April is Cancer Control Month

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of a series of five articles on the question: "Cancer breakthrough—now or never?" This article deals with the present status of cancer control.)

Is the long-awaited "cancer breakthrough" near?

A few recognized authorities have suggested that it may be. But the word, "breakthrough," is left undefined. And few, if any, will hazard a guess as to just when this blessing may come to pass. They don't say how near is near.

Unhappily, it must be said at the outset, nothing in the published accounts or in confidential reports of thousands of scientists working on the cancer problem now suggests that a new cure is at hand. As things stand, the 260,000 Americans doomed to die of cancer in 1959 will die on schedule—unless something unforeseen happens. That a "breakthrough" will come to pass eventually few now will deny. This is a strange and encouraging contrast to the attitude of scientists and informed doctors of only a decade ago, when the consensus seemed to be that cancer, by and large, never would be controlled.

In this series, we will try to outline where we now stand, prospects for the immediate future, the course of future progress and the possibilities of a sudden and surprising development which would drive cancer from its grim eminence as the second most prolific killer of this century.

WHAT IS A BREAKTHROUGH?
For our purposes, a cancer breakthrough would be any development which would a) prevent a substantial percentage of cancers which now occur, or b) bring about the cure of advanced cancers—the kind against which Medicine today is completely helpless.

In a sense, and within the framework of this definition, the last twenty or so years have seen a cancer breakthrough—or, more exactly, a "sneakthrough." Just recently we have found that one in three cancer patients is saved; the figure used to be one in four.

This salvage of human life has not been due to research advances so much as to the application of common sense by patients and of good medical practices by doctors. The patients became suspicious of their symptoms and brought them to the attention of the physicians in time—and the doctors cut out the cancers or burned them out with radiation before they could seed distant parts of the body and fore-close on the patients' lives.

It was one saved in four. Now it is one in three. When will it be one in two? It could be one in two right now—and without a single new discovery. One-half of today's cancer victims die not so much from cancer as from ignorance,

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE . . .
Congressman Omar Burleson

WASHINGTON, D. C.—UNDER THE PROVISIONS of legislation passed in the last Congress, there will be five experimental plants built in the United States to convert salt water to fresh water. A new lower cost method has been developed since 1957 at a plant located in North Carolina. Experiments in a small plant near Wichita Falls have produced most satisfying results.

OF THE FIVE PLANTS to be built by the Federal Government, one will be located on the Atlantic Seaboard, one on the Pacific, and one on the Gulf Coast. The other two plants will be located inland to convert "brackish" water to fresh water. West Central Texas certainly has an abundance of brackish water to convert. Efforts are being made to convince officials of the Department of the Interior of the feasibility of locating such a plant in the 17th Congressional District. Competition with this effort is not only provided by other areas in the State of Texas, but by New Mexico, Arizona, Oklahoma and many others. The first reaction by the Department of the Interior is that Texas will likely have a salt water plant on the Gulf and that another would not be located in the State. Regardless of this discouraging logic, efforts will be continued to get both plants for Texas.

THE IDEA THAT TWO PLANTS should not be located in Texas follows the pattern of what is often said about Texas in Washington. We are criticized for having been favored over other States to what many believe is to their disadvantage. This is often heard with reference to military installations, and particularly air bases. The fact that we have more to offer in weather and other conditions seemingly is not convincing enough.

SPEAKING OF RESOURCES IN TEXAS, both human and economic, those of us only a short distance away forget that almost the entire world supply of helium gas is located within a 250-mile radius of Amarillo. It is of the highest strategic importance to our Nation's Atomic

Energy Program and in outer space experiments. It is used in welding light metals for jet aircraft, rockets and for other purposes for which there is no adequate substitute. It is used for refrigerating other gases in a highly developed scientific way. From reports, the supply produced near Amarillo is limited and may not last more than 20 to 30 years longer. There has been some indication that the Congress may be asked to institute some sort of conservation program for storing and recovering about 3 billion cubic feet of helium. The Interior Department has proposed new plants to be located on helium gas pipelines, in an effort to recover that last each year in natural gas transmission for fuel to areas far removed from Amarillo. It is certainly important to conserve all natural resources, and especially this one for which the supply is seriously limited, as related to its present day consumption.

LIKEWISE, IT IS VITALLY IMPORTANT that we practice the very best water and soil conservation possible. These resources will not be with us for always unless we handle them with care.

THIS MATTER OF CONVERTING salt water and brackish water to fresh water at a cost we can afford to pay, certainly could be a boon to dry West Texas.

IT'S THE LAW In Texas . . .

