Pictures and reports coming out of Dallas this week show all over again that man and his works can show up mighty puny when nature decides to go on a rampage.

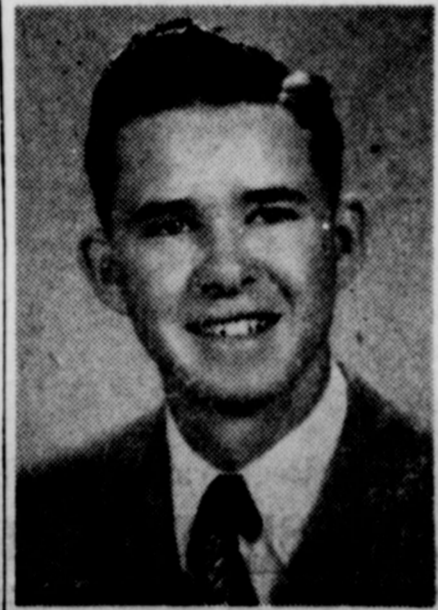

## Funeral Tomorrow For Claude R. Ash, Accident Victim

Funeral services for Claude Ray Ash, 27, will be held at 10:30 a.m. today, Friday, from First Baptist Church, Norton. Officiating will be the Rev. David Crow, Norton Baptist pastor; Rev. Roy Stuckey, Hermleigh; and Rev. Russell of Ozona. Interment will follow in the Norton cemetery under direction of Newby-Davis Funeral Home of Ballinger.

Ash, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Ash of Bronte (Marie community) was killed Friday afternoon, March 29, when his automobile crashed into a bridge railing one mile west of Loraine, Texas. Ash was driving west on Highway 80. Officers said his car struck the bridge on the left side shearing off several posts. Apparently the metal railing struck Ash as it impaled the car and burst through the back.

He was born Feb. 9, 1930, the older of two sons. He attended school at Norton and later at Bronte where he graduated in 1947. He attended Texas Tech where he graduated in 1951 with a BS degree in animal husbandry. He continued his education at Tech and received his master of science degree in animal husbandry in 1952.

In November 1952, he went into the U. S. Army and served overseas during the Korean police action. He was discharged from the army in October, 1954.

In January 1955 he was employed by Paymaster Feed Co. in Abilene and was with that firm at the time of the accident.

He was a member of First Baptist Church at Norton.

He is survived by his parents and one brother, Joe Russell Ash, who was serving with the army in Germany at the time of the accident. He is being given military leave to attend his brother's funeral and was expected to arrive home on Thursday.

## Cancer Crusade Will Seek \$600 In Coke County

A. J. Kirkpatrick, publisher of the Robert Lee Observer, will serve as chairman for the 1957 educational and fund-raising campaign of the Coke County Chapter of the American Cancer Society. The campaign will begin immediately.

Under his leadership, volunteers will seek to alert all residents to the need for regular health examinations as a protection against needless cancer and they will work to raise at least \$600 in this county. The national goal is \$30,000,000 which will be used to further the ACS three-fold fight of research, education and service.

"I am proud to be associated with such a meaningful public effort," Mr. Kirkpatrick said. "Cancer, considered man's cruellest enemy, annually takes a toll of approximately 250,000 lives.

"Thousands of these persons could have been saved by prompt treatment had they known the life-saving facts about cancer and acted in time. That is why we stress the public education aspect of this campaign and urge all persons to have regular health examinations as a protection against needless death from cancer.

"But the American Cancer Society needs the generous support of all our citizens. Funds for research are needed to develop methods of diagnosis and treatment that can save many more lives. Many people are alive and active today because of the great support of the American people in past campaigns—support that has been translated into concrete results that have already cut death rates for some sites of cancer."

Meetings to organize workers in the Cancer Crusade have been set for early next week. A meeting is set for Monday at 7:30 in the Bronte High School when a film, "Man Alive" will be shown. Mrs. J. B. Mackey is in charge of the Crusade here.

