Baird Bears Tame Snyder Tigers

Playing at home, before a large holiday crowd, the Baird Bears tamed a weak Snyder team 45 to 0 in an Armistice Day game Tuesday afternoon.

The Bears struck early in the first quarter with Raymond Cook and Buddy Brumbaugh sharing the ball carrying honors, behind good blocking, on a 65 yard drive that carried down inside the 5 yard stripe where Buddy plunged it over. Raymond Cook placed kicked the extra point.

The Bears went to town for three tallies in the second quarter Cook and Brumbaugh again divided the leather lugging chores on a stustained drive that carried 50 yards to the 1 yard stripe and Brumbaugh again plunged over for the marker. Two almost identical plays a short time after, with Cook stossing to Brumbaugh on the 20 yard stripe brought two quick touchdowns. Cook kicked the extra point after one of them and the half ended with the score, Baird 26, Snyder, 0.