ROYAL JURIES

In his first speech in 1801 as President, Jefferson listed the essentials of our government: Equal and exact justice to all men of whatsoever state or persuasion religious or political; freedom of religion; freedom of the press; freedom of person under the protection of the habeas corpus; and trial by juries impartially selected. Impartially selected juries were a long time coming. Before England adopted trial by jury, she had three ways of deciding a case.

1. Trial by ordeal: If you pleaded innocent, your hand might be thrust into boiling water, then wrapped up. If in three days it was "clean" or uninfected, it showed you were not lying. Otherwise you were guilty.

2. Trial by battle in civil cases: You or "your champion" could fight it out with your opponent. The winner won the lawsuit.

3. "Oath-helpers": A party's friends would recite an oath that he was in the right. An oath helper's mistake in the recital was taken as divinely inspired to show his party was in the wrong.

After the Norman conquest in 1066, the English kings sent out officers to get information. Subjects testified from personal knowledge about what took place in the locality.

Henry I in the Twelfth century used these same people to find facts in the law cases before them, which was the beginning of our jury system today.

The chief differences between our juries and the early ones:

1. The early juries told the judge what the local law or custom was. Today it is the judge who instructs the jury.
2. The early juries knew the facts before they met; today they should hear the facts for the first time in court.
3. The early juries had already taken sides before they were served. Today's are supposed to be open-minded.

flare ups, your physician will probably suggest that you watch out for:

Chocolate in any form such as candy, cookies, ice cream sodas, sauces, cold drinks. Instead, stick to vanilla or fruit flavored sodas and soft drinks, white cakes and cookies.

Nuts, especially peanuts and peanut butter, are capable of causing skin eruptions. Sharp cheeses won't help your acne either, but cream or cottage cheeses are usually okay.

Shellfish or salt water fish, and melons can be aggravating to acne.

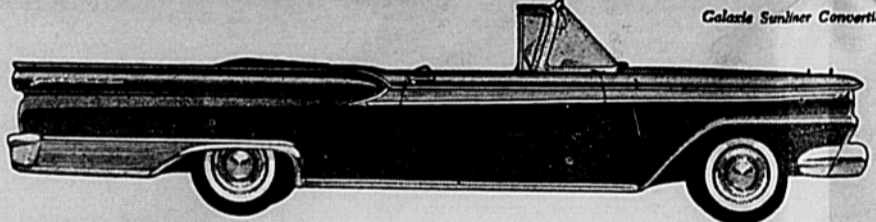
Woolen clothing next to bare skin might cause your neck or back to break out. If so, the solution is simple—don't wear wool except as an outer garment.

The bromides in cold pills, nerve medicines and sedatives cause skin difficulties for some people. So can iodine in cough syrups and table salt.

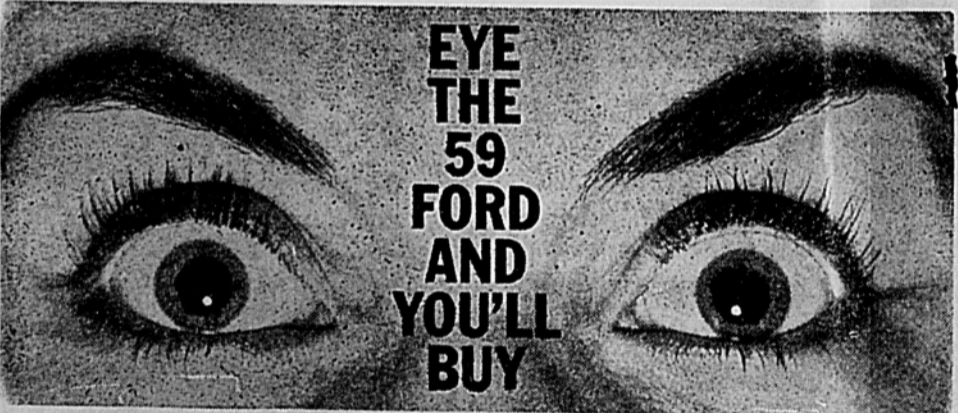
Following the rules of good health—getting plenty of exercise and sleep, eating nutritious meals, and drinking plenty of water—will help you get rid of unsightly acne.

Don't expect the blemishes to disappear overnight. If you follow these suggestions for three or four months and your acne hasn't improved, your family physician, or a specialist, he will recommend, will probably prescribe internal and external medicines for your particular case.

So between you and your doctor, you have a much better than even chance of having a clean, clear complexion in time for the first big dance of the new school year next fall. It's well worth working for. (A weekly feature of the Health Education Division, Texas State Department of Health.)
