Assurance Of West Texas' No. 1 Irrigation Dam Project, Below Robert Lee, 'Now Up To the People' Of Area

Opposition at First, Disappearing Now, Says Youngblood

Directors of the Upper Colorado River Authority and U. S. Bureau of Reclamation officials had a meeting at San Angelo Friday night.

The government officials were outspoken as to the physical aspects of the project, stating, it was feasible from every angle, far as the Bureau was concern-

"It is now up to the people of the area as to whether or not the dam becomes a reality.

In this connection, L. Youngblood expressed the belief that whatever opposition to the project that may have existed in the past, is passing, since it has become a U. S. project.



T.-SGT. PAUL CLARK IS COMING HOME, AFTER THREE YEARS OVERSEAS

With the 32nd Infantry Division in Northern Luzon, Phillipines.

A Bronte, Texas, Artilleryman, veteran of more than three years overseas, is coming home under the Army's demobilization program. He is Sergeant Technician Paul H. Clark, son of Mrs. Mary E. Clark, Route 2.

A mechanic and welder in Service Battery of the 20th Field Artillery, Sgt. Clark saw action at Saidor and Aitape in New Guinea, Morotai in the Dutch East Indies, Leyte and Luzon in the Phillipines. He came overseas with the 32nd "Red Arrow" Infantry Division in April, 1942, landing at Adelaide, Australia.

Sgt. Clark holds the Good Conduct Medal, the Asiatic Pacific Theater ribbon, Phillipines Liberation medal, Bronze Arrowhead for the 32nd's ini tial landing at Saidor and three battle stars.

A mechanic in civlian life, Sgt. Clark attended school in Blackwell, Texas, and entered the Army in January, 1942. A brother, Master Sergeant M. L. Clark, is in the Army in the Mariannas.

Sgt. Clark is among the first men to leave the 32nd Division under the demobilization plan.
