Coke County War Fund Drive Launched In Most Satisfactory Way to Judge McNeil Wylie—Contributions are Coming In Fast

The Coke County War Fund Drive that was launched last week, with Judge McNeil Wylie as county chairman, is swinging into a real drive, with proportions that even surprise Judge Wylie.

With his aides, Judge Wylie sent a personal communication to every citizen in the county, telling what the drive is and what it is for, and that it is expected of everyone in the county to make a contribution.

Already responses are coming in. The contributions are both large and small, and Judge Wylie really expects now to have a contribution from every citizen in the county.

Lively Contest Looms in Race For Congress

The formal filing of his application for a place on the July primary ballot by District Attorney O. C. Fisher of San Angelo insures a lively contest for the Congress post now held by C. L. South of Coleman.

Fisher has already sounded the keynote of differences with the incumbent. He has pointed to his disagreement with Congressman South's opposition to revising the Neutrality A. T. and also to South's votes against building 5 major battleships, 9 cruisers, 23 destroyers, 9 submarines and 950 naval aircraft.

It will be recalled that Mr. South was elected over Carl Runge in 1934 by a narrow margin. South has not had a real test since then.

Fisher, who is a native of the hill country, having been reared in Kimble county, has in recent years been a favorite with the voters at San Angelo and surrounding counties. He has served successively as County Attorney, State Representative, and is now in his 6th year as District Attorney.

Livestock Clinic For Coke County, By Livestock Assn.

Progress is being made in Coke county in the control of stock diseases that are always taking toll, more or less, of the livestock of the county.

With the coming of farm agent into the county and with the vocational agriculture departments added to the curriculum of the schools at Robert Lee and Bronte, a brighter day for the livestock industry of the county, has come, and a check has been thrown around the inroads that disease on the livestock of the county have been making.

Out of the above agencies came the Coke County Livestock Show, which is sponsored and promoted by the Coke County Livestock Association—an organization consisting of the interested livestock growers in the county. This organization has a directorate composed of men who are not asleep on the job. C. E. Arrott, Bronte, is president of the livestock group and P. P. Fitzhugh, Robert Lee, is secretary.

The livestock men, through their organization, have been studying the livestock interests of the county and the best methods of controlling and preventing disease among the livestock of the county. The group has developed a livestock clinic for the county. They have perfected arrangements with Dr. Chas. Koberg of San Angelo, a widely known and successful veterinarian, to come to the county, twice each month and conduct a livestock clinic for any and all who have animals that may need professional attention. The plan is for the clinic to be held at Bronte once each month and at Robert Lee once a month. The days for the clinic are the first and third Saturdays in the month. The first clinic will be held in Bronte, tomorrow, Saturday, June 6, and the third Saturday, it will be held in Robert Lee. The time for the clinic to open is 1:30 P. M.

Anyone who has an animal that is diseased in any way, is invited to bring it to the clinic at the time of the meeting of the clinic and Dr. Koberg will treat the animal and advise the owner as to the course of treatment and he will charge the owner only the fees for such veterinarian services.

Speaking to The Enterprise editor relative to the matter, Prof. J. T. Henry, agriculture instructor in the Bronte schools, said: "There are horses in this section with bad teeth that very much need to be treated, and cancerized cows that also, by all means, should be treated. This arrangement makes it possible for the owners to get the professional services of a capable veterinarian which otherwise would not be available to them, at a price they could afford to pay. I hope the owners of animals that need treatment will take advantage of this arrangement."

Remember the date: the first and third Saturdays each month, and the first clinic is in Bronte, tomorrow, June 6, and the third Saturday it will be in Robert Lee.

"KILL MOSQUITOES FOR HEALTH'S SAKE," SAYS HEALTH OFFICER

Austin, Texas, June 4—Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, today issued a warning against the danger of malaria following the unusually heavy rainfall in Texas during the past few months.

"Malaria will remain a major health problem as long as breeding places are accessible to the female Anopheles mosquito," Dr. Cox said. "Every householder should make sure that there are no tin cans, broken bottles, or other types of rubbish on his premises that will hold water and offer breeding places to this enemy of good health."

Dr. Cox pointed out that in our practice of mosquito control, we are sometimes like the man who locked the stable after the horse was already stolen: We are content to wait until all our premises are swarming with mosquitoes before we bring ourselves into a tivo warfare against these recognized agents of malaria transmission.

Dr. Cox further stressed the importance of conserving the nation's manpower in our present national emergency and emphasized the fact that malaria is one of the more debilitating diseases, often causing its victim to lose weeks or even months from his regular employment.

"The good health of our people is our first line of civilian defense," Dr. Cox asserted, "and it is the patriotic duty of every citizen to assist in keeping down malaria and thus aid in keeping our civilian population at its maximum state of productivity."

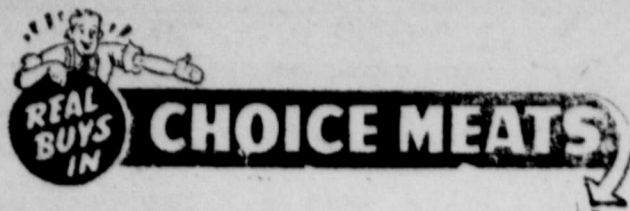

To Win the War, We Must Win the Peace, Too, Fisher Says

Eden, Texas, May 30—District Attorney O. C. Fisher of San Angelo, candidate for Congress, in a patriotic Memorial Day address here today, paid tribute to Woodrow Wilson's ill-fated vision of a permanent peace, and cautioned that to gain a full victory in this war the peace to follow must also be won.

"We won the last war but we lost the peace," the speaker told a large audience gathered at the decoration services at the Eden cemetery, where he was the principal speaker.

"Wilson's ideal of a world free from the agony and fear of a recurring war," he reminded, "was blocked by a small group of isolationists in Congress who adhered to the old fallacy that the ostrich can protect itself from violence by sticking its head in the sand."

Fisher said we can keep faith with the memory of the heroic dead by resolving that after this war is won we will win the battle at the peace table, as well.

The speaker warned that the humanity of the future must be in some manner guarded by a world police force so strong that no combination of international gangsters can plunder and murder anew.

"We can outlaw war," he said, "only when we effectively outlaw the men who plan and provoke war."
