pipe is made.

The demonstration class next Friday carries with it no obligation to enroll for the further training of 15 classes and will be free to everyone. Coffee with the time and place reserved to those attending as originally planned.

## Listing to Bring 60c Per Acre to Dry Land Farmers

In a meeting Wednesday, the Castro County ASC committee adopted a program aimed at helping dry-land farmers of this area control wind erosion. It was voted to pay 60 cents per acre for listing non-irrigated land to a depth of four inches in an ASC-farmer participation plan.

Formerly 75 cents per acre was paid for chiseling only, but due to farming conditions existing in the northeast part of Castro County, it was decided to adopt the two-fold program. This came as an amendment to the ASC handbook.

Also decided upon was a policy of helping farmers pay for interplanting cowpeas and mungbeans with summer legumes and other crops. The ASC will pay eight cents per pound for cowpea seed and five cents per pound for mungbeans.

### Bobbies, Bobcats Take Conference Wins at Muleshoe

The Dimmitt Bobbies and Bobcats rode rough shod over the Muleshoe Males and Muleteers at Muleshoe in a conference double-header Friday night, the girls winning 60-41 and the boys 58-43.

Jim Cole went on a scoring spree as he raked up his highest single game point total of the season—29 points. Wilmer Studer tossed in 11 for the Cats while Walt and Jennings got 12 apiece for the Males. The Jacks held a 26-22 lead at the half but "poured on the Cole" in the final two canches, from three to four weeks of age, and during six to seven weeks, it should be increased to three inches per bird.

These needs can be met by one four foot trough for each 100 chicks at the start. At six to seven weeks of age they will need three troughs four feet long by twelve inches deep per 100 chicks. Wormless recommends five gallon waterers by each brooder have a capacity of 500 chicks. From two to three weeks of age, place capacity should be provided for each 100 birds. If a waterer is available, a four foot automatic water trough should be provided for each 250 chicks.

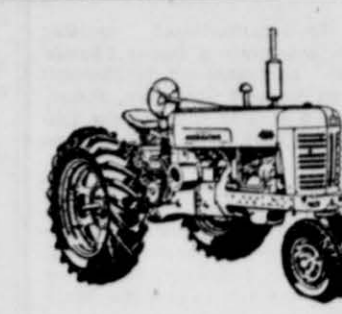

Horizontal Silos  
Prove Practicality

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 2.—Horizontal silos have proved their practicality as a replacement for trench silos in some locations. These silos are constructed on top of the ground with self-supporting walls. They are designed on the principle of the trench silo, and run horizontally. Horizontal silos, which are increasing in number, must be economical, conveniently located, properly designed and constructed for long service.

Many trench silos could not be located for adequate drainage and good feeding arrangements, and so did not meet these qualifications. The above ground silos have been somewhat of a problem, since self-supporting walls are necessary. Some of the work has been concerned with this problem. Fifty-up concrete wall panels, 6 feet high, 10 feet wide and 4 inches thick were used. These were precast or poured on the floor of the silo and later raised into position.

## EDITORIAL COMMENT

### Community Center

For the past week we have talked to people who think we should have a community center building of some description. For years this idea has been kicked around without any actual progress being made past the talking stage.

Such a building would be a definite benefit to the community. It would be a place where people could get together to discuss their own business, to plan for the future, to help one another, to build their own organization. A community center could also be a place for clubs and other similar organizations without making sometimes long and awkward arrangements.

So far everyone has been very cooperative; but nonetheless, it is an imposition to ask our churches and schools to open their doors for everything that comes along.

Take for instance the proposed Dale Carnegie courses which will meet in the Methodist Church Fellowship hall. This is a good project of the Lions Club and will be of substantial benefit to the county. But it would be much more practical to have a community building for this type of thing than to call on the churches and schools for space.

The same applies to stage productions, speeches, banquets and the dozens of other things which come up during the year.

With a community center we could actually put some of our city offices, library, and other permanent organizations in better quarters. A conservative estimate for such a building would be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$200,000—not a large undertaking for a city of this size. Planned right, such a center could furnish one of its walls to organizations wanting to build their own structure.

Almost all of us belong to some kind of club or organization—whether it be Lions Club, book club, home demonstration club, Farm Bureau, chamber of commerce, G. O. P., or so on ad infinitum. A community center would be open to everybody and could actually be developed to everybody's building of a second home to all of us.

Such a building would have to be constructed to last and be attractive—something on the scale of the court house or the schools and churches. It would necessarily be something everyone could be proud of and would link the community center problem for years to come.

Before such a project can be undertaken, an educational program must be conducted by some organization (or organizations) in Dimmitt to show the people the need for such a building and a lot of volunteer work by someone. But it's high time we started and got something done—we need it and need it badly.

### Our State Government

Fortunately no local people were hurt by the failure of so many of our state insurance companies to our knowledge, but by the Veterans Land scandal—except through the wastage of our tax money.

We are paying right along because we are a loosely-bound, uncoordinated parcel of citizens with no lobbyists or legislative funds for seeing that we get an even break. We pay for everything while big business gets a relatively free ride. We are not condemning big business—we'd do the same thing if they are doing it if we were in their shoes probably. It's the legislators and the governor and his staff that are the undoing of the shoeing. They permit a whole lot of things to happen and simply by the influence of the lobby Texas corporations and business behemoths are able to get every break in the books. And the lobbyists in the state capital work with money as their chief tool.

