An increase of \$367.86 in postal receipts for the Bronte post office was shown over the last fiscal year, according to Mrs. Carrie G. Williams, postmaster here.

During the fiscal year extending from July 1, 1947 through June 30, 1948, the local office received \$4, 605.11 in revenue as compared with \$4,237.25 over the period extending from July 1, 1946 through June 30

Mrs. Williams has been postmaster here for the past seven years and in April of this year was named as a national director from Texas for the third and fourth-class postmasters.
