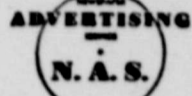

The question of consolidating the Sanco school system with the Robert Lee one was apparently settled last Saturday, when voters approved the measure in Sanco by a count of 36-34. A previous vote, several weeks ago, resulted in a tie of 35-35, and this latest vote approved the change. Robert Lee in both cases voted overwhelmingly for the consolidation, which is expected to raise the Sanco tax rate from 75 cents to \$1.50, thus making it correspond with the present Robert Lee rate. Bronte's tax rate is now set at \$1.00 for school purposes.

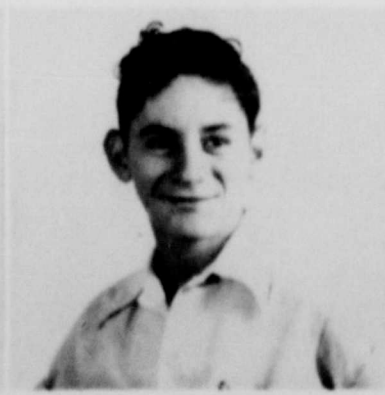

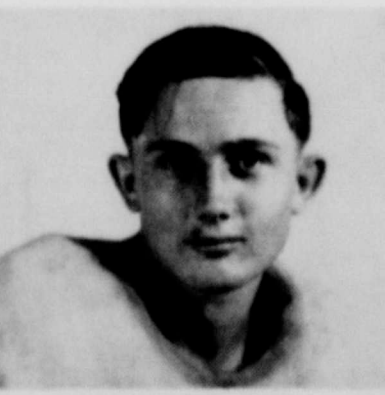

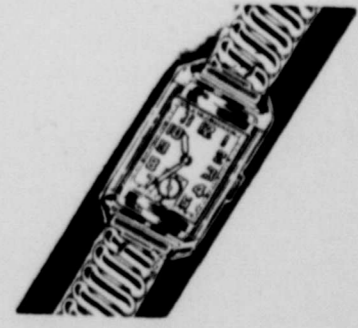

Leader of the study will be Dr. Samuel Everett of Philadelphia, Pa., outstanding authority in the field. Twenty-five state and local agencies will cooperate to provide a thoroughgoing analysis of what Texas communities need and how schools may help meet those needs.

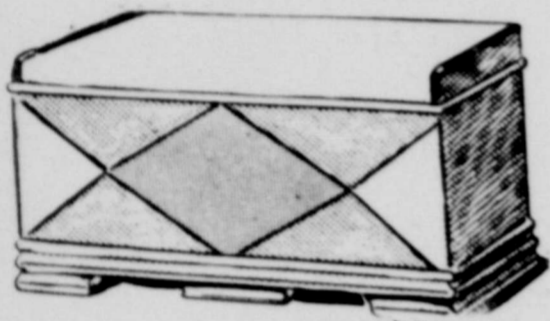