## Yarborough Wins Senate Vote; Carries Coke 3-2 Over Dies

Ralph Yarborough, newly elected junior U. S. Senator from Texas carried Bronte and Coke County, along with the rest of the state in the special election held Tuesday.

After five defeats for high public office, Yarborough won the special senate election by a margin of some 70,000 votes over his nearest opponent, Congressman at Large Martin Dies of Lufkin.

The Austin lawyer carried both of the big boxes in the county, Robert Lee and Bronte, along with part of the rural boxes, to push ahead of Dies about 3-2. Thad Hutcheson, the Republican aspirant to the Senate job came in as a poor third in the race, which had a slate of 22 candidates on the ballot.

## Bronte Tops in League Meets

### Bronte Sweeps Track Meet

Bronte made a complete sweep of all three divisional titles in the District 124-B track and field meet Tuesday at San Angelo High School Stadium. They won the senior, junior and grade school titles.

In the senior division Bronte piled up 59½ points while Mertzon was a distant second with 30 points. Seven records were broken and two were tied. Robert L. Moore took high point honors with 15 points, Jimmy Lee had 12, and Dennis Glass of Wall had 11.

In the Junior high scoring, Bronte edged Wall, 31-24. Robert Lee was third with 21 points.

Bronte took the grade school division with 40 points, getting four of seven first places. Wall followed with 21 points.

On the Bronte senior team Robert Moore stole the show by setting a new record in pole vault. Moore vaulted 11' 5" to erase the 10' 4" mark set by Royce Smith of Robert Lee in 1949 and tied by Grady Coulter of Bronte in 1956. Moore nearly vaulted 12 feet but pushed

the bar down on last try.

Moore, Lee, Gene Sherrod and Bobby Hester cleaned the slate for new record in the 440 yard relay with a time of 46.9. Moore also took first in the broad jump.

### Deluxe Molasses Cake

1/2 cup sugar  
1 tsp. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. soda  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 cup shortening  
1/2 cup molasses  
1/2 cup milk  
2 eggs  
1 tsp. vanilla

Method: Sift all dry ingredients. Stir in shortening, eggs, vanilla, molasses until flour is dampened. Beat about 1 minute with mixer. Add milk. Beat 2 more minutes. Bake in loaf or in layers.

### Frosting Recipe

Scorch 1/2 cup butter. Add 3 cups confectioners sugar alternately with 1 tablespoon of molasses. Add 5 tablespoons milk, cream or evaporated milk. Try this on your favorite ginger bread recipe. It's very good.

### Ground Observer Meeting April 9

A Ground Observer Corps meeting has been called for Tuesday night, April 9, at 7:30 p. m. The meeting will be in the city hall.

T/Sgt. Milo Curtice, 33rd Air Division, Air Defense Command, of Oklahoma will be present to lecture on the organizing of a post here. The Ground Observer Corps is for the purpose of spotting enemy air craft and observing storms.

A motion picture will be shown on the activities of the Corps.

Everyone, women as well as men are urged to attend. Volunteers are needed to organize and operate a post on a standby basis.

In the event the post is organized no observer will be on watch more than two hours. Practice alerts will be scheduled for a six hour period, not more than twice each month.

A spokesman said "if the cold war should warm up, the post would be on a twenty-four hour schedule. There is the possibility that radar could be blocked off and the Ground Observer Corps might well be the only means of providing information of approaching hostile aircraft.

