Plymouth I Tidwell Flows 184 Barrels on Potential Test

Coke County gained an Ellenburger discovery with completion of Plymouth Oil Co. No. 1 T. E. Tidwell, in 965 1/2-Thos. Shell survey, five miles southeast of Robert Lee, for a daily flowing potential of 184 barrels of 42.4 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 583-1.

Production was through a 3/16 inch choke and perforations between 6,120-150 feet, which had been washed with 500 gallons of

mud acid.

Casing (5 1/2-inch) was set at 6,440 feet, the total depth.

SUN NO. 1-A MALONE

Sun Oil Co. No. 1-A Malone, in 321-1A-H&TC, Coke County Canyon sand discovery located 11 miles northwest of Robert Lee, has been completed for a daily flowing potential of 133.86 barrels of 49 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,540-1.

Production was through a 1/8 inch choke and perforations between 5,528-96 feet and 5,620-25 feet, which had been washed with 500 gallons of mud acid and fractured with 20,000 gallons of oil and 20,000 pounds of sand.

Tubing pressure was 1,100 pounds with packer on casing.

The project tested the Ellenburger through perforations between 6,985-998 feet, recovering 3.94 barrels of new oil and 18.5 barrels of salty sulphur water.

Operators are expected to make an announcement in the near future concerning additional drilling in the area.

Post Office Open This Saturday

Bronte Post Office will be open this Saturday and a normal schedule has been resumed. The post office closed last Saturday due to curtailment of postal service, because of a shortage of funds to operate the post office department. The new service will speed up calls for phone users and should improve service all the way round. Bronte Phones to Be Changed To Dial Next Tuesday Night

A new era of telephone service comes to Bronte next Tuesday, April 23, when the exchange converts to dial operation.

Ted Maxwell, district manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest, said the cutover from magneto to dial will come about 10 o'clock at night at a moment when there is no traffic, local or long distance, on the local switchboard.

"Bronte subscribers should continue using their magneto telephones as they have in the past until they hear a dial tone," Maxwell explained. "When they hear a dial tone, they should begin use of their dial instrument."

As soon as dial service begin Tuesday, Bronte telephone subscribers should begin using their new telephone directory, since all

numbers will be changed and new numbers have been assigned subscribers, Maxwell pointed out. All Bronte telephone numbers begin with the Prefix GR-3 for Greenwood 3 and will be followed by four digits: example, GR3-XXXX. Subscribers who have not received their new telephone books by the date of the change-over should contact the telephone office.

Bronte subscribers will dial "0" for long distance, information, assistance in completing calls, and to report a telephone out of order. These calls will be handled by operators in San Angelo, the "master office" for Bronte which will be an "unattended" dial exchange. For business matters, such as information regarding bills or to order now or additional service, Bronte subscribers will dial "0" and ask for "Enterprise 2484," which will connect them, without a toll charge to the San Angelo business office.

To report a fire Bronte subscribers will dial GR3-2311 and to reach the police they will dial GR3-3221. If there is no answer at the Bronte Police number, please dial "0" and ask for Robert Lee, GL3-3121.

The business office for Bronte subscribers will be located in San Angelo at 14 West Twohig with office hours from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Oil Rig Falls, Kills Angelo Man

Joseph Winton Pearce, 45-year old San Angeloan, was killed instantly early last Friday when high winds toppled a 36-foot steel oil well rig onto the car in which he was sitting.

The accident occurred about 12:25 a. m. three miles north of Bronte on the Humble Rawlings No. 2. Pearce was drilling superintendent for Pool and Gerlich Drilling Company.

Witnesses said Pearce had been on the location when he was killed. He had gone to the rig to talk with the tool pusher, Earl Upton of Big Lake, who had been in the automobile only minutes before.

The car was sitting south of the rig. No one else was injured. Winds from a weather front apparently twisted the rig. Frank Pool, owner of the company, said company rigs had been in winds up to 75 miles per hour before with no accidents.

