Foul Weather Last Weekend

Most violent and disagreeable weather of the season lashed West Texas last weekend and before it was all over, Bronte had rain, sleet and snow in small amounts, and dust in large amounts. All were accompanied by high winds, which in San Angelo measured gusts up to 70 miles per hour.

The front moved into this area around midnight Friday and continued unabated until early Monday morning. It was the edge of the storm which covered the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas and the midwest with the worst spring blizzard in history. Thirty-six deaths were blamed on the snow and cold which covered the area north of here.

No measurable moisture was received here, and certainly not enough was received to replace what was dried up by the howling winds.

City and Senate Elections Set For Tuesday at City Hall

An election will be held Tuesday, April 2, to name two members to the Bronte city council. Only two candidates, Bob Wilson and Matthew Caperton, have announced for the two positions.

Wilson is running for a second

term, while Caperton is running for a first term. Paul McGuire, the other councilman whose term expires this year, did not seek reelection. He has served three terms on the council.

Balloting will take place at the city hall in Bronte, with D. K. Glenn serving as election judge.

Other members of the city council who have another year to serve are Mayor Ernest Ivey and Councilmen Bill Thomas, Ben Oglesby and Charlie Boecking.

At the same time a special election to name a U. S. Senator from Texas will be held. Twenty-two candidates are in the running for this job which was vacated when Gov. Price Daniel resigned. William, Dallas millionaire, has been serving as interim senator since Daniel's resignation.

Juniors Sponsor Dailey Circus

The Dailey Brothers Circus and Palace of Wonders will play two performances here next Thursday, April 4. The circus will be set up at the baseball field behind the Bronte Ice Company. Performances will be in the afternoon and at night.

The circus appearance here is being sponsored by the Junior Class of Bronte School and class members are in charge of advance ticket sales. Tickets are 50 cents for children and seventy-five cents for adults. A spokesman for the Junior class said that the local group makes more money on the advance sale and everyone is urged to buy their tickets ahead of time.

Red Cross chairman, H. A. Springer said this week that the fund campaign had slowed down the past week but that he hopes the drive will be concluded next week. He asked that workers finish their territories Monday and Tuesday of next week and turn their reports in to Cecil Kemp, who is auditor for the drive.

Bronte Students Enter in League Literary Events

Bronte was well represented at the annual Interscholastic League literary meet in San Angelo yesterday. The meet was to be held at San Angelo College.

Entered in the senior girls declamation division was Carolyn Kemp. Carolyn has won first in this event the past several years. Robert L. Moore was the entry from Bronte in senior boys declamation. Students representing Junior High girls declamation were Jean and June Moore and D. W. Sims entered in the boys division. Grade School girls declamation entry was Deanie Allen, while Vic Glenn entered in the boys division.

Linda Henry was scheduled to try her hand in the essay writing contest, while Carolyn Glenn and Yvonne McCutchen were entered in the Grade School spelling division.

A drillstem test in the Ellenburger developed flowing oil in Plymouth Oil Co. No. 1 Tidwell, Coke County wildcat five miles southeast of Robert Lee.

Operator tested the section at 6,124-6,170 feet, with tool open 45 minutes. It surfaced oil in 27 minutes, with no gauge or estimate made on rate of flow.

No water was made on the test. A full string of clean oil was reversed out of drillpipe. Flowing pressure ranged from 1,835 to 2,365 pounds, and shut-in pressure in 90 minutes was 2,930.

Location is in Thomas Shell Survey 965½.

Up the hole at 5,015-5,046 feet, a drillstem test in the Cross Cut sand recovered 690 feet of free oil and 270 feet of mud-cut oil. Tool was open four and a half hours, with gas surfacing in 45 minutes.

Operators were coring in the Ellenburger this week.

PERCIFULL DEEPENING

Half a mile south of the West Wendkirk pool opener, Jake L. Hamon, Dallas, and Guffey Drilling Company, Abilene, will re-enter and deepen to 5,200 feet for tests of the Cross Cut in No. 1-A D. F. Percifull, 467 feet from north and east lines of J. Baker survey 461.

It originally was drilled by American Republics Corporation as its No. 1-461 Percifull and abandoned at 4,129 feet in July 1954.

DRY HOLE

Ashland Oil & Refining Co. of Oklahoma City No. 1 S. L. Dixon, wildcat in 451-John Shierer survey, seven miles southwest of Bronte, plugged and abandoned at 5,150 feet.

All parents who have children who will enter school for the first time this fall are urged to have their children at the clinic on that date.