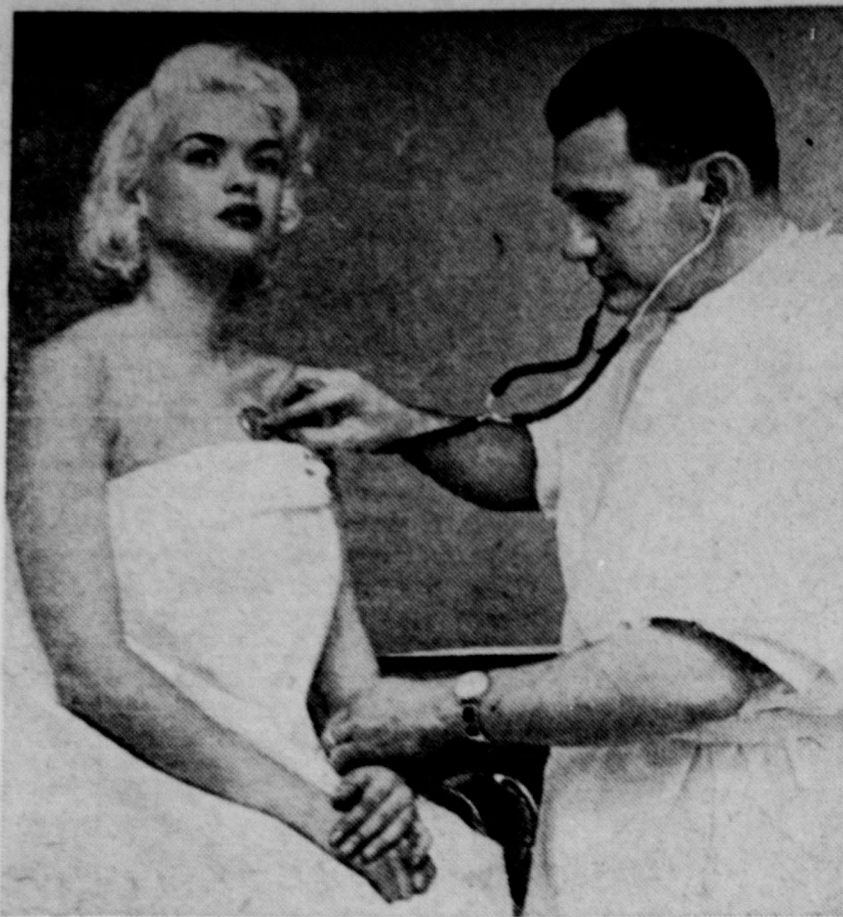

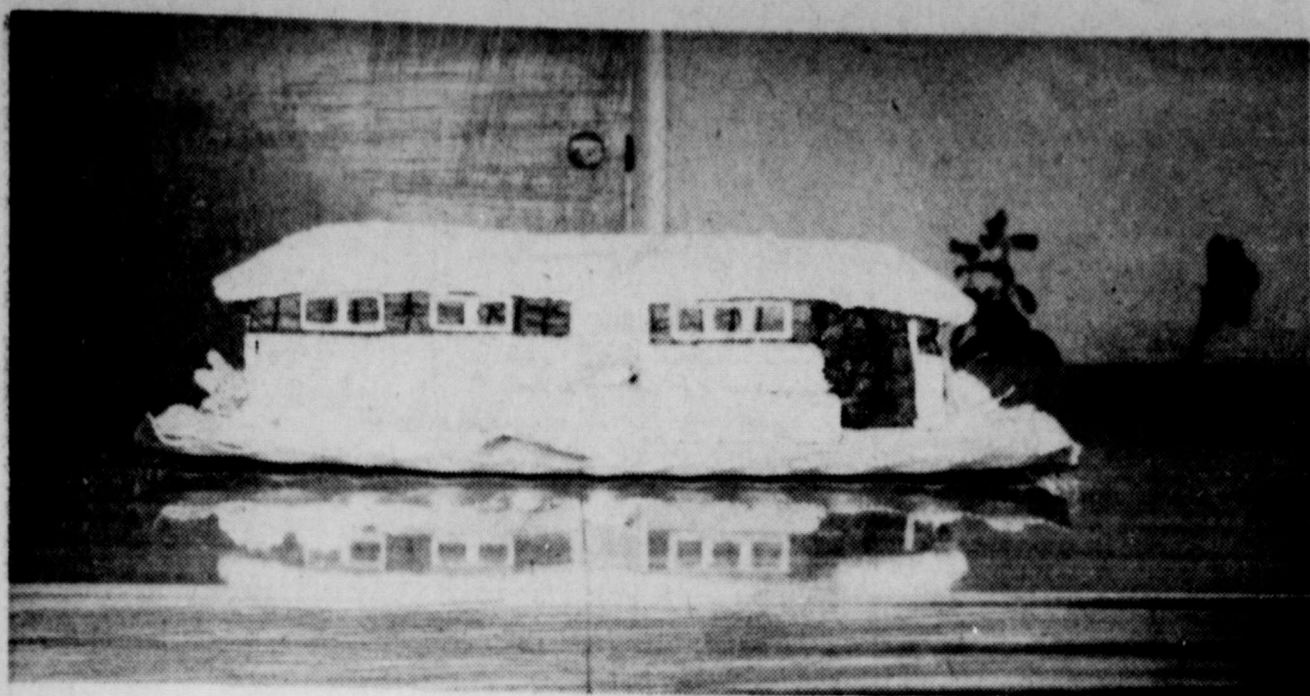

**First Baptists in Texas Program**

First Baptist Church of Bronte is participating in the 1957 Texas' Baptist General Convention Town and Country Achievement and Recognition Program. There were 161 churches in Texas enlisted in this program last year and awards were made by Associations, by the 17 District Conventions and by the annual State Convention for the church and pastor making the best record. A large metal highway display sign is given to the winners in each of these three levels of competition. The pastor of the winning church will receive a scroll and the State Winner will speak at the annual State Convention.

**Fred Roe, Jr. Develops Grass Seeding Machine**

For \$37.60 Fred L. Roe, Jr., cooperating with Coke County Soil Conservation District, developed an attachment for his farm tractor to seed blue panicum. He purchased two Planet Jr. boxes and had frames built to mount them on his tractor. With this attachment, Roe will be able to seed his blue panicum with assurance that he will plant the correct amount of seed. He will not need

to use cracked grain sorghum or some other material for a carrier.

For about \$30.00 W. F. Fikes also equipped his farm tractor to seed blue panicum. Fikes' attachment is one small box that will carry small seed.

