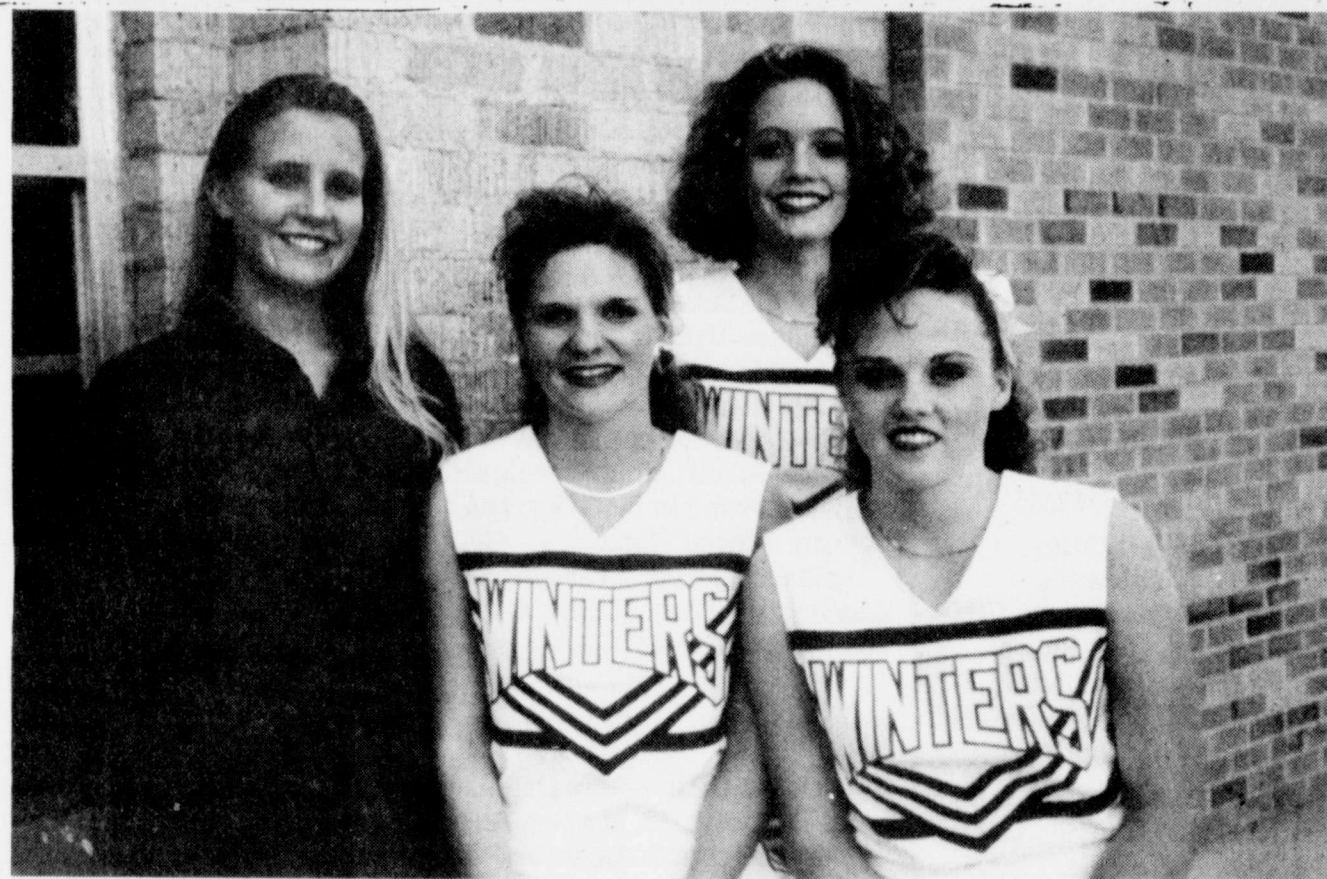

## Winters says "no"

With 367 votes against and 316 votes for, citizens of Winters said "no" to the local liquor option. Fifty-two percent of the registered voters in Winters turned out in this election. Turnout was considered good with 683 of 1306 registered voters actually voting. The October 30 election for the sale of alcohol for off premises consumption generated a great deal of interest. A number of letters to the editor were printed in this paper. Also, several church groups called prospective voters and mail outs were sent. A fifty-one vote difference in this election is not the smallest or largest in recent history. The last four propositions for the sale of alcoholic beverages were defeated as follows:

## Blizzards lose to Rotan Tied for District lead

The Winters Blizzards held the Rotan Yellowhammers scoreless in the second half of last Friday's ball game. Unfortunately, Rotan outscored the Blizzards 34-14 in the first half. With the final score being the same as the half time score, Winters drops into a four-way tie for the District 7-2A lead. Hamlin, Stamford, Rotan and Winters all have 4-2 district records. According to Head Coach Dan Slaughter, the District had not set up a tiebreaker system for a four-way tie. He stated that most likely a four-way tie would be broken by a draw from a hat. A three-way tie would be broken with a flip of the coin.