The roundup is sponsored each year by the Bronte Parent-Teachers Association and Dr. John R. Harris provides his services and facilities free of charge. The PTA furnishes the vaccine necessary and there is no charge for the examination or any inoculations found necessary.

DIES BEST FITTED FOR SENATE

Naturally a Republican president will talk nice to a Republican candidate, but Texas people have never signed over to any president, no matter how much they like him, the right to do their voting for members of Congress, or any other office.

So it is very important that everyone vote Tuesday, and unite with other Democrats to keep on the job in Washington a man we put there ourselves by a big majority and have had no cause to regret it.

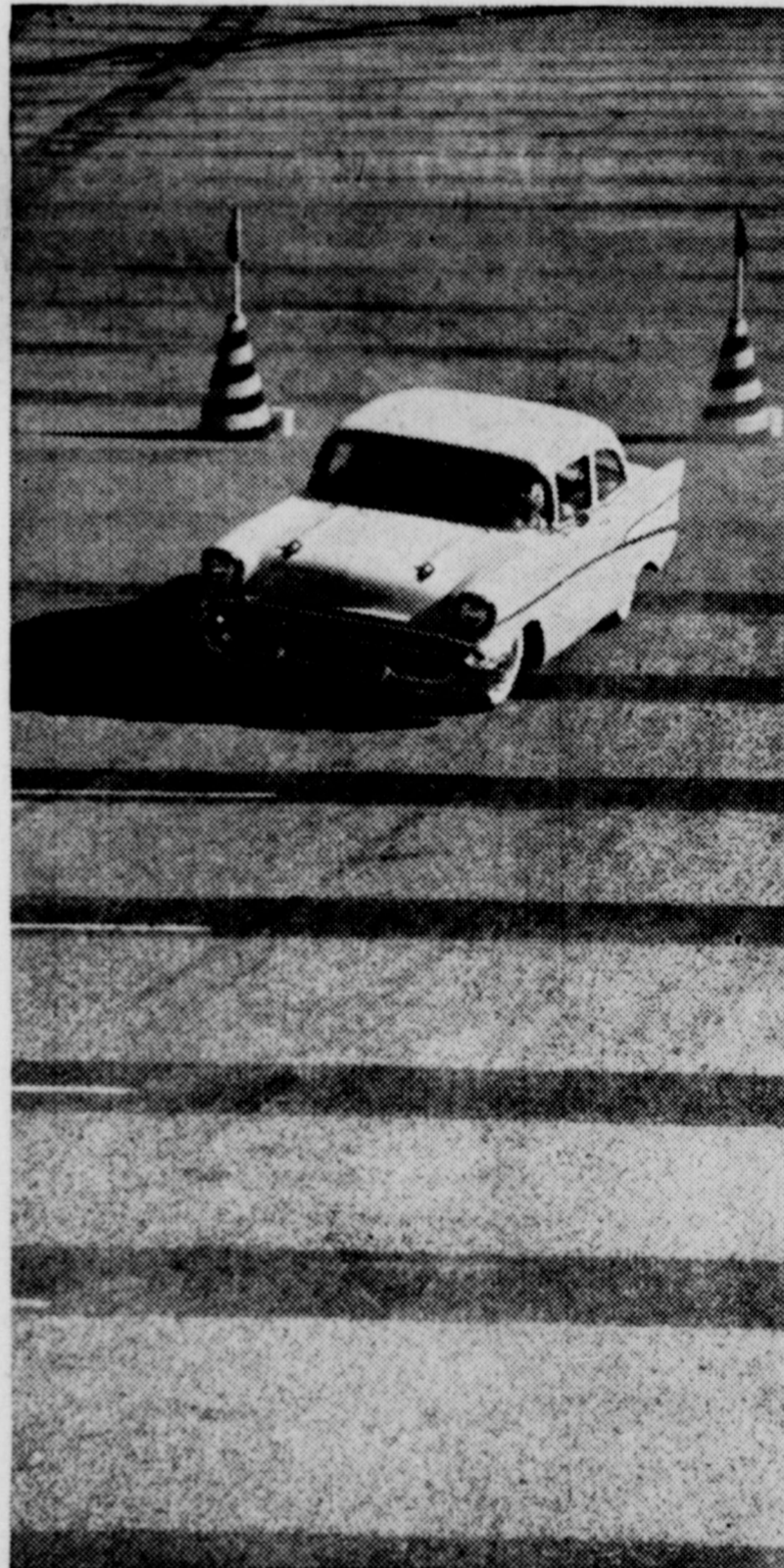