The derrick fell across the car, crushing both the vehicle and occupant. Pool said the derrick weighed about 90,000 pounds. There was no damage to the well and about \$10,000 damage to the drilling equipment, Pool said.

Pearce had been with the company five years. Funeral services were held Saturday morning in San Angelo.

He is survived by his wife.

Waldrop gave up his position and will report to Abilene next Tuesday for physical examination. He will then ask for immediate induction in order to go along with Gray and Gentry.

Gentry is the only married man in the group. He has been living in San Angelo.

1/3 cup hot water
3 tabl. lemon juice

1 tabl. flour

Cook this on low heat until thick and beat until all mushy. Spread this on dough in pan. Then take the remainder of the dough and roll out to about the size of the pan. Take a spatula to take it up as it may tear up some but place it on the filling. Cook until brown.

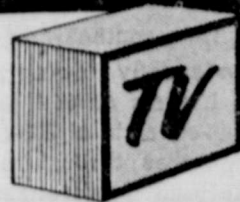

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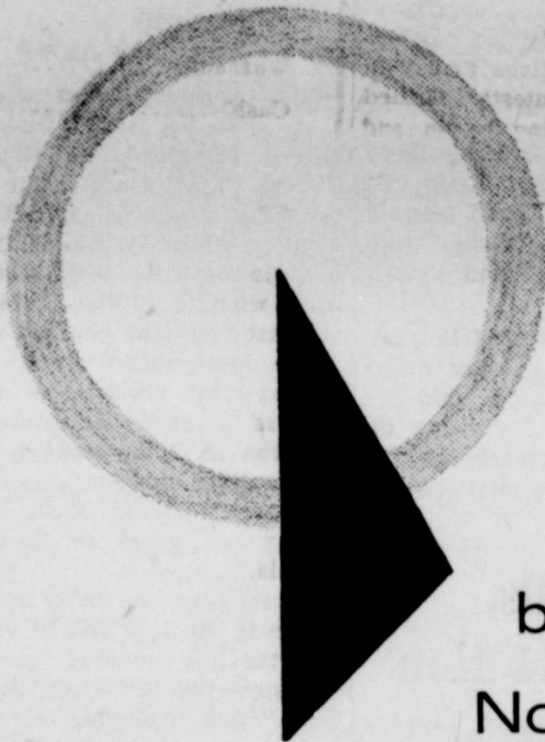

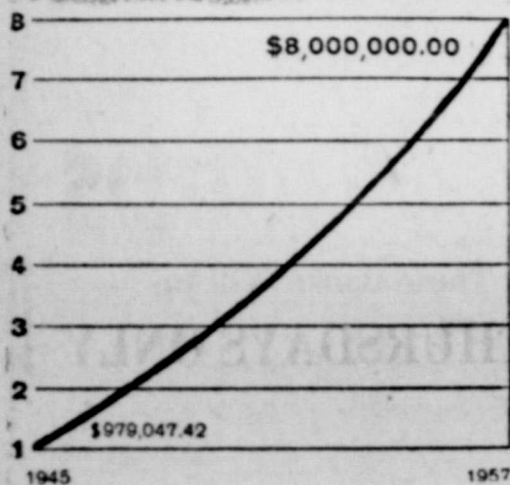

**The Spectre
Of Communism**

By Owen Cosgrove

(Editor's Note: Owen Cosgrove, local Church of Christ minister, has prepared a series of articles on Communism. Space permitting, The Enterprise will carry the articles in the next few issues.)

"A spectre is haunting Europe—the spectre of Communism!" When Karl Marx used these words to begin his famous "Communist Manifesto" in 1848, few people took them seriously.

At first, such statements were considered to be completely over-optimistic and exaggerated. Of all the philosophical and economic movements facing Europe, Communism was among the weakest and puniest. Many scoffed at Marx for his swaggerly attitude toward the potentialities of this movement.

Like a cancer, the power and influence of Communism grew and spread almost unnoticed by much of the world. Even after World War I, when the Third International planted Communist parties in virtually every nation, many people were almost totally unaware of the nature, purposes, and tactics of the Communist Movement.