Of course, the tie situation only occurs if all four teams win this Friday night. And, to add to the suspense, none of the four teams play each other. The Blizzards seemed chilled when the game started and the Yellowhammers were red hot. Rotan recovered the opening kickoff at the Winters 23 when the Blizzards were slow getting to the ball. Rotan scored three plays later. The Blizzards came roaring back and drove 72 yards to tie the score on John Belew's one yard run. Zane Guy caught passes of 26 and 18 yards to sustain that drive.

The next 27 points were scored by the Yellowhammers off of Blizzard fumbles and a blocked punt. "Those turnovers hurt," Slaughter said. "I think we made a lot of mistakes because we were trying too hard. We didn't play solid defense in the first half and they just blew us away." Before the first half was over, Winters drove 90 yards to score on a five yard pass to Adrian Albarado for the game's final points with a half left to play. Half time defensive adjustments seemed to stop both offenses in the second half. John Belew passed 17 times with 11 completions for 149 yards and a 64.7% completion total. David Roman was the leading rusher with 82 yards on 10 carries. Doug Gray was the leading tackler with 19. The Blizzards play the Jim Ned Indians at Blizzard Field Friday at 7:30. This is the last regular season game of the year. Jim Ned has a good team but they seem to be up and down. The Indians always play the Blizzards tough. Winters needs this victory to stay in the hunt for the district race. Back the Big Blue this Friday at 7:30.

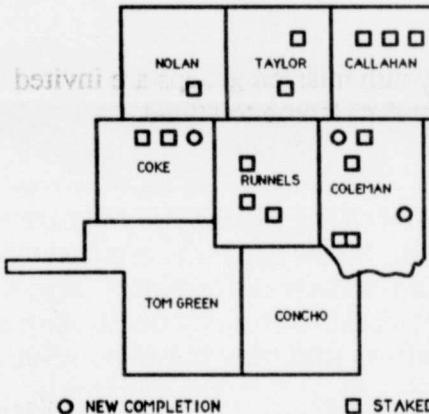

## Operator fined for violations on local oil lease

The Texas Railroad Commission has fined A&G Petroleum of Weatherford \$1,500 for well plugging violations on the Schwertner -A- lease in Runnels County.

The fine was made under Railroad Commission (RRC) pollution and conservation rules as part

of a total of \$149,000 in administrative penalties made against thirty-one oil and gas operators in the most recent reporting period. So far in 1992, the RRC has assessed total penalties of \$1,186,066, which is a ninety-eight percent increase over the 1991 total.

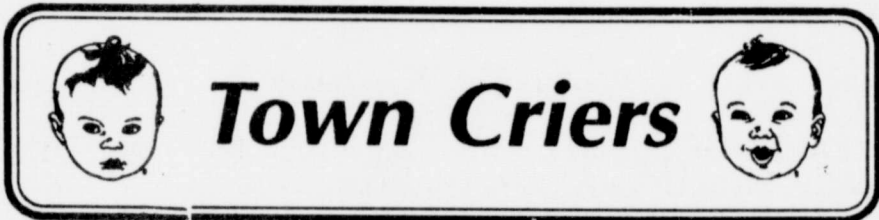
**Runnels Baptist banquet will be in Robert Lee**

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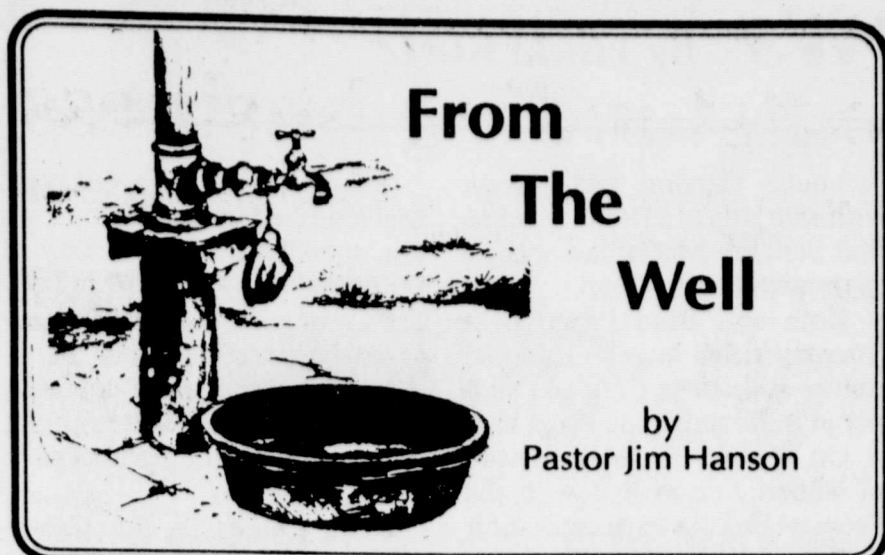
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## From The Well

Not too long ago, I wandered into a bookstore. I was looking for a recent biography of Teddy Roosevelt. I didn't find it. But I did find one on Harry Truman. As I opened it, my eyes fell on the page where these words were written, "Boys, pray for me. Pray for me like you have never prayed before. I feel like a whole load of hay has fallen on my neck, the sun, the moon, and all the stars." As I read these words, I wondered who he was talking to and what brought them on.

