FOUR TO SIX INCHES OF RAIN FALL HERE DURING WEEK

General rains over the entire West Texas area during the first of the week have benefitted the farmers, ranchers and businessmen of Bronte. An estimated 4 to 6 inches fell in this vicinity since Monday with reports coming in that about 6 to 8 inches fell at Tennyson and from 5 to 7 inches around Blackwell.

The Bronte city lake is at the highest level in years and restrictions have been lifted concerning the use of water here.

In some portions of West Texas,

the rains reached flood proportions and rivers and streams over this area were running bank full and spilling over highways and pastures. The Colorado river, at the bridge near here, was out of banks and on an estimated 17 foot rise. It was flowing over the bridge at Robert Lee and over the highway to San Angelo.

Biggest downpours in the area were reported at Water Valley where they received 9.65 inches, Sterling City with 7.53 inches and Garden City with 7 inches.

Ann Franklin Back From Convention

Ann Franklin of Bronte returned last week from Minneapolis, Minnesota where she was a member of the delegation from San Angelo college to the 39th Annual Convention of the American Home Economics association.

Other delegates from San Angelo college to the convention were Jo Ann Moreland from Water Valley; Mary Louise Schuch from San Angelo and Mrs. Marl A. Westerman, head of the home economics department of the San Angelo college. About 3,000 delegates attended the convention, including representatives from the University of Hawaii and South India.

The convention heard Ethel Alpenfels, anthropologist from New York university, make an address on "Adam to Atom." They also listened to Ida Jean Kain, nationally-known newspaper woman, give the recipe for being successful both as a career woman and housewife.

The delegates were allowed to view styles which will be presented to the press next month in New York City. The show included seven gowns by Pierre Balmain of Paris and cloth from New products, gadgets and inventions were also viewed by the convention delegates.

In addition to the convention, the San Angelo delegation made a tour of General Mills, Inc., including the famous Betty Crocker kitchens, visited the Foley Manufacturing company and made trips to the Twin Cities and to Rochester, Minnesota. There, the delegates were guests of the staff of Mayo Clinic and Saint Mary's hospital. A panel discussion was conducted by the Mayo staff and Rochester Child Health project.

The 1949 convention was set for San Francisco.

CONGRESSMAN FISHER SPEAKS TO LOCAL LIONS

Congressman O. C. Fisher, representative from the 21st congressional district to Washington, spoke to the Bronte Lions club in their regular meeting Wednesday at noon. The congressman began his discussion by bringing out some information concerning the Robert Lee reclamation project.

He stated that work was still being done on the proposed dam across the Colorado River in Coke County. Much delay in the project has been encountered due, first of all, to the war, and since that time due to the high costs of construction and the oil developments in this county.

Fisher said that the future of the project is entirely dependent on re-surveys that are being made now by representatives of the Bureau of Reclamation, and that he still has high hopes that the plan will go through and the dam will be built.

Questions were invited by the Congressman and during this question and answer session he expressed his views concerning this country's relation with other countries, particularly Russia. He also mentioned the grave responsibility of this country in the world today.

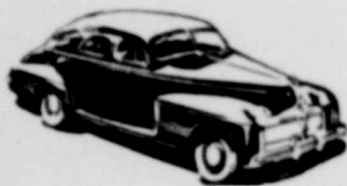

During the fiscal year extending
 from July 1, 1947 through June 30,
 1948, the local office received \$4-
 605.11 in revenue as compared with
 \$4,237.25 over the period extending
 from July 1, 1946 through June 30,
 1947.

 and fourth-class postmasters.
