LUM LASSWELL GINS 1ST BALE

R. C. (Lum) Lasswell, who farms north of Bronte, ginned the first bale of cotton of this season Thursday morning at the Bronte Gin Co.

The first bale was from 1835 pounds of seed cotton and weighed 500 pounds.

No premium had been made up at press time Thursday, but gin manager J. D. Luttrell, Jr., said that one would be made up.

Luttrell tells in an ad on another page of this paper that his gin has been reconditioned and is ready for farmers of this section to bring him their cotton.

RR Commission Says Gas Loading Facilities Here OK

Two representatives of the Texas Railroad Commission were in Bronte Tuesday to inspect loading facilities of the Texas Natural Gasoline Corporation. The men, from the gas and utilities division of the commission, inspected all valves and other equipment which the company is using and found them to be up to specifications on every count.

Numerous complaints have been received about the odor caused by the loading of butane and propane at the local Santa Fe station. Also, many residents were afraid of a possible explosion from the loading racks. The railroad commission representatives assured Mayor Ernest Ivey that the equipment was as safe as it can be made.

Mayor Ivey also pointed out that the gasoline firm has the latest in fire fighting equipment which is capable of putting out any kind of oil or gas fire at once.

The loading racks will be used for approximately five months while the Santa Fe spur is under construction from Maryneal to Silver.

Law Says Coke Must Have A County Auditor

Coke County is to have another county official. A new state law which went into effect this month provides that counties having an assessed valuation of more than \$15,000,000 or a population in excess of 35,000 shall have a County Auditor.

The law states the County Auditor is to be appointed by the District Judge every two years, and is not subject to election like other officials.

Judge Joe L. Mays will make the appointment and conferred here Monday with members of the Commissioners Court. He expects to announce an appointment within the next week or two.

An auditor has already been appointed in Runnels County, and Schleicher is also to have a County Auditor under the new law.

SEVEN MORE FAVOR STUDY ON KICKAPOO

Seven more property owners on the Kickapoo watershed turned in their ballots the past week as being in favor of making a further study of the proposed dams on the watershed. No more ballots against the study have been turned in. This makes a total of 60 persons for making the study and 2 against it.

The ballot was printed in The Enterprise week before last after a group of property owners in the area met at the newspaper office and asked that something be done to renew interest in the project. Fifty-three ballots were returned for making the study during the first week and two marked their ballots against it.

Anyone else who wishes to fill out a ballot is urged to do so and bring it by The Enterprise office. A later report will be run on the count next week.

Several persons have indicated the past week that they think enough public support is available to start making concrete plans for getting the study underway. A public meeting will probably be called in the next week or so. At that time the matter can be discussed and plans made.

Supt. Black Explains Program And Policies of Bronte School

Appearing on the program for the Bronte Lions Club this week was School Superintendent Garland Black, who spoke to the men on what school officials are trying to do in the local school.

He stated that school enrollment is a few more than a year ago and he was high in the praise of the local school board saying that they are doing an excellent job, the comparison being with tow other schools that he was previously associated with.

He also said Bronte Schools were fortunate to have a capable and efficient staff of teachers and principals, and that the best replacements have been found for vacancies created by resignations.

Black said "In the high school courses a definite and more consistent mathematic, science and business education departments have been set up in high school. With the offering of chemistry this year and alternating with physics an-

other year, we have a strong science program, as these subjects have never been offered before."

He said that even though he had always worked very close with athletics he had always been of the opinion that education comes first and that it was the definite duty of himself and the faculty to see to the welfare and educational improvement of each child.

He stressed that "coming first in the development of our children is home environment and opportunities offered by our church. And, incidentally we are also very lucky to have the many good and well organized churches that we have. All of these must work together for the benefit of building better future citizens for our country."

Black said school officials hoped to build a more efficient school band than Bronte has had in the past, saying that they would need

Longhorns Defeat Richland Springs in Season Opener, 19-0

The Bronte Longhorns opened their 1955 season with an impressive win over Richland Springs, by a score of 19-0. The Longhorns shows signs of greatness on defense and good running power on offense. The highly favored Coyotes held the ball inside the Longhorn 20 during the last quarter, but could not puncture the Bronte forward wall. On several occasions the Longhorn line brought a sudden stop to a Coyote drive by holding them deep in Bronte territory.

The opening period saw no scoring by either team, but saw some outstanding play on defense by both teams. The Bronte team possessed the ball nearly all the first period, but could not produce enough yardage in one drive to produce a tally.

The first score of the contest came mid-way in the second quarter when the Longhorns took possession of the ball on the Richland 40. On the first play, Bill Wrinkle broke through the line and raced 50 yards before being pulled down from behind on the 10 yard marker. After two plays, the Long-

horns still had possession of the ball on the 10. On the next play, Wrinkle plowed over for paydirt. Smith attempted to kick the conversion, but had it blocked.

In the latter part of the second period, the Coyotes saw an all out drive come to a halt when the Longhorns recovered a fumble on the Bronte 22. Two plays later the first half ended with Bronte leading the Coyotes 6-0.

The third quarter opened with Bronte receiving the kickoff and advancing the ball to the midway stripe. On the first play, Gentry advanced, with Wrinkle following up with a 16 yard jaunt. Gentry then took the ball to the Richland 22 where on the next play, Noel Scott swept right end for the tally. Wrinkle ran the extra point to put the Longhorns out front by a score of 13-0.

The next and final Longhorn score came as a result of a Coyote fumble on the Richland 35 yard line. With Scott and Gentry doing the majority of the ball carrying, the Longhorns advanced the ball to the 2 in eight plays. Gentry then took it over from there to tally the final score of the game. Scott ran the EP to make the final score 19-0.

Both teams seesawed back and forth in the final period, with each trying to capitalize on each other's fumbles, but could not produce from them. When the final gun went off the Longhorns had just put down an uprising by the Coyotes.

Add a can of tomatoes or a can of stewed tomatoes with peppers or a can of tomato puree. Cover and simmer for about 30 minutes.

help on this project and may have to call on the Lions Club.

The Superintendent said the school was notified by the State School inspector last spring that the high school library was very poor and plans are to secure more books for the library as they can.

New electric water coolers have been installed in the halls of the old building for use of the students and plans are to put steel lockers in these same halls which will give each student a definite place to keep his or her school supplies and possessions.

A bioscope was purchased last year for use in the science department. The bioscope is a must for an efficient department, he said.

In the business education department, Black reported that typing II will be taught each year

and that five electric typewriters have been purchased with two students assigned to each machine. "We feel in years to come, it will help these students to secure better jobs because of their training on an electric write." Regular price of the typewriters, he said, was \$375. each for a total of \$1875. The school was allowed a \$500 discount, making the price \$281.25 each, so the total cost to the school was \$1093.00.

Black concluded "When the new building is completed, we will have one of the finest plants in this section with plenty of classrooms for a better school.