As I continued reading, I discovered that Harry Truman was talking to a group of reporters who had come to meet with the vice-president. And the reason they came was that they, together with the vice-president, had just learned of the death of President Franklin D. Roosevelt. These words, "Boys, pray for me" were the first ones uttered by a man who was just thrust into the office of President.

By the time you are reading this column, we will have elected a President. Whether you voted for the winner or not, and whether he requests it or not, pray for him. For indeed, a whole load of hay has fallen on his neck. The responsibilities of that office are awesome. He needs our prayers.

All of our people in government need our prayers. I can remember a conversation I had with Bob Bergland, former Secretary of Agriculture. He served under Jimmy Carter. I had known him as a U.S. representative from where I had lived in northern Minnesota. We were talking about prayer. He shared with me that it was not easy for him to pray with others in small groups. He felt much more comfortable praying by himself. He told me that he had part of his study set aside as a prayer place, and that every day when he was home, he would spend time in that very place, praying! As we continued our conversation, I asked him, "Bob, what can we as Christians do for you, how can we help?" His answer was simple, direct, and without hesitation. "Jim, pray for us. Please don't try to tell us how to do our job. Many matters in government today are extremely complex and difficult and many times seem beyond us. We need the wisdom from on high to make the right decisions and faith in Almighty God to carry them out. Please pray for us."

The apostle Paul, writing to his young partner Timothy, put it this way, "First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all men, for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life, godly and respectful in every way." Could it be that this is what God is telling us in our time, that our primary duty as Christian citizens is to do what many of them need us to do? To pray for them. For you can be sure that the load of hay isn't any lighter today. And you can be sure that God will hear us and that there is no better thing we can do for those who are elected. And for us too.

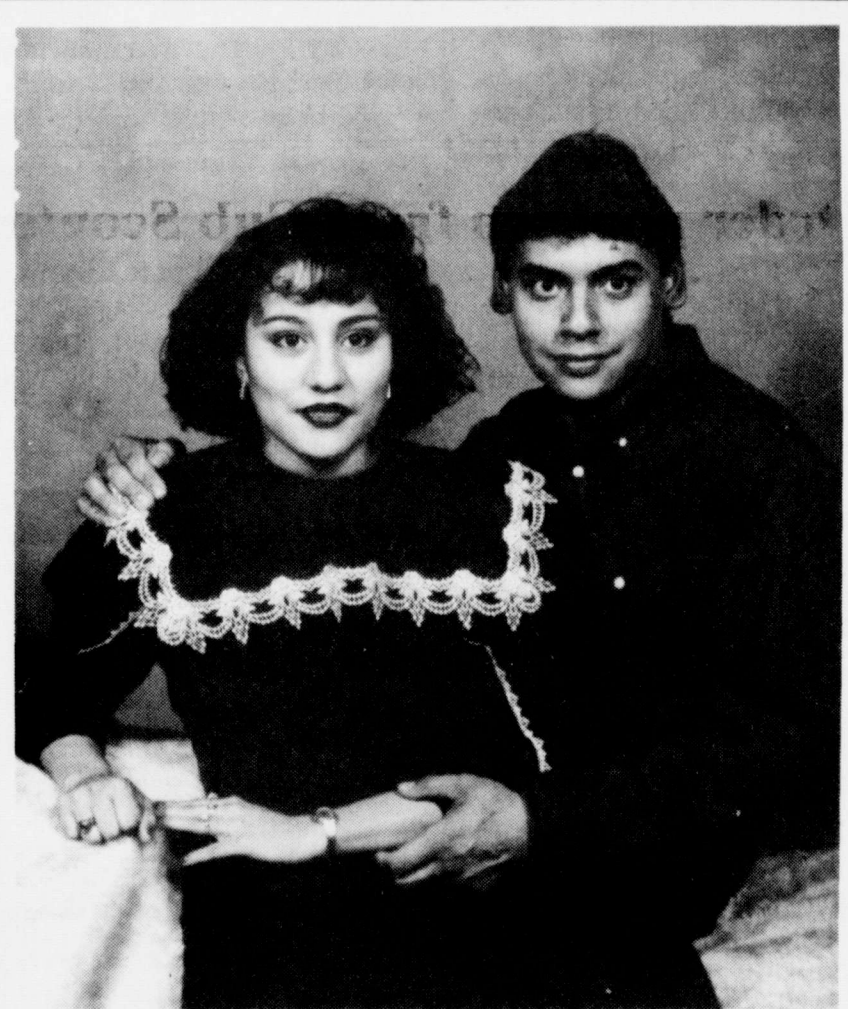