Other district cooperators that are planning to rig an attachment include Otis Smith, Bill Allen, Carl Hurley and F. S. Higginbotham. D. K. Glenn, L. T. Youngblood, W. D. McDonald and Vernon Copeland have purchased a complete grass seeding attachment equipped with small boxes and double disc opening plow.

The double disc opening plow is equipped with a band on the disc to assure correct depth of planting the seed.

With some study and ingenuity land owners and operators can rig an attachment for their farm tractors to seed blue panicum, according to A. V. Sheppard, Work Unit Conservationist. Many different types of attachments can be rigged to plant blue panicum grass. Some type of a small box attached to the farm planter is the simplest. Several equipment companies build some form of seeding attachments.

If a landowner does not want to rig an attachment, then cracked small grain can be used as a carrier to plant blue panicum with regular raw equipment. The mixture should be three or four parts of cracked grain sorghum to one part of grass seed.

Any landowner needing assistance with rigging a planter or seeding grasses is urged to contact the employees of the Soil Conservation Service.

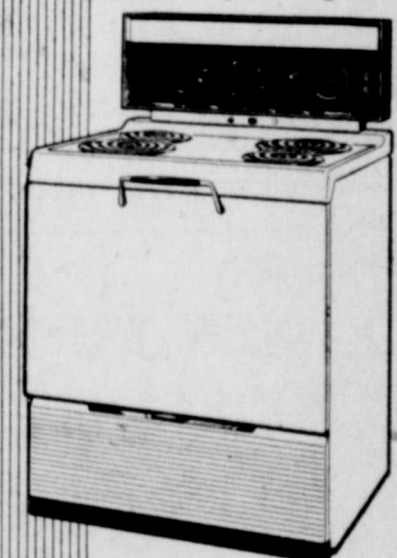