In past weeks several legislators have been found guilty by their own admission of accepting "retainers." Whether from an oil corporation, shabby insurance company, or a clothes-hanger manufacturer, a "retainer" for a legislator is nothing but a bribe.

Everything that has been happening lately of a derogatory nature in the state government is just one broken stroke of a picture of degradation of political morals and ethics. Taxpayers can boast of many things, but unfortunately not of their own top-level of government.

Why blame the insurance companies for their failure? They were supposed to be controlled by the state government. If most of us were not made to toe the line through our laws, we would certainly act differently than we do. If the state insurance commission had been conscientious in their job and kept the companies like they were supposed to have done none of this would probably have happened.

The same applied more or less in the Veterans Land Scandal. Bascom Giles would never have tried to slip money out of the fund if he hadn't thought he could get away with it. His contempt for the government was probably well-founded, but he reckoned without the fact that the state government was able to bring the whole smelly works out into the open.

It is the legislators and his staff that are the undoing of the shoeing. They permit a whole lot of things to happen and simply by the influence of the lobby Texas corporations and business behemoths are able to get every break in the books. And the lobbyists in the state capital work with money as their chief tool.

Are the People Leaving the Farm?

The Department of Commerce has recently released the 1954 census of agriculture. Significant changes in the agricultural picture are obvious. In the United States from 1950 to 1954 the number of farms decreased by 600 thousand. There was a decrease in every state except Florida. This was a decline of 11.1 percent in the number of farms.

This census reflects that there are fewer farms in 1954 than for any census since 1880. The largest portion of this decrease was in the family-sized farms of from 10 to 100 acres. Farmers in that category declined 40 thousand or 17.8 percent between 1950 and 1954. A politician should have as much moral fiber and the same respect as a district judge. One day, if his keeps up, it will be a disgrace to run for state office.

If there is just a particle of truth in all that we read and hear, then this surely must be one of the most corrupt state administrations in history. If not corrupt, then the sure winner in stupidity and laziness.

Judge Yarborough and his followers tried to warn Texans during the last election year, but power politics got on as big a propaganda drive as we've been unfortunate enough to see.

## Cotton Goals Adopted

(Ed. Note—The following news story was taken from a recent issue of the Lubbock Avalanche and is reprinted here in the hope it will prove informative to cotton producers in this area.)

Forty-six directors from 23 South Plains counties voted the Plains Cotton Growers organization into being at 1:48 p. m. Friday in a meeting at the Hotel Lubbock.

The directors selected the name Plains Cotton Growers, raised more than \$3,000 for immediate operational expenses, went on record as supporting six specific measures affecting cotton in this area, voted to establish officers including a president, vice-president, and secretary-treasurer, appointed three committees, and made plans to seek a state charter for the organization.

W. O. Fortenberry of Lubbock will serve as president of the Plains Cotton Growers. The directors voted to recognize the 23 counties represented at the Friday meeting, as charter members of the Plains Cotton Growers and additional member counties will be accepted by the board of directors.

Directors selected the name, Plains Cotton Growers in order that the organization might at a later date include counties outside this immediate area.

Directors also went on record as favoring action in working with any other state or national group or any cotton problem of common interest.

The more than \$3,000 raised Friday was done on a voluntary basis as directors instructed the finance committee to study ways and means of financing the organization which will be acted upon and announced later.

The group's members were unanimous in most of the six specific measures they went on record as endorsing.

### Dimmitt Man Made Registered Surveyor

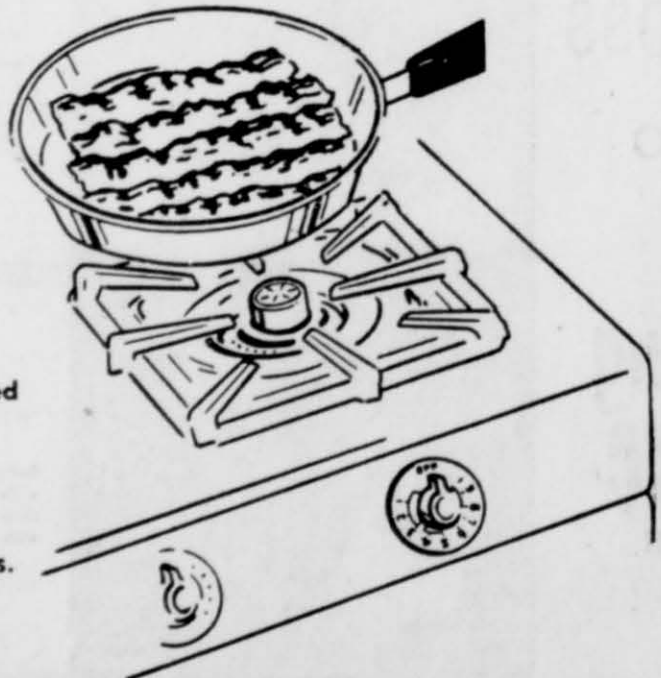