Today, Karl Marx's prediction of Europe's being haunted by the spectre of Communism is absolutely true. Never has any political movement so threatened the liberty of the whole world. Never has Europe been haunted more by the fear of aggression and oppression than she is today.

The dogmas and doctrines of Communism have been polished and shaped very carefully in the last few years. Communist teachers never keep their brass bands silent as they continue to develop the most elaborate propaganda system in the history of nations.

It is not enough to cast the Communists off as a nation of dullards and fools. In many countries, Communism has appealed most to the "Intelligentsia" (the young educated class.) Though Communism's precepts are wrong, unfounded and ungodly, our resistance to such must be founded on more than prejudice and ridicule. Americans should make every effort to know what Communism is and for what it stands.

As with any false dogma, the greatest repellent to the spectre of Communism is truth and enlightenment. This series of articles will attempt to set forth some basic truths concerning Communism and its weaknesses. We urge you to study them carefully.

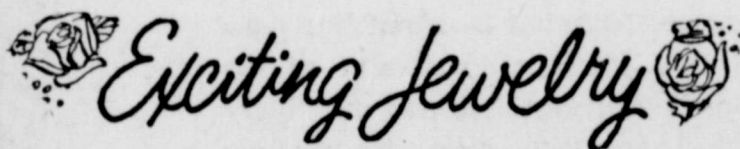

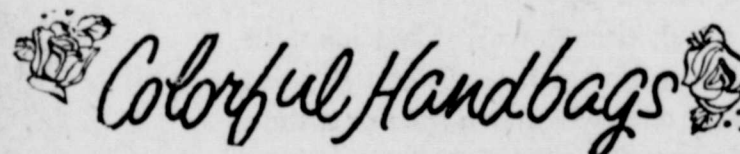

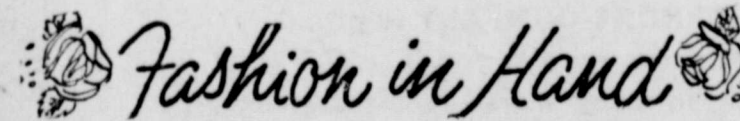

Danger Of Bitterweed On Increase

Many landowners are finding scattered bitterweeds on their farms and ranches, as well as along the right of way of the roads and highways, where they have never been found locally before.

J. O. Rudd, ranching on the Weaver Ranch, south of Robert Lee, has worked the highway right-of-way through his ranch to the top of the divide. He hand pulled a sack full of bitterweed that was in full bloom.

Bitterweed is a small yellow flowered annual, that is a very prolific seeder. A few plants can produce enough seed to infest many acres of rangeland. Bitterweed is a winter weed that shows up when we have late fall and winter rainfall. It spreads rapidly on bare or sparsely covered rangeland. The condition of most range land is an ideal seedbed for bitterweeds. When the range grasses have been removed by livestock and dry weather, the bitterweed seed will be present to infect our rangeland.

The only effective control known is good range management. Anytime a rancher has good grasses on his ranch, he will not lose sheep from bitterweed. However, anytime our ranges are short of good range grasses, and forbs, we are setting the stage to loose sheep from bitterweed. A cover of good grasses such as sideoats grama, feathery bluestem, buffalo and curly mesquite, cottontop, plain bristle, and needle grass will do a good job of controlling the spread of bitterweed.

On all ranches along ranch roads and around watering places the grass cannot control bitterweed; therefore some mechanical or chemical control is needed to destroy the seed source. Each ranch operator should check their ranches and road ditches for small patches of the bitterweeds. A few scattered weeds can most effectively be controlled by hand pulling.

I have observed isolated bitterweed plants scattered over the Colorado River Valley. The weeds are moving down off of the divides, by pulling or cutting a few plants now many pounds of bitterweed seed will not mature. I surely believe the old proverb, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," applies when a rancher is trying to control bitterweed.
