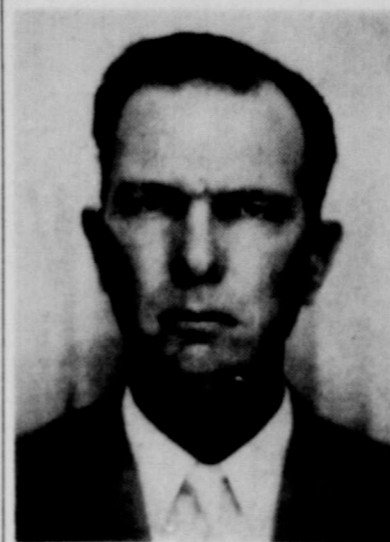

## LATEST OIL NEWS . . .

**No. 1 Wendland** — From open hole pay at 6235-50 flowed 199 barrels of oil in 24 hours ending last Friday morning. Was shut down Sunday afternoon after producing 124 barrels of oil with small amount of salt water at end of 23-hour test, and ending Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, flowed 34 barrels of oil with no water in 3 hours. Ending Monday night, flowed 71.5 barrels of oil plus 5 barrels of salt water in 9 hours through 22/64-inch tubing choke. Gas volume was 179,000 cubic feet daily. Now shut in, waiting swabbing unit.

**No. 1 Reed** — Flowed 98 barrels of oil and 100 barrels of salt water ending Wednesday morning. Last Thursday flowed 120 barrels each in 24 hours. Oil is being trucked to Bronte, shipped out over the Santa Fe.

**No. 1 Lassiter** — Flowed 75.6 barrels of oil and 20.6 barrels of salty water in 12 hours ending 6 o'clock Monday morning from 6,495-6,538. Flowed 221 barrels of oil and 78 barrels salt water and basic sediment on 24-hour gauge ending Tuesday evening through 11/32-inch choke, gas-oil ratio of 7,000-1, and 78 per cent oil and 22 per cent water. Flowing 12 barrels/hour Wednesday to storage.

and will insert plastic plug to kill water.

**No. 2 Wendland** — Spudded in Tuesday, ¾-mile south of No. 1, and 3,630 from south, 2,970 from east line of Jose Antonio Gutierrez survey 22.

**No. 2 Reed** — ¾-mile southwest of No. 1 Reed, in C NE NE 1-23-GC&SF survey. Had set surface pipe and drilling to 1,295, waiting for cement.

**No. 2 Lassiter** — Still another new well, staked Tuesday as diagonal northeast offset to No. 1.

**No. 1 C. M. Cargile** — Still another new one, 1,983 southeast of No. 3 Arledge, scheduled for 6,700, is 600 from north, 3,381.5 from west line of section 300, block 1A, H&TC, on 1,288.21 acre lease which comprises both sections 299 and 300, put down by Sun Oil Co.

**No. 3 Arledge** — Shut-in Friday after flowing 16 barrels of distillate, no water, in 24 hours. Gas-oil ratio 31,000-1, has been acidized with 4,000 gallons through perforations at 6,582-95.

**No. 8 H. H. Jameson** — Flowed 168 barrels of oil plus 10.8 barrels of acid water in 14 hours. Acidized with 4,000 gallons through perforations at 6,445-88 and 6,617-70. Was another one to be completed Monday with daily flowing potential of 246 barrels of oil plus 27.1 barrels of basic sediment and water. Gas-oil ratio 1,240-1.

Located 3,200 from south, 540 from west line of 253-1A-H&TC.

**No. 10 H. H. Jameson** — Recovered 820 feet of oil and 240 feet of oil and gas-cut mud and 30 feet of salt water on 65-minute test from 6,369-439, and is to run tubing.

**No. 1 Bloodworth** — Was standing with 5½-inch casing cemented at 6,417 with 600 sacks. Set goodwill packer 6,342-44 for shutoff, and on 6-hour test got 15 feet of mud and salt water and 1,335 feet of salt water with slight oil show. Drilling out retainer and waiting for cement to set on squeeze job back of casing at 6,342-44.

**No. 2 J. S. Walker** — Drilling 6,550. Cemented 5½-inch casing at 6,450 with 600 sacks.

**No. 1 Cent. Nat. Bank** — Waiting for cement to set on retainer at 6,551. Drilled, then waiting for testing of water shut off.

**No. 2 Cent. Nat. Bank** — Swabbed for 12 hours, got 3 barrels of oil and 18 barrels of salt water, then 14 barrels of oil and 4 barrels of basic sediment and water in next 12 hours. Continued to swab.

**No. 1 Lilly** — 4,000 feet of salt water on 1-hour test of Ellenburger from 5,414-46. Abandonment expected, located 1-mile north of Norton.

**No. 1 Rawlings** — Drilling below 5,000 feet.

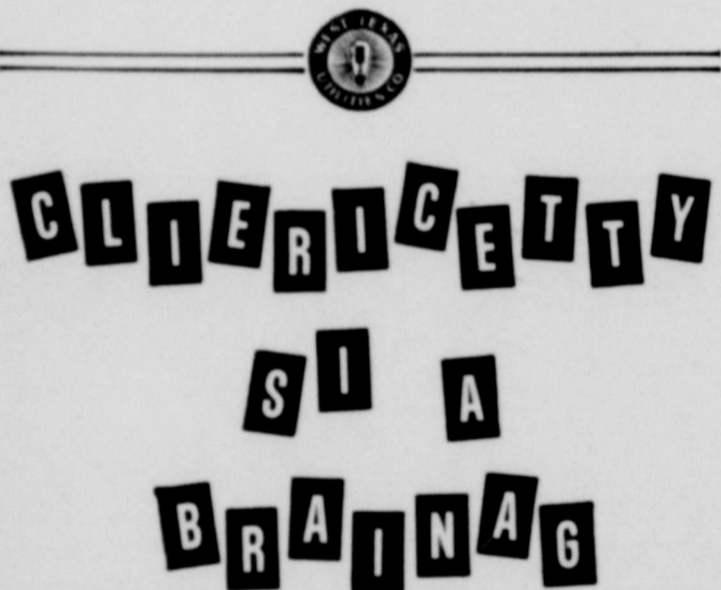

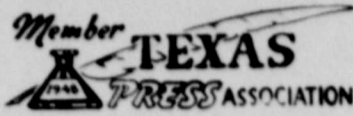
