## CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Members of the Bronte City Council, meeting last Friday night, Nov. 7, went on record as opposing the sale and use of fireworks in the city limits of Bronte, due to dangers to health, safety, and property, and endorsed the recent action taken by District Attorney Ralph Logan against the use of marble machines, noting that such machines no longer could be found even in Coke County.

Discussion of the fireworks situation revealed that any store selling them automatically voided its insurance protection and that misuse of fire crackers by teen-agers and adults resulted in people being the targets of thrown fireworks, which could result in injury and the loss of an eye. As a result, it was agreed to back to the limit the efforts of city marshal T. F. Sims in putting an end to the shooting of fireworks in downtown Bronte.

Members were of the opinion that marble machines only too often result in teen-agers spending money they could use better elsewhere, and that such action was not confined only to the teen-agers. Accordingly, they endorsed Logan's action, and voiced the hope that such machines would not appear again in Bronte.

A financial statement of Bronte, as of October 31, revealed a total of \$27,166.64 available. This was broken down as follows: waterworks fund—\$475.46, sinking fund—\$310, general fund—\$249.75, street and alley—\$641.34, police—\$250.99, fire—\$13.81, and bonds—\$25,225.29.

## WATER

Bob Herron, water superintendent, reported on condition of the wells, pipes, and meters, and it was noted that the master meter at the well showed some 1 1/2 million gallons pumped last month, but that only about one million gallons were paid for. In other words, due to leakage, faulty meters, and no meters, approximately 1/2 of the water Bronte used last month was not registered in a meter and hence went unpaid.

"If anyone finds a leak, please notify me at any time," Herron requested, "and I'll come and try to fix it so we can save the water."

Members also agreed to have the standpipe overflow pipe repaired and lowered, thus avoiding the present spray when it runs over.

Present water units in existence as of October totaled 240, it was reported, and it was also pointed out that pipe for the new mains and water lines would begin arriving in December. Details are now being readied for its installation and use.

There are to be a total of 31 fire plugs in use, as 16 are now available, and 15 new ones were ordered. These will be located by the engineers in charge of the plans, and changes will be made if necessary.

Council members also agreed to look into the possibility of building a dam on property near Taylor Emerson's place, which it was believed would be ample for constructing a large storage dam.

## SALARIES

At the request of T. F. Sims, city marshal, his salary was raised from \$90 per month to \$125, by unanimous action of the Council. As a result, the Bronte payroll now totals \$448 per month, including \$115 for O. W. Chapman, \$175 for Bob Herron, \$125 for Sims, \$20 for the Council, and \$3 for the poundkeeper, who is Sims.

A \$1,000 bond for the city secretary was noted and approved. Dated Oct. 31, it was made by the American Surety Co. of New York.

Miss Nelda Ann Sheppard, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Delmir Sheppard of Wildcat, has been chosen state winner in the Santa Fe Girls' Record Book Contest, and as a result, she is to attend the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

The award is the result of 4-H Club projects she has conducted for the past six years, including work in clothing, foods, home improvement, gardening, livestock, and poultry.

Some of her latest honors are: first in Coke for Girls' Record Book, fourth in best dress division of 4-H Club dress revue, first in bedroom division, an all-expense trip to Texas 4-H Club Round-Up at College Station, and county camp recreation leader.

Nelda Ann is now serving her second term as president of the Robert Lee 4-H Club, and was the Junior candidate for Halloween Queen.

With outstanding leadership ability, Nelda makes an all-round ranch hand on her father's ranch, as well as participating in rodeo events.

This is the third consecutive year for Coke County to have a representative to the National 4-H Club Congress, as Le Drew Arrott represented Coke in 1945 and Weldon Schooler last year. Le Drew is now a Bronte Hi Senior, and Weldon is a Texas Tech freshman.

Nelda will be one of eleven Texas girls to attend the Congress, and her group will leave from Dallas on Nov. 28, and return from Chicago, leaving there on Dec. 5 for the ride home.

Walker—Having failed in the Ellenburger at 7,170 feet, with a showing of gas and sulphur water, it plugged back to 6,475 feet and is preparing to run 5 1/2 inch casing to 6,150 feet to test the Strawn section, which indicated promise of production. This 3rd Ellenburger failure is a diagonal southeast offset to No. 2 H. H. Jameson, and is 1 mile south and a 1/4 mile west of No. 1 Fred Jameson.

No. 3 H. H. Jameson—Coring at 6,434 feet in line.

No. 4 H. H. Jameson—Fishing for junk with depth of 6,239 feet.

No. 1 Mathers—Whipstock set at 4,768 in effort to bypass lost tools.

No. 1 J. B. Walker—Drilling at 4,850 feet in shale. This wildcat is 4 miles south-southwest of the Jameson field.
